Funeral Services In Ozona Tuesday For Joe Oberkamp

Funeral services were held in Ozona on Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock from the residence for Joe Oberkamp, 67, who died Sunday morning at 11 o'clock in a San Angelo hospital. Rev. H. M. King, pastor of the Ozona Methodist Church, officiated at the services and interment was in the Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of the Ratliff Funeral Home.

Mr. Oberkamp was admitted to the San Angelo hospital early Sunday morning after being rushed there following a heart attack while on a hunting trip near Ozona.

Starting in the plumbing business in Ozona 30 years ago, Mr. Oberkamp built the shop from a business that could have been purchased for \$100 at that time into enterprises in three West Texas cities. His businesses, encompassing plumbing, hardware, furniture, butane gas and appliances, ambulance service, funeral home and a tin shop, were disposed of in 1945, his Ozona place to J. L. Ratliff of Eldorado, his Sonora place to C. A. Tyler and his Sanderson place to O. T. Sudduth.

Mr. Oberkamp, who is survived by his wife, was born in New Braunfels, Sept. 17, 1879, his parents being among the earliest pioneers of Texas.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, the Knights of Pythias and the Woodmen of The World.

Survivors besides the wife include: one brother, Harry Oberkamp of San Angelo; and a sister, Mrs. Ann Isler of Dallas.

Pallbearers were C. A. Tyler, Sonora, Ed Cade, Conley Cox, and Frankie Jones, all of Ozona; O. T. Sudduth and L. M. Stanley of this city; and Woodward Martin and Field Foster, both of Dallas.

Alamo Lumber Co. Buys Property For Business Site

Another large real estate deal was discovered this past week with the purchase by the Alamo Lumber Company of the property located on the corner of Oak Street from Mrs. Helen Bondurant. H. A. Finger, local manager of the Alamo Lumber Company, in making the announcement of the purchase stated that the Company will use same as an office and lumber yard.

Plans for the improvements to be placed on the lot, which is 75 by 200 feet, will not be made until sometime in 1947 or as soon as restrictions are taken off of building material.

There is no definite date as to when they will take over the property for a business site and will continue to rent the residence that is now on same. The home that is located on the property is one of the oldest in Sanderson and is known as the old Ed McGinley home. The grounds is one of the most beautiful in town having large trees and shrubbery planted on same as well as grass.

Construction Work On Highway East Of Town Underway

Work has been started on the construction of Highway 90 east of town. Included in the work will be the re-routing of the road and the building of a bridge and an bridge-overpass.

Members of the Harry Newton Construction have been here for several weeks setting up road machinery and getting ready for the construction work which will require about a year to complete. Actually work was started this past week.

The crew for the present is working Sanderson canyon in the vicinity of the Last Chance where a bridge will be put across the canyon. A carload of cement has been received and it is thought that by the end of the week that the piers for the bridge across the canyon will be ready to pour the cement. It will require 15 carloads of cement for the two bridges and overpass, which will be completed first and the engineer on the job hopes to have additional cement here by the time it is needed for pouring.

The contract called for 3482 miles of road to be constructed with the road construction being started at the present bridge that is over Sanderson Canyon in the east part of town. The road is being re-routed to go east of the present road.

The school is being operated under the Government program and some twenty Terrell county boys, all former members of the armed forces are learning to fly.

