Civil Service Examinations Are Announced

Civil Service Examinations for stenographers and typists were announced today according to a statement made today by Mr. Paul H. Figg, Director, of the Fourteenth U. S. Civil Service Region. Applications must be on file with the Fourteenth Regional office of the U. S. Civil Service Commission not later than December 10, 1946.

Employment will be in various Federal Agencies in the state of Texas. The salary for both Typists and stenographers is \$1,954 per year.

Persons who failed to qualify in the previous stenographer-typist examination should file application for this examination if they wish to compete for probational appointment. Persons who qualified in the stenographer-typist examination announced in March 1946 need not file application for this one.

Application forms and further information may be obtained from the Commission's local secretary, Clyde Griffith at the post office, or from the Fourteenth Regional Office of the U. S. Civil Service Commission at 210 South Harwood, Dallas, Texas.

General Wainwright, the hero of Bataan, congratulated members of the USO Camp Show "Breezing Along" on the "Perfectly wonderful job" USO is doing for the morale of the men in hospitals. He said "USO all over the world has rendered inestimable service to our armed forces. Hostilities have ceased but the USO must carry on."

Referring to the Texas drive to raise its \$800,000 quota of the \$19,000,000 necessary to carry on USO activities in 1947, General Wainwright said "May your campaign be a huge success."

USO activities scheduled to continue through 1947 include 135 USO Camp Shows playing Army, Navy, and VA hospitals and overseas bases, 400 clubs in the United States and in the Pacific areas where the Army and Navy have requested them and hundreds of USO Traveler's Aid Lounges in the United States.

Mrs. A. W. Pope Heads Drive For Overseas Relief

According to an announcement handed the Times office this week, Mrs. A. W. Pope has been appointed as local chairman for the collection of supplies and money to go for Overseas relief to the people that are destitute in the foreign countries due to the ravages of the war.

Mrs. Pope states that it is her plan to contact someone from each of the Sanderson churches and ask that they appeal to their members to give clothing and money donations toward the relief. "We hope to have a fine offering, apart from the clothing, for the purchase of milk etc., for the hungry children overseas," Mrs. Pope stated.

Expect Increase In Fat Salvage

Due to the acute shortage of meat, women have been unable to save and turn in fats to the extent they had during previous months, but with the lifting of price ceilings fat salvage collections should surpass those of recent months. According to the American Fat Salvage Committee, housewives since the start of the program four years ago have been responsible for the recovery of more than five hundred million pounds of fat. This means that even when meat was in such short supply women continued to be conscientious in saving waste fats.

The committee also pointed out that due to the world-wide shortage of fats and with no prospects for early improvement in the situation, the need for fat salvaging is greater than it has been at any time during the war years.

Production of many greatly needed consumer items are dependent on fats. These include soap, pharmaceuticals, automobiles, refrigerators, washing machines, floor coverings and textiles. Every pound of fat turned back to the butcher will hasten the return of these and many other products.

For these reasons American women are urged not only to continue their efforts in salvaging and turning in used fats, but to redouble them.

Crockett Lambs Bo By Plane To Guatemala Ranch

One thousand head of Rambouillet ewe lambs from the Marshall Montgomery ranch in Crockett county are scheduled to be loaded aboard special planes in San Angelo Monday morning for air transport to Guatemala, Central America where they will range on lands of a Guatemalan coffee plantation owner.

The lambs were being sheared, vaccinated and drenched at a San Angelo sheep yard this week preparatory for shipment to the Central American country. They are scheduled to be loaded aboard planes at Mathis Field in San Angelo beginning next Monday morning.

The lambs were purchased by Enrique Asturias, coffee plantation owner and ranchman of Guatemala City, and his nephew, Antonio Najera, also of Guatemala. They plan to load from 200 to 240 head of lambs to each plane.—Ozona Stockman.

