Ole Man Winter Comes Back To Take Control

A howling norther, with swirling snow and antler-freezing temperatures, roared through the area Tuesday morning and reminded Frionans that spring is still several weeks away.

Coming on the heels of an unusual stretch of warm weather, the blast sent temperatures toward the zero

mark Tuesday after a warm Monday.

One earlier riser reported his thermometer showed a warm 48 degrees at 5 a. m. Tuesday. By noon the mercury

had dropped into the teens. About three inches of snow had fallen in Friona by press time Tuesday night and weather forecasters were warning of a severe ice storm and cold wave.

AT FARWELL--

Sheriff Reports Two Break-Ins

Two break-ins occurred in Farwell during the past week, reports Parmer County Sheriff Chas. Lovelace.

State Line Grocery was broken into Thursday night and O. C. Pullam's Gulf Service Station was burglarized Sunday night.

Entrance to both businesses was gained by breaking windows, and only small change and cigarettes was reported missing.

Both break-ins were probably committed by the same persons, Lovelace says.

In other activity for the sheriff's department during the past week, Charles Douglas Norman was brought to Farwell from Amarillo to face charges of forgery.

Norman and two other men, who have not yet been apprehended, allegedly passed a forged check at Holiday Stores, Inc., in Farwell on December 27. Norman was returned to Farwell by Sheriff Lovelace.

His bond was set at \$1,500 Friday by justice of Peace J.R. Thornton and he has been bound over to the grand jury.

Junior Bluejacket, a 40-year-old Oklahoma man is sitting out in the Parmer County jail this week after being convicted of driving while intoxicated. Bluejacket was picked up north-east of Bovina by Deputy Henry Minter.

He was tried by County Judge Loyde Brewer, fined \$100 and court costs, sentenced to 3 days in jail and had his driver's license suspended for six months.

Friona Jaycees issued a request for unused cross ties and usable hog wire for use in erection of their rodeo arena following a Tuesday night meeting.

The arena will begin to take shape as soon as weather permits more work to be done on the project. Land has been secured and an arena was purchased from Hereford, moved here and will be erected soon.

Ray Has Top Lamb At Hereford Show

Friona FFA boys brought home a large assortment of trophies from the Junior Livestock Show conducted at Hereford last weekend.

Charles Ray's lamb took the only first in an entire class although several animals from the local chapter were judged best in their respective weight groups.

Craig Coon won the showmanship trophy of the entire show, which was a merit valued by the local chapter about on the level with a grand champion animal.

Coon showed hogs and a steer. His entry in swine competition won first place in the heavy-weight division of Duroc competition. His lightweight steer took fourth place at Hereford and was entered this week in the Amarillo Livestock Show where it placed fifth in a significantly larger class.

Also this week in the Amarillo show, Fred Ferguson showed the fifth and sixth place lambs in Southdown competition, with Maynard Greeson placing seventh.

Dwight O'Brien's Shropshire was judged second best among entries of that breed.

In the Hereford show, Keith Blackburn's entry was judged second in the lightweight division of Hampshire Competition. Danny Carmichael brought home a third place award taken in the lightweight division among Durocs.

Tommy Tatum's steer placed third in the middleweight division. Larry Hough's Hampshire placed fourth in the heavyweight division of that breed.

Danny Carmichael's entry was judged third among heavyweight entries in the Duroc class.

Greeson took a third place with his Southdown lamb and Jim Row Welch had a lamb that placed fifth in the other breeds and crosses class.

Eric Rushing showed two barrows that placed fourth in light and heavyweight divisions among Durocs.