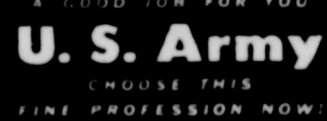

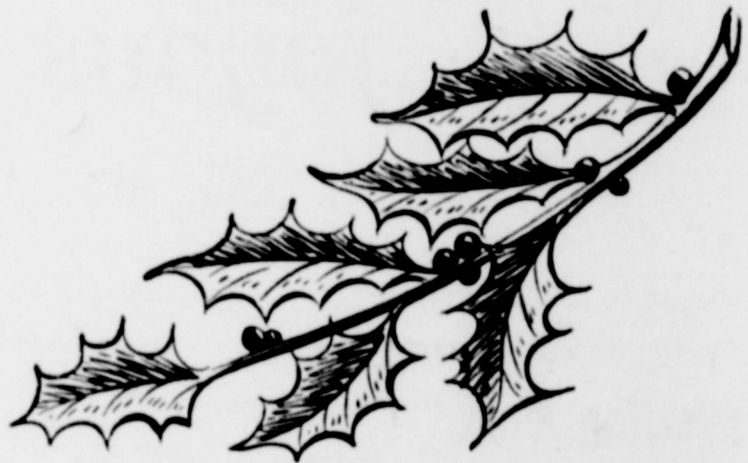

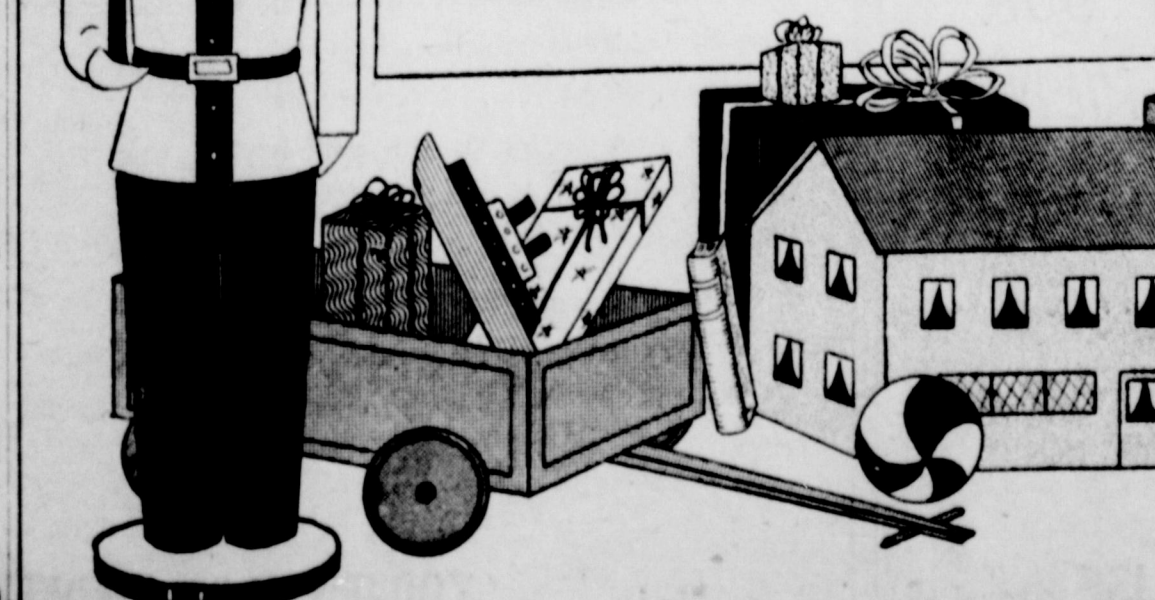

County's Farm Income Shows Large Increase

Nearly doubling their annual gross income in comparison with 1940, as reported by the U. S. Bureau of Census, Terrell County farm families last year produced crops and livestock with the record value of more than \$1,932,000.

This huge increase in farm revenue will undoubtedly result in heavy demand for general farm improvements and for home remodeling when materials become more plentiful, according to a study released by the Tile Council of America. With every industry anticipating greater business in the state than before the war, floor and wall tile manufacturers alone expect their sales here to triple in the next few years.

"Increased sales of industrial products mean in turn a new level of prosperity for every local businessman and worker," said D. P. Forst, chairman of the Council's Residential Construction Committee.

Volume of home modernization throughout the country will be greatly stepped up as a result of the present rapid extension of electric service to rural areas, according to the study. Heaviest remodeling demand is anticipated for the installation of running water, tiling of bathrooms and improving kit-

chen layouts, Forst said. Forst also pointed out the need for replacing much of the war-weary machinery on the 117 farms listed for this country in the 1945 census figures. "The demand for new trucks, tractors and other equipment, as well as for home remodeling, demonstrates the importance of the farm market and makes it one which no businessman or manufacturer can afford to overlook," he said.

