AUSTIN.—All state offices will be officially closed for the Christmas holidays from noon December 21 until the morning of December 27, the state board of control announced today.

Offices will close only one day for New Year's.

District Judge, District Attorney Are Appointed

On Tuesday of this week, Gov. Coke Stevenson, announced the appointment of Roger H. Thurmond, of Del Rio, district attorney of the 63rd Judicial District, to be district judge.

Thurmond has already qualified for the office and succeeds Brian Montague, of Del Rio, who resigned to enter the private practice of law. He will fill the unexpired term of Montague which will run two years.

A graduate of the Del Rio high school, Thurmond attended Texas A. & M. College and then rounded out his formal education with four years in the University of Texas. He is also a former county judge of Val Verde County and a former member of the State Legislature serving as a representative of the 87th Legislative District in which Sanderson is located.

The new district judge of the 63rd Judicial district has served almost eight years as district attorney for the same district. This district included the counties of Terrell, Val Verde, Maverick, Edwards and Kinney.

Thursday, Gov. Coke Stevenson announced the appointment of W. P. Wallace, Jr., of Del Rio to fill the post of District Attorney for the 63rd Judicial District, which became vacant when Roger Thurmond, who formerly held the office was appointed a district judge.

Wallace has been associated with Thurmond in the law firm of Wallace and Thurmond.

He served as county attorney of Val Verde County for more than two years, having been elected in 1932 and having resigned in 1937, before the expiration of his term.

Thurmond was re-elected this November as district attorney for a two-year term and it will be this term that Wallace has been appointed to serve.

Competitive Exams For High School Seniors to Be Given

AUSTIN, Tex., Dec. 1.—Competitive examinations will be given in many Texas cities January 18, 1947, for Texas high school seniors or graduates within the age limits for the Navy's new Officer College Training Program.

Successful candidates will be given a four-year college education at government expense and will be commissioned officers of the Regular Navy or Marine Corps, or of the Reserve, upon graduation.

Application forms, which must be forwarded for receipt by December 17, and all information regarding the program may be obtained from Professors of Naval Science and Tactics at the University of Texas, Austin, and Rice Institute, Houston, or from high school principals

which successful candidates attend any university, college or junior college of their choice for two years, take two additional years of flight training and flight duty as midshipmen and become commissioned officers, serve one year on flight duty and then return, if accepted, to designated colleges and universities for two years of further professional education with active duty pay.

Applicants will take the examination in a city nearest their homes. Examinations will be given at Abilene, Alpine, Amarillo, Austin, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Galveston, Houston, Laredo, Midland, Port Arthur, San Angelo, San Antonio, Tyler, Waco and Wichita Falls.

Two programs are offered successful candidates. One is the Naval R. O. T. C. which will be given in 52 colleges and Universities, including the University of Texas and Rice Institute.

