Rubber Output Would Yield Cable to Moon

Although the age of "inter-planetary cables" of either the rope or radar type—may still be far off, J. W. Robertson, manager of the Sanderson Gulf Station, representative of the B. F. Goodrich Company, said today, enough synthetic rubber was made in the United States last year to have molded a two-inch-thick solid rubber rope that would reach to the moon "and have enough left over to circle the earth at the equator."

Robertson said that was one way of dramatically pointing up the magnitude of the country's feat in turning out some 830,000 long tons of man-made rubber in 1945. It is a greater tonnage than the nation has ever used of rubber, all types, in any previous year—and if all of it could have been put into passenger-car tires there would have been enough for 169 million of them, more than one for

every man, woman and child in the nation. Actual production of every plant in the government wartime synthetic rubber program exceeded its designed capacity, Robertson said, according to word he had received from B. F. Goodrich headquarters in Akron, O. Furthermore, production costs were lower than had been estimated and have been con-

tinually decreasing, and passenger car tires that will actually outwear prewar natural rubber tires are being made 100 per cent from the rubber created "by the juggling of molecules," Robertson said.