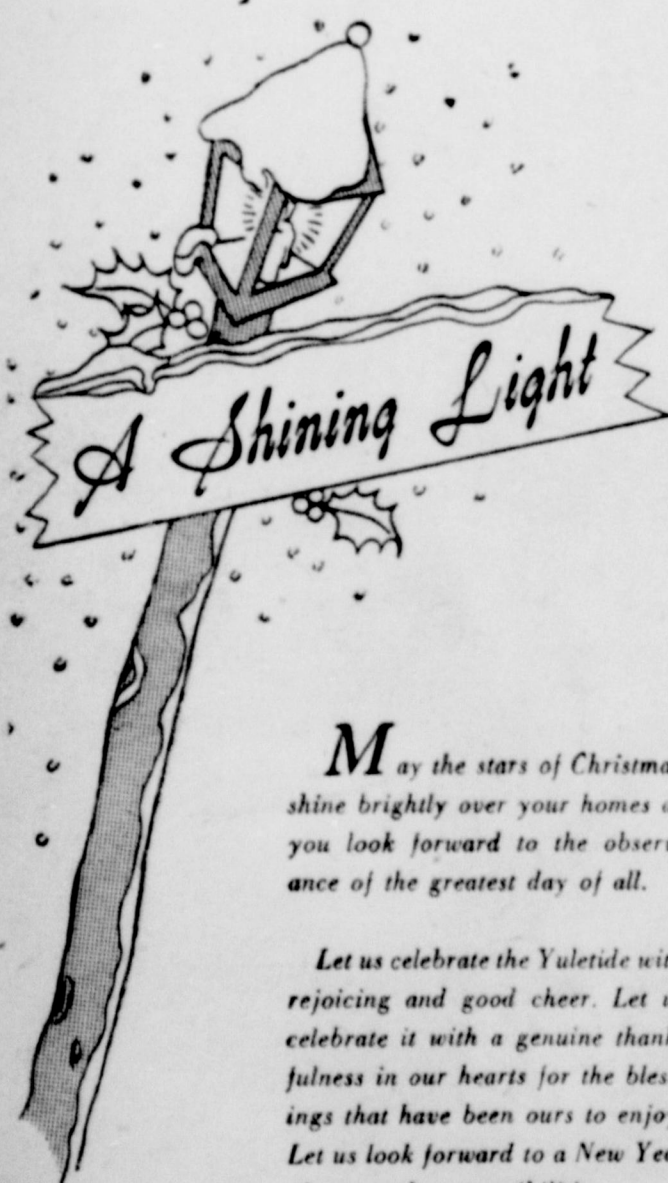

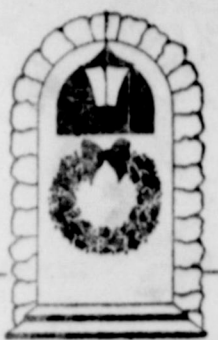

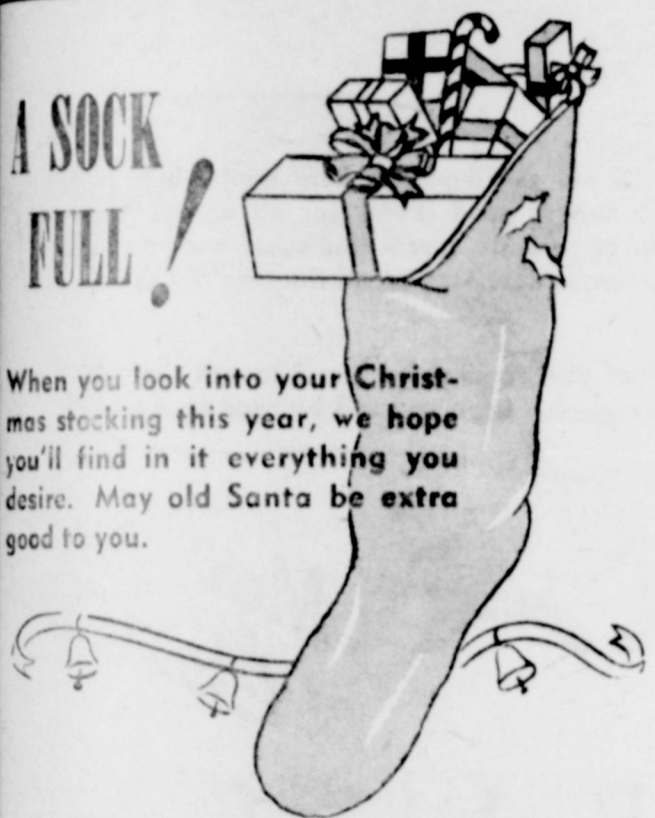

Veterans' News

Q—How many officers does the Veterans Administration have and where are they located?

A—The Veterans Administration has a central office in Washington, D. C., and 13 branch offices located in strategic centers of population. In addition, it has one or more regional office field station or sub-regional offices in each state. Some of these are larger and have wider activities than others but all are charged with the duty of assisting veterans and their dependents.

Q—Are persons who assist in the presentation of pension or compensation claims to Veterans Administration permitted to charge for their services?

