Government Alone To Return Remains World War II Dead

Warning that individuals who claim to have inside information or influence in the government program to return the remains of World War II dead are "chislers" trading upon the emotions of grieving families, Colonel E. V. Macatee, Commanding Officer, San Antonio General Depot, today outlined the plans as they now exist for the repatriation of our war dead.

Colonel Macatee pointed out that prior to each temporary cemetery overseas being evacuated, the next of kin—wives, children, parents, brothers and sisters will receive an official letter of inquiry and application for disposition of remains for Washington.

Frank Scofield, Collector of Internal Revenue, cautioned tax payers today not to confuse pending tax legislation in Congress with the 1946 income tax returns which must be filed not later than March 15 by every person who had \$500 or more income last year.

The Collector pointed out that, if any changes are made in the tax laws, the changes will apply only to 1947, and therefore will not alter in any way the filing of last year's return due March 15.

Veterans' News

Q—Before his death, my husband received a pension from Veterans Administration. Am I entitled to this pension now that he has passed away?

A—You may apply for a widow's pension. Your eligibility will be determined on application.

Q—My son has been totally disabled for the past five months. I would like to know if he must pay his National Service Life Insurance premiums or is a waiver on these premiums granted automatically?

A—No automatic waiver of premiums can be granted. A veteran must be totally disabled for six months before he is entitled to apply for a waiver of premiums. He may also file claim for refund for those premiums paid from the date on which the waiver was made effective. A beneficiary of an insured veteran likewise is entitled to file a claim for a refund if the insured had been totally disabled for six months or more before his death.

Q—If a veteran and his wife are separated and she receives a portion of his compensation, would she be entitled to widow's pension at his death?

A—A widow may be eligible to full widow's pension even though there was a separation during the veteran's lifetime. If she desires a pension or compensation, she should make application to Veterans Administration.

Q—Is it true that certain types of souvenir weapons must be registered with the Treasury Department?

A—Yes. The Treasury Department states that veterans must register:

- (1) Any weapon capable of firing more than one shot with one continuous pull of the trigger.
(2) A shotgun or rifle having a barrel length of less than 18 inches except 22 or smaller caliber or 22 caliber rifles of less than 16 inches in barrel length.
(3) Any other weapon, except a pistol or revolver, from which a shot may be discharged by an explosive, if such weapon is capable of being concealed on the person.
(4) A muffler or silencer for any firearm.
(5) A pistol with accompanying shoulder stock.

HEALTH NOTES

AUSTIN, Texas, February 20. In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has released the following statement: Every crippled child in Texas, under 21 years of age and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this Division. Crippling conditions which may be treated are Infantile Paralysis, Osteomyelitis, Club Feet, Harelip and Cleft Palate, Burns, Curvature of the Spine, Arthritis, Bow Legs, Rickets, Tuberculosis of the Bone, Flat Feet, Congenitally Dislocated Hip Muscular Dystrophy, Supernumerary Fingers and Toes, Wry Neck, Elephantiasis, Spina Bifida, Brachial Palsy, Potts' Disease, Congenital Anomalies Spondylolisthesis, Amputation, Webb Fingers, Epiphitis, and Sarcoma. Assistance may be obtained by applying to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, or by placing an application through an established city or county health unit. Full information about local groups and organizations throughout the state who are anxious to assist crippled children to establish their eligibility and receive proper care, may be had by writing for a pamphlet, "Handbook on Agencies." Address Crippled Children's Division, State Department of Health, Austin 2, Texas. GI "Cashes In" On Gift He Gave USO 6 Years Ago



Six years ago Andy Flagler, then 12 years old, was canvassing his neighborhood around 1416 Walton Avenue, the Bronx, New York, collecting pennies for USO's first fund campaign. Every boy and girl in his class had been given a little booklet designed to hold 20 pennies, but Andy didn't stop at pennies. "A regular salesman," neighborhood Bronx merchants commented admiringly as the lad sold their customers on the merits of USO collecting enough coins to fill twenty booklets. Now, six years later Private Andrew Flagler, U. S. Marines, at GI's Camp Lejeune, North Carolina is "cashing in" on those coins he collected as a boy. For he visits the USO Club at Jacksonville, N. C. near Camp Lejeune at every opportunity. "What a swell investment that turned out to be," he declares, as he tells two USO hostesses the story of his own private USO campaign drive over a couple of cokes. "I never dreamed, six years ago, that I would be getting this kind of 'interest' in return from USO." USO is now campaigning for funds with which to help men who have recently entered the armed forces, like Private Flagler, as well as hospitalized veterans and GI's overseas.

Development Of Paisano Encampment Grounds Underway

The Baptist state convention has made immediately available the \$50,000 pledge some time back for the development of an all-summer program at Paisano Baptist encampment, is was announced this week. The convention voted at a meeting held last December to spend \$150,000 on the program, over a period of three years. Since then Paisano has been approved as the site for an all-summer program by the Southern Baptist convention at a meeting held in Nashville, Tenn., but no funds have been appropriated by that body. Texas Baptists have decided to proceed with the development, regardless of future action of the Southern convention group in giving financial assistance, it was stated. Dr. Clifton, pastor of the First Baptist church, McKinney, has been employed as supervisor of the encampment project and is expected to be here on the job some time next week and start plans for the immediate development program. 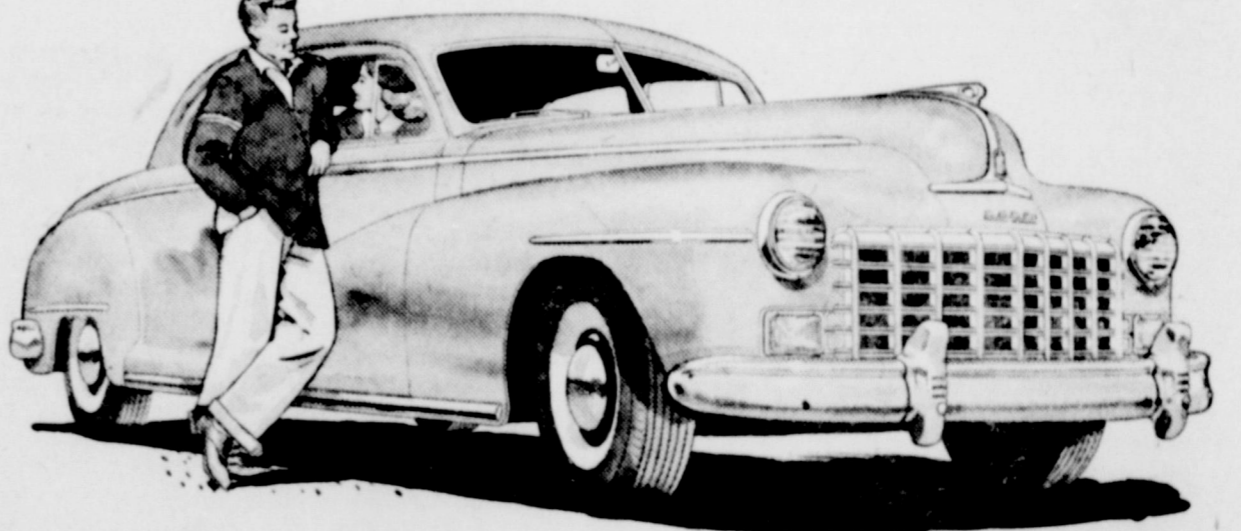
