AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 26 .-Contrary to the popular belief that pyorrhea is incurable, this is only true in the most advanced cases. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises those persons who even suspect the presence of pyorrhea to take time by the forelock and seek an early diagnosis from their dentist to that proper treatment can be instituted while the disease is still curable.

Early detection and proper treatment of pyorrhea represent the fomula for a successful cure. This means that the dentist must have an oppurnity to discover the presence of the disease at the earliest possible moment since the symptoms are often so vague that the patient is unaware of its existence," Dr. Cox said. "Regular visits to the family dentist are therefore extremely important.

The treatment of pyorrhea is not an involved procedure. In the average early case one of the main therapeutic features is the proper hygienic care of teeth
