## Special Election Triple A Board to Be Held Soon

Members in Terrell County receive notices within the next few days about the annual elections of the county trustees, Alfred A. Shelton, chairman of the County Trust Committee said.

In the forthcoming election voters will elect three commissioners as well as two alter-

ations said that approximately 75 ranchers in Terrell County are eligible to vote in the elections this year. Eligible voters are those who are holding in the 1946 Agricultural Conservation Program.

The construction work will start at the bridge east of town that is over Sanderson Canyon and will follow along the north side of the creek and along the hillside and a combination bridge and overpass will be constructed over the T. & N. O. Railroad at a point about 2.6 miles east of here.

There will be at different times, during the minstrel, an auction on many scarce items a list of which will be announced later.

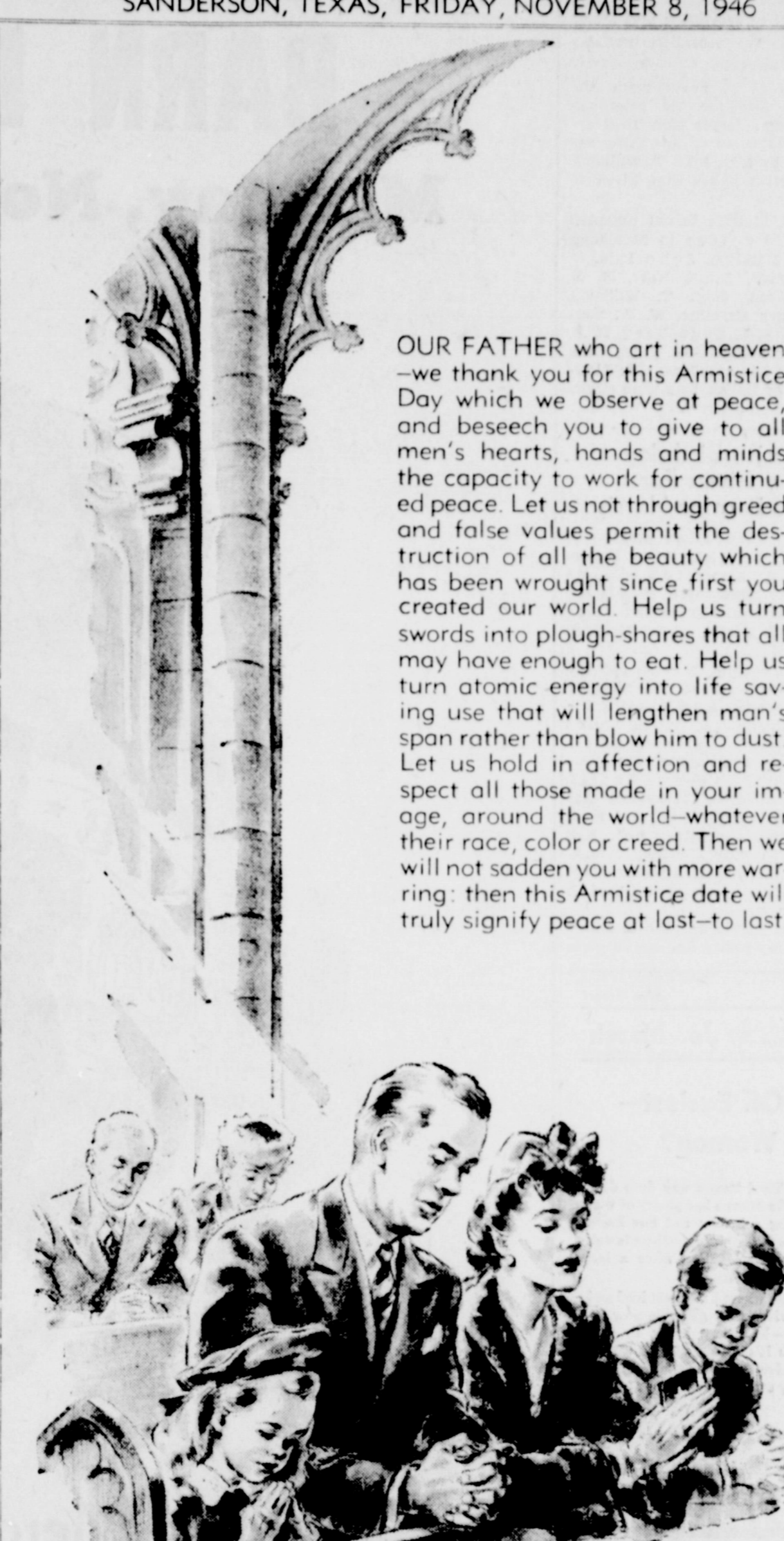
The entire proceeds of this entertainment will be donated to the high school athletic fund and will be applied to the cost on completing the football stadium.

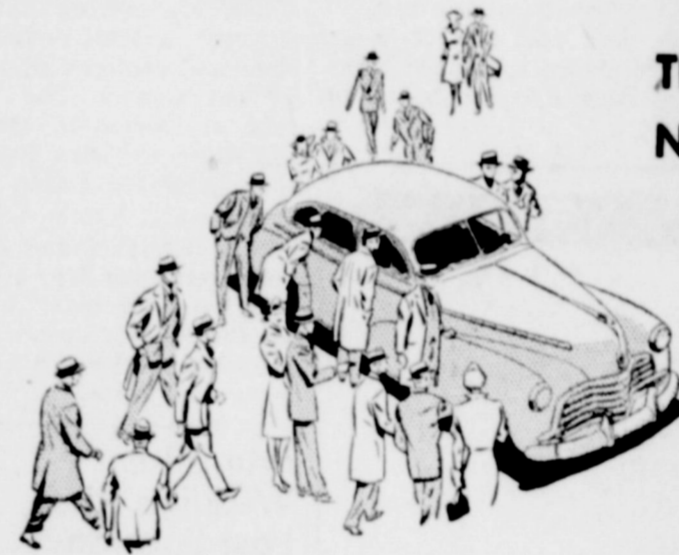