A—It is unlawful for any person, whether he be an attorney or agent admitted to practice before the Veterans Administration or not to charge or collect any fee for services in respect to a claim. However, the law provides that the Administrator of Veterans Affairs may by regulation authorize payment of fees in an allowed case to an admitted attorney or agent who has filed a valid power of attorney in that case. Such fees are deducted from the monetary benefits allowed.

Q—What identification data should I give in writing about my claim for benefits administered by the Veterans Administration?

A—If you are making application you should give your full name, grade, organization, serial number, date of entrance into service, date of discharge, and date and place of birth. After the claim is filed it will be assigned a claim number which should be mentioned in all subsequent communications.

Q—Does the name "United States Government Life (converted) Insurance" include "National Service Life Insurance?"

A—"United States Government Life Insurance" is insurance issued to World War I veterans or to persons who applied for same while in active service before October 8, 1940. "National Service Life Insurance" provided for World War II veterans. Each is sometimes referred to as "Government Insurance" and each is administered by Veterans Administration under authority granted by Acts of Congress.

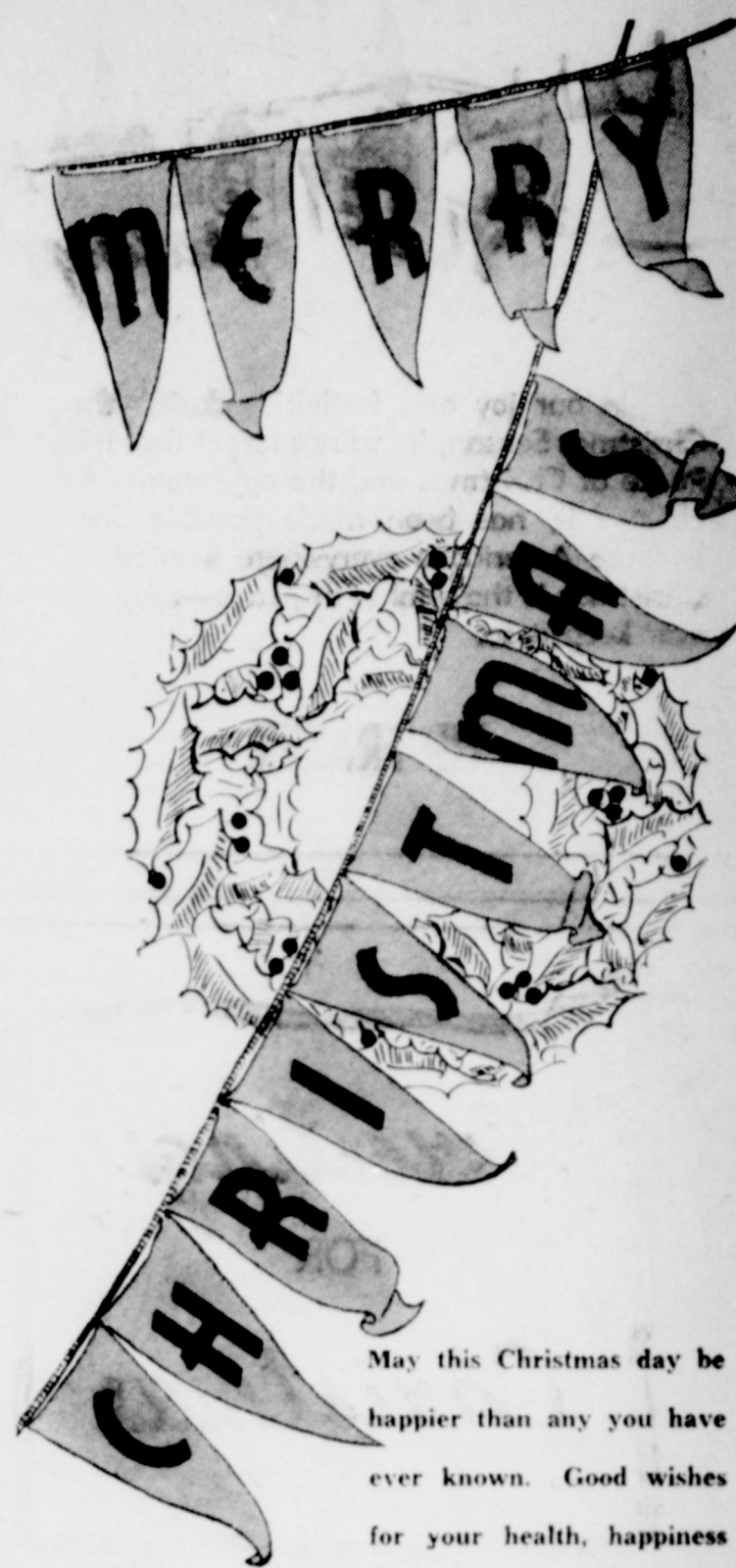

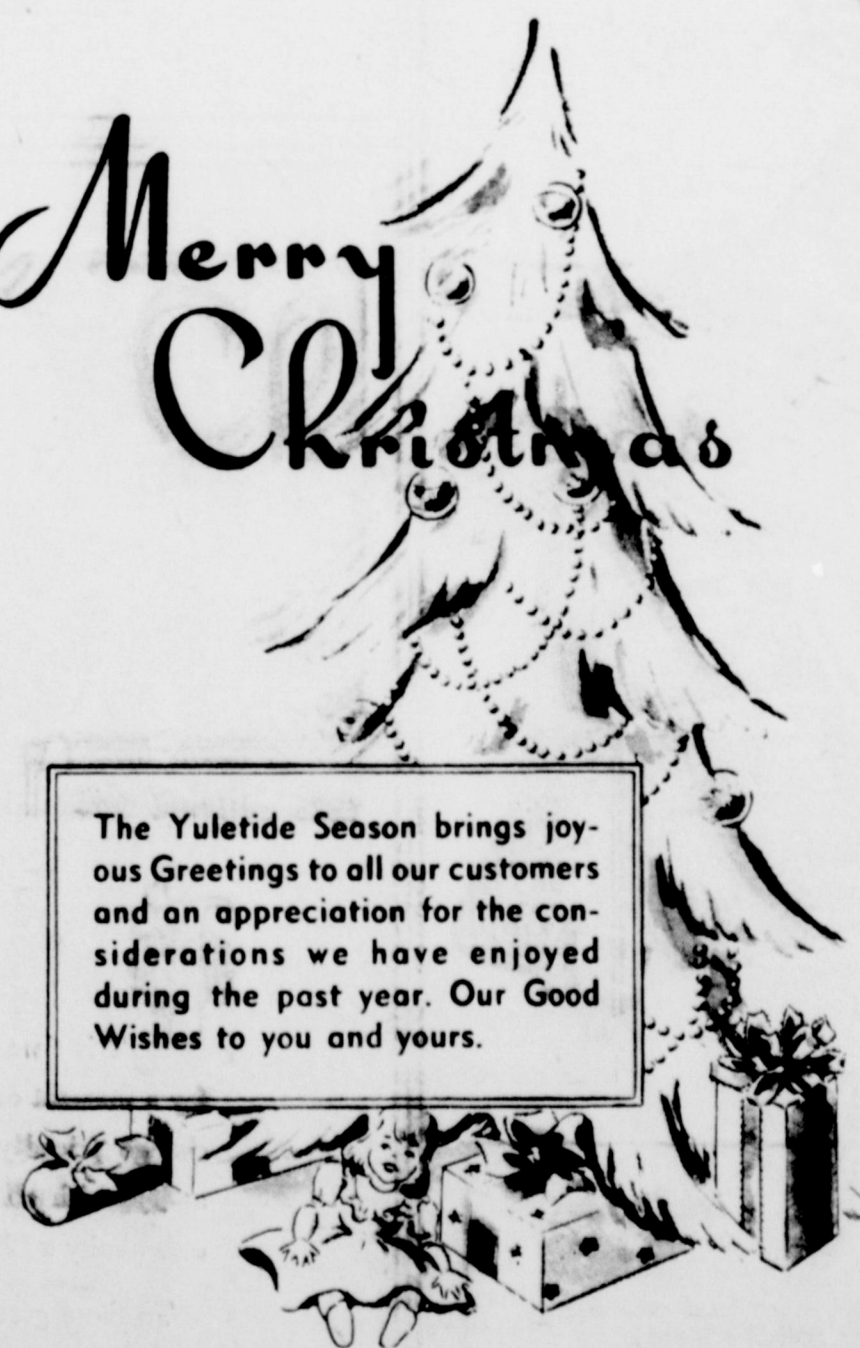

HEALTH NOTES—

AUSTIN, Texas, Dec 19—“Despite the fact that America has her share of post war troubles, this Nation as a whole should not forget the true Christmas spirit of Happiness and Good Will, but we can do that much better if we are well and strong,” asserts Doctor Geo W. Cox, State Health Officer.

