Sanderson's Newest Cafe to Open Monday Morning

Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Holt, who recently purchased the building and equipment that was formerly occupied by the HiWay Cafe, and is located next door to the Times office, announce this week that they will open their cafe for business on next Monday, July 15 at 6 a. m.

The cafe, to be known as the Club, will be opened daily from 6 a. m. until 10 p. m., for the time being, Mr. and Mrs. Holt state. In the future they plan to stay open 24 hours daily.

For the past month and a half, Mr. and Mrs. Holt have had workmen busy remodeling and painting, both inside and outside, the building and have purchased all new fixtures for their cafe. All new, booths and tables have been placed in the building and the counter, together with a new back bar, has been placed on the West side of the building. A new, all glass, pie case has been bought for use. A new, three gallon, double coffee urn of stainless steel with glass lining has been installed.

The kitchen has been remodeled entirely and a deep freeze has been installed with ample room to store seafoods and other perishable foodstuff. They have also purchased and installed a huge electric ice box to be used for the storage of meats and vegetables. A new steam table has been purchased, and upon arrival will be installed. The new dishwashing equipment meets all sanitary standard required by the State Health department and has a sterilizing vat. At all times hot water will be available through the new automatic water heater.

The Cafe is one of the best and most modern to be found in this section. It is air conditioned throughout.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Holt are experienced Cafe people, having a number of years operated the old Buff Cafe here and at one time was in the Cafe business in Del Rio.

It is their plan to have a great variety of food on hand that is possible to get now, for their patrons, to be served at a reasonable price.

F. T. STOCKTON PIONEER—Malone, C. C., Keith, and Mrs. Mary Mitchell and Clarence Jessup, ranchers in the southern part of the county, delivered better than a 90% lamb crop in the last few days weighing over 60 pounds and selling at 14c per pound.

Since spraying their sheep with DDT out of the shearing pen this spring they have had 8 screwworm cases from shear cuts in their sheep and 20 cases in the corner of the eye due to an irritation and drainage of the eye. The lambs were cut off from the ewes and before returning to the pasture were sprayed with a 5% water base DDT solution. C. C. remarked that DDT is not a cureall, but is very beneficial.

BRACKETT NEWS MAIL—The War Assets Administration has rejected a request that Fort Clark be turned over to the Fort Clark Military Institute.

Representatives of the Institute, who were in Washington, were informed by W. A. A. that bids which have already been submitted by buyers cannot be rejected. 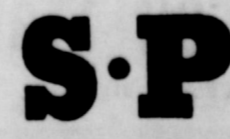

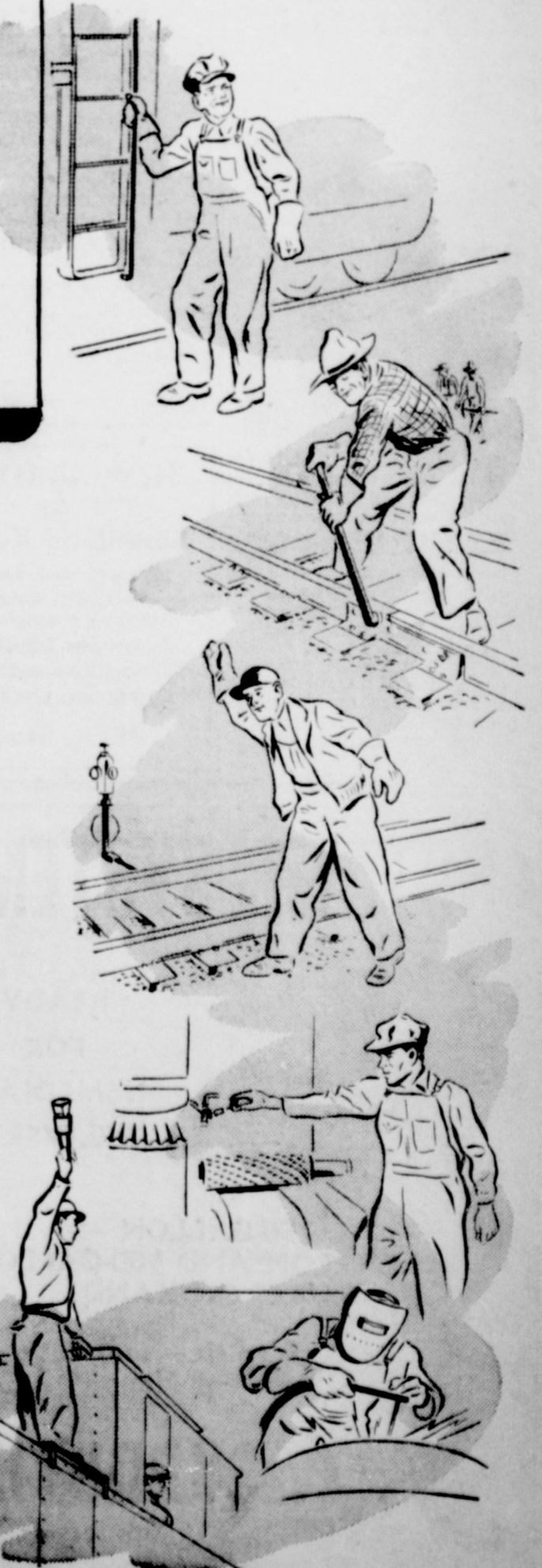

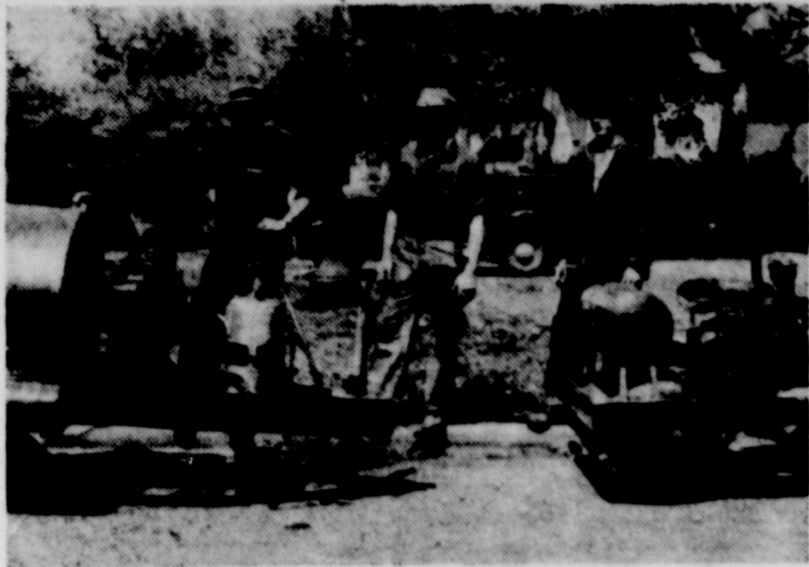