Hunters Bag 389 Antelope During Season Just Closed

Four hundred forty-nine hunters bagged a total of 389 antelopes during the third open season on the animals in the West-of-the-Pecos county. Capt. Ray Williams of the State Game Dept. said this week.

Either the nimrods were better hunters or the hunting was better in Brewster county this year than elsewhere, as only nine of the 125 were unsuccessful, Capt. Williams reported.

On hunt No. 2, Presidio and Jeff Davis counties, a total of 238 hunters bagged 196 antelopes and on hunt No. 3, Hunsdeth and Culberson counties, 86 hunters brought in a total of 77.

Statistics show that 84 per cent of the hunters were successful this season as compared to only 73 per cent last year when the hunts were hampered by unfavorable weather.

Total number of hunters in 1945 was 325 with a kill of 281.

Although rain fell practically all during the season just closed, the days were generally clear enough to afford good hunting conditions, Capt. Williams reported.—Alpine Avalanche.

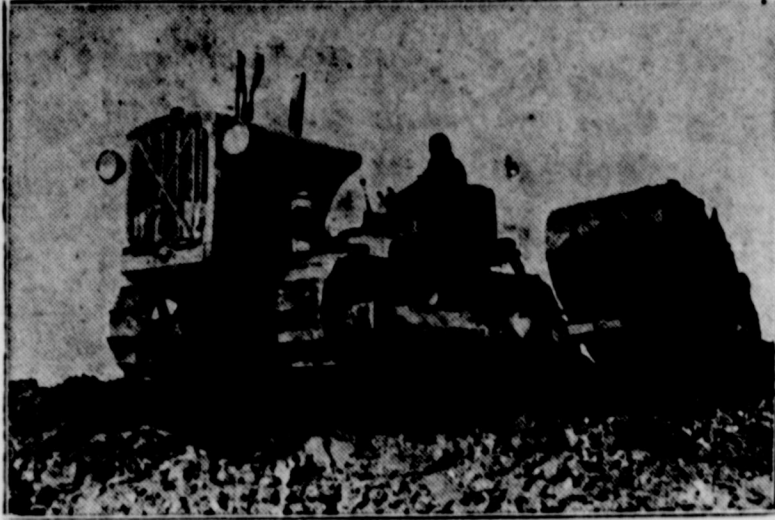

Ranch dams will aid in controlling water and help prevent erosion in drainage areas, says Chairman Alfred A. Shelton of the Terrell County Agricultural Conservation Association Committee.

A practice of the 1946 Agricultural Program is available to assist Terrell County ranchers in this valuable method of conservation, he points out. Dams conserve water and prevent erosion caused by water runoff. In addition, widespread use of dams will help solve our flood control problems.

Conservation of water is important for livestock on ranges and pastures. More water facilities insure wide spread grazing and cut over-grazing around existing water. This is a valuable conservation gain. Pasture and ranges that are too heavily

grazed lose their protective cover and become erosion hazards.

The expense of these necessary conservation devices is borne by both the rancher and the government. The Government's Agricultural Conservation Program pays ranchers ten cents (\$.10) per cubic yard for dirt moved in the construction of spreader dams. All dams that contain over 3,000 cubic yards of dirt will be paid for at the rate of 8c per cubic yard for each yard over the 3,000 limit.

"It all adds up to better soil and good improved health for the nation," the Chairman said. The County Committee will help ranchers decide where dams should be located for best conservation purposes, he added. The committee will also arrange for laying out the dam site.

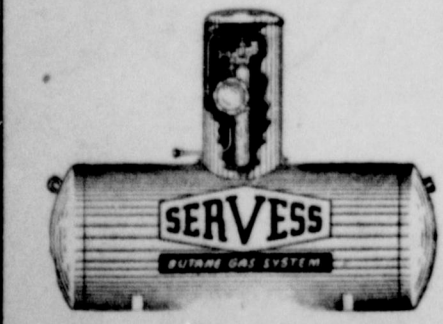