The other is the Naval Aviation College Program under

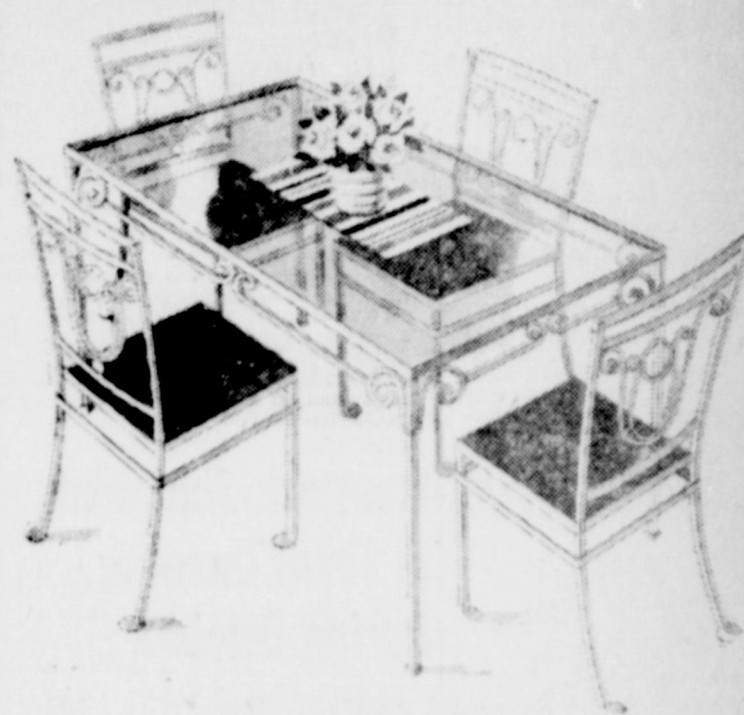

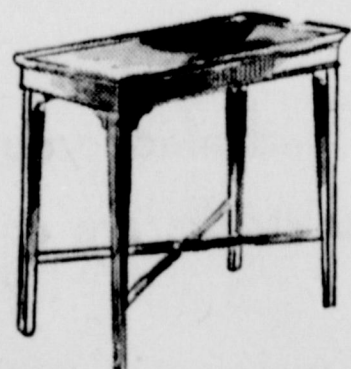

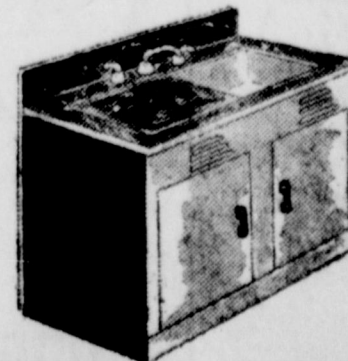

Did you know that Sanderson has had a Parent-Teachers Association since 1911?

Aside from the objects of the Parent - Teachers Association, which are: To promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school church and community.

To raise the standards of home life.

To secure adequate laws for the care and protection of children and youth.

To bring into closer relation the home and the school that parents and teachers may cooperate intelligently in the training of the child.

To develop between educators and the general public such united efforts as well secure for every child the highest advantages in physical, mental, social and spiritual education.

By what ways and what means do we secure these objectives? We make some money each year and try to spend it intelligently.

One half of the money from our dues go to the State Congress of Banquets and Teachers to carry out the same work but on a much larger scale.

The P. T. A. buys their own Year Books too. The last two years \$82.50 was spent for year books.

Also last year the local P. T. A. was host to the Fifteenth District two-day conference. Members felt that the good derived from this conference more than repaid the hundred dollars of expenses.

Early in 1945 about a \$100 was paid for a Ditto machine for the High school.

The Southern School Assemblies programs were brought to Sanderson by the P. T. A. at a cost of about \$250.00. It is true that we did not make money on these programs, but enough was made to pay for the programs.

Also in 1945 of the Elementary school. This year the P. T. A. will spend about \$200 for an all metal slide to be used on the playgrounds.

To the High school Library, \$100 was given by the P. T. A. during 1945-46. Fifty dollars was given the Elementary school Library over the same period.

Thirty-six dollars will be given as room attendance prizes at the end of the school year in 1947.

These are some of the ways the Parent-Teachers Association spends its money. Before the year is out there will be other things.