“Many people are prone to throw caution to the wind and violate every principal of healthful living during the Christmas season. As a result their health is jeopardized and sometimes serious damage is done, he said.

Doctor Cox pointed out the danger of using lighted candles on Christmas trees or in windows, as a possible source of disastrous fires. Excess eating, crowded home conditions, lack of exercise, and overheated rooms often endanger health during the holiday season, according to Doctor Cox, and he warned parents against too much excitement and too late hours for small children.

“Intemperance during the Christmas week, whether in food or holiday activities is not excusable from the standpoint of good health practice,” he asserted, “and the maximum of pleasure will be gained by those individuals who practice precaution along these lines.”

Emphasizing the fact that it is the duty of every individual to conserve his health as well

as that of his neighbor, Doctor Cox said that from a standpoint of good citizenship along every Texan should cooperate in promoting good health at Christmas time as he would at any other season of the year.

New Industry For Terrell County Has Been Started

A new industry for Sander-son and Terrell county, that of a plant for the manufacturing of concrete blocks, was announced this past week to the Times by W. T. Shurley Jr., of Uvalde, Texas.

Mr. Shurley has been for the past two weeks getting in his plant, which is located on the Joe F. Brown ranch, in readiness and getting a supply of the blocks on hand for those who so desire them for the erection of a home or business place.

Mr. Shurley makes the blocks into two sizes, 8x12x4, and 6x12x4, and also has special corner blocks for each size as well as beam blocks.

In making the announce-ment of his plant, Mr. Shurley states by using the concrete blocks as a building material, one has a fireproof building and eliminates repairs that buildings of other materials require.

Those interested in the con-crete block material are asked to get in touch with Mr. Shur-ley whose telephone number is 98F2.

Mrs. Bird Sells Apple Orchard At Fort Davis

Announcement was recently made in Fort Davis by Mrs. C. H. Bird of the sale of her apple orchard, often referred to as the largest in Texas, to W. A. Baird of Tarpley, Texas.

The area included was 231 acres with 56 acres in apple trees. C. R. Fryar, Mrs. Bird's son-in-law and the orchard manager, states that the trees produced 23,000 bushels of fruit this year. He termed this a bumper crop, but said that larger crops had been produc- ed by the orchard.

The orchard was started by the late C. H. Bird who came to Ft. Davis in 1903. In 1909 he began the development of the orchard, planting trees that year, and in 1913 and in 1923 over as much land as could be irrigated with water available to him from Limpia Creek.

Mrs. Bird has gone to visit her son, Major Charles Bird of the Army Air forces, and his wife in Honolulu. She made the trip from El Paso to the Ha- walia Islands by air.

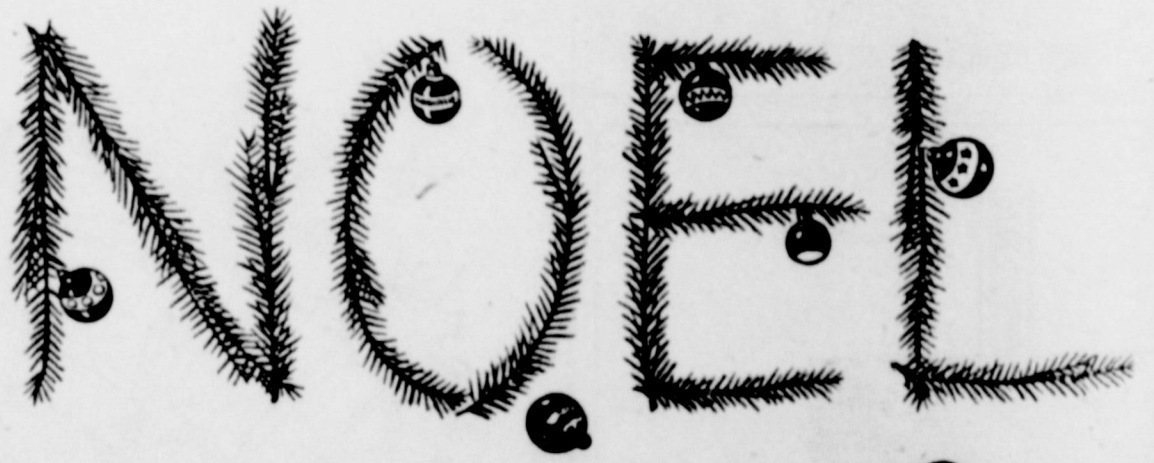
