## M. H. Goode Sr. Succumbs Monday

### Funeral Services Held Wednesday At First Methodist Church Here

With the passing on Monday of M. H. Goode Sr., 85, another pioneer resident of Sanderson and Terrell County has gone to his reward. Mr. Goode died at 3:30 p. m. Monday afternoon in the Del Rio hospital, where he had been under medical treatment since March 29.

Funeral services were held in the Doran Chapel in Del Rio at 10 a. m. Tuesday, with Dr. M. L.

ducting burial services at the graveside.

Monte Hardin Goode was born in Bell County, Texas, February 21, 1861. In the early 80's he ranched in Durango, Mexico, returning to Coryell County in 1888, where he resided for several years. In 1896 he moved westward, traveling in a covered wagon, and spent the winter on Devil's River, moving west of the Pecos into what was then Pecos County, in the spring. He and his wife, the late Mrs. Evelyn Louise Goode, who preceded him in death on October 20, 1944, settled on a ranch near Sheffield, and also maintained a home in Ozona for twelve years so their children could attend school. From there, they moved to their present ranch, and also maintained a home here in town. He was actively engaged in the ranching business until his last illness. Affectionately known as "Tio," he had a host of friends throughout this section of the state. He joined the Methodist church in Ozona in 1907 and in 1944, moved his membership to the First Methodist Church here, and became a strong supporter of the church and displayed a highly active interest in its construction and completion.

He is survived by one son, M. H. Goode Jr., of this city; four daughters, Mrs. W. E. McSparran and Mrs. Wilson Banner of this city, Mrs. Chester Dugger and Mrs. Hoover, both of Irran, Texas. Grandchildren surviving are Mrs. Louise Hoover Currie, Del Rio; Jackie Hoover and Jimmie Kate Hoover, Irran; Joe Friend, Pandale; Batts Friend, Sonora; Gene, Lee and Doris McSparran, Monte and Cecelia Goode, and Cy Banner, all of Sanderson. All of the children and grandchildren, with the exception of Cy Banner, were here for the funeral. He is also survived by six great-grandchildren, Carl Craven and Marion Currie, Del Rio; Bonnie and Clayton Friend, Sonora; Joe Warren and Glenda Friend, Pandale. Other survivors include 4 sisters Mesdames Adah Carr, Mangel, La Will Farmer, Temple, Texas; Lillie Wofford, Sabinal, Texas, and Minnie Wilcox, of whom were able to attend the funeral.

The district comprises the counties of Terrell, Val Verde, Maverick, Kennedy and Brewster.

In making his announcement, Moore stated emphatically he is strictly independent and is not supported by any clique or group. He has made no promises or pledges to support legislation of any nature in order to gain votes and, if elected, will not be committed in any manner to any individual or organization.

Moore declared his campaign for the office is financed by him personally without outside assistance.

At present and for the past year he has been a representative of the Sheriff's Association of Texas and has traveled the western half of Texas. He feels that his contacts in this section and the friends he has made in his travels will be valuable assets in filling the duties of state representative.

A property owner and a taxpayer of Val Verde County, Moore was, before his employment by the Sheriff's Association, attached to the War Department Intelligence, assigned to the Air Corps. For a period of time he was with the United States Engineers.

Moore said he solicits the vote and support of the voters of the district and that he plans to wage an active campaign and promises to use honest and best judgement in the interest of the District and State of Texas.

**BRACKETT NEWS MAIL**—The possibility of an irrigation project for a large part of central-southern Kinney County not already under irrigation looms as the result of preliminary investigations in that direction it is learned from County Agent L. E. Turbeville.

This area, which embraces a large part of the county immediately south of here, was surveyed for a simlad irrigation project some twenty-five years or more ago, and maps and plans therefor are still on file. A government survey to determine the practical features of the project has been promised around July 1st. The original project was never carried further than on paper and preliminary steps.

**ALPINE AVALANCHE**—Something definite has been done about a permanent camp sit in the Big Bend for Big Bend Scouts and preparations are under way for a camp for this summer which will eventually turn into a permanent camp for the Big Bend Scouts to be used the year round, it was stated this week.

**EAGLE PASS GUIDE**—A total of 1,200 immunizations against typhoid fever have been given pupils in schools of the Eagle Pass Independent School District, it was announced this week by Mrs. Beatrice Wagoner city-county health nurse.

In addition, Mrs. Wagoner said, approximately 700 small-pox vaccinations have been administered. Vaccinations for both small-pox and typhoid are given free to school children. In Quemado and El Indio, Mrs. Wagoner said, immunization shots are

offered free to adults as well as children.

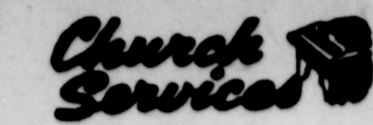