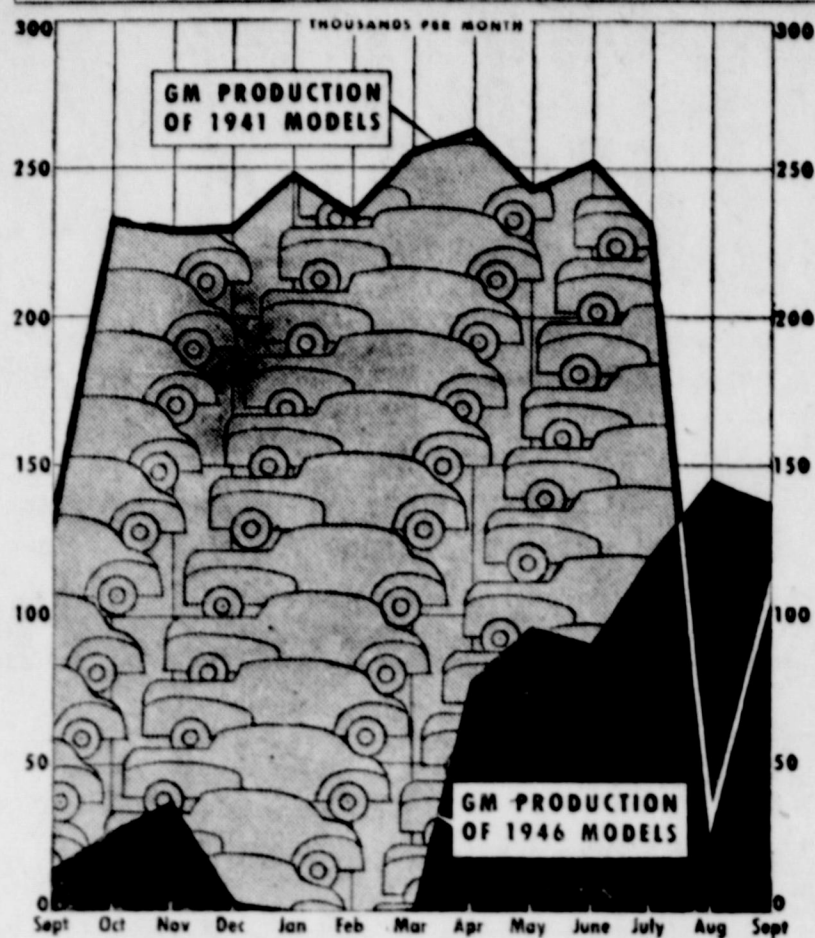

Livestock Shipments In Texas Increase During October

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 30.—Livestock movements in Texas soared to 12,388 carloads in October with the end of meat price control, according to reports received by the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas. The gain over September was 54 per cent with interstate shipments edging up slightly more than interstate shipments.

Compared with October 1945 total shipments of livestock last month were still down 9 per cent. Instate shipments, however, were 5 per cent higher than a year ago while interstate shipments fell 12 per cent.

With the exception of sheep, all types of shipments were heavier in October than in September of this year. Cattle shipments rose 86 per cent. Shipments of sheep were off 46 per cent for the month.

For the 12-month period from October 1945 to October 1946 total hog shipments showed the only increase, a gain of 8 per cent. Shipments of cattle were down 8 per cent, calves 10 per cent, and sheep 14 per cent.

Interstate cattle shipments declined 14 per cent last

Q—If the lender demands some security, can I use the bonds I get for my terminal leave as security for a G. I. loan?

A—No.
Q—Can I use the bonds I get for my terminal leave to pay premiums on my G. I. insurance?

A—Yes. The Act of Congress provides that the veteran may assign his bonds to the Veterans Administration to pay insurance premiums. An amount equal to the insurance premiums on United States Government Life Insurance or National Service Life Insurance will be deducted from the face value of the bond plus interest, each month.

Q—Can terminal leave bonds be used in payment of premiums after the insurance has been converted?

A—Yes.

Partially Disabled Veterans May Enlist In U. S. Army Now

The War Department has announced that Army Recruiting Stations will accept partially disabled veterans who were combat wounded for enlistment in the Regular Army, according to Lieutenant Colonel S. A. Imell, the commanding officer of the local Army recruiting district.

The new policy of the war department is to enlist those partially disabled combat wounded veterans in positions which they are capable of doing normal duties. The new regulation lists more than a hundred military occupational specialties in which partially disabled men can be enlisted.

These trained, but partially disabled veterans can be enlisted in the rank they held at discharge provided they com-

plete their enlistments before the first of the year.

Colonel Imell pointed out that during their periods of military service, these partially disabled men who enlist will be paid the same base pay and allowances of men on full duty status, according to their rank.

However, Colonel Imell said, While a disabled veteran is drawing military pay and allowances, any pensions or other compensations now being received will be discontinued. Complete information can be obtained from U. S. Army Recruiting stations.