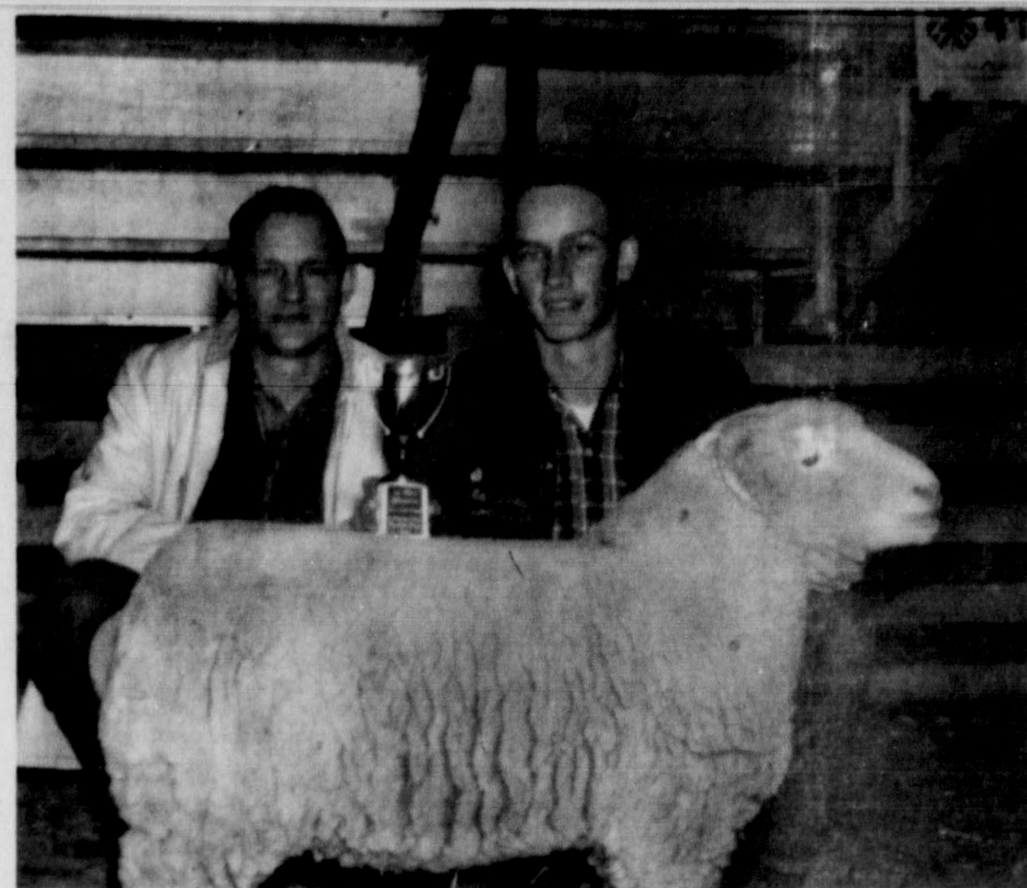
Ray's lamb was judged champion in the division set aside for other breeds and crosses. His lamb was one of more than 100 animals sold Saturday at the auction.

It was purchased for \$126 by the High Plains Savings and Loan Association. Tom Foster of Lazbuddie FFA, whose lamb was judged champion of Shropshire, Hampshire and crosses division received \$97 for his champion from Friona State Bank.

A majority of other Friona animals were also sold in the auction, but their prices and buyers were not learned. Some of them, especially steers were kept by their owners. They will be shown at other shows this season, notably Amarillo and Houston.

Agriculture teachers J.C. Lane and D.T. McVey expressed satisfaction over the showing made by members of the local chapter.

One 4-H member, Rickie Coon, also fared well in the show taking honors in swine competition.

Scout Campaign Slated For Feb. 3 Kickoff

Plans for the Boy Scouts Capital Funds Campaign are well under way according to Mr. Dan Ethridge, local campaign chairman. The Llano Estacado Council, covering nine counties of the Golden Spread, hopes to raise \$150,000 primarily for the expansion and renovation of facilities at Camp Don Harrington, located thirteen miles south of Amarillo at the head of Palo Duro Canyon.

"This is the first time that the public has been asked to give to capital needs of the Council in its thirty five year history," according to John K. Boyce, Jr., Amarillo, general

campaign chairman. "The record of service to youth of the Llano Estacado Council is unexcelled anywhere in the nation. In the past ten years we have increased our boy membership by 95 percent, our Cub Pack, Boy Scout Troops, and Explorer Posts by 104 percent, our attendance at Camp Don Harrington 427 percent and our rate of boys enrolled out of total boys available from 25 percent to approximately 40 percent," Boyce continued.

"The present Kitchen at Camp Don Harrington is so badly in need of renovation that whether a campaign was held or not something would just have to

be done before another camp season begins. Development of additional campsites, tree planting, erosion control, building cooks quarters, a combination office trading post and storage building and a garage and workshop are among the other items planned in the expansion program," Boyce said.

Friona's part of the campaign will get underway with a Kick-Off tentatively set for Feb. 3.

A Chinese cake auction will precede the game, with classes rather than individuals vying for about 24 cakes. Admission to the game will be a donation to the March of Dimes.

Club Launches Drive For More Members

A "cleanup" membership drive will be launched Tuesday morning by organizers of a Friona Country Club.

Teams composed of two men each will contact prospective members, explaining the particulars of the club.

Organizational work has been accomplished and the club is shooting for a July 4 opening for its nine-hole golf course planned for construction on Frio Draw, just west of town.

A preliminary sketch has also been made of the proposed club house, but plans for it will likely be changed before construction begins.

The club is shooting for a membership minimum of 125. About half that number have already obtained membership. The charter for the club would allow as many as 200 members.

The club will be constructed with the club house and three holes on the east side of Highway 60 and six holes on the west side. Golfers will cross the highway under a bridge. The longest hole will be 525 yards long.

Par will be 36 for the nine holes which will cover an estimated 3,150 yards.

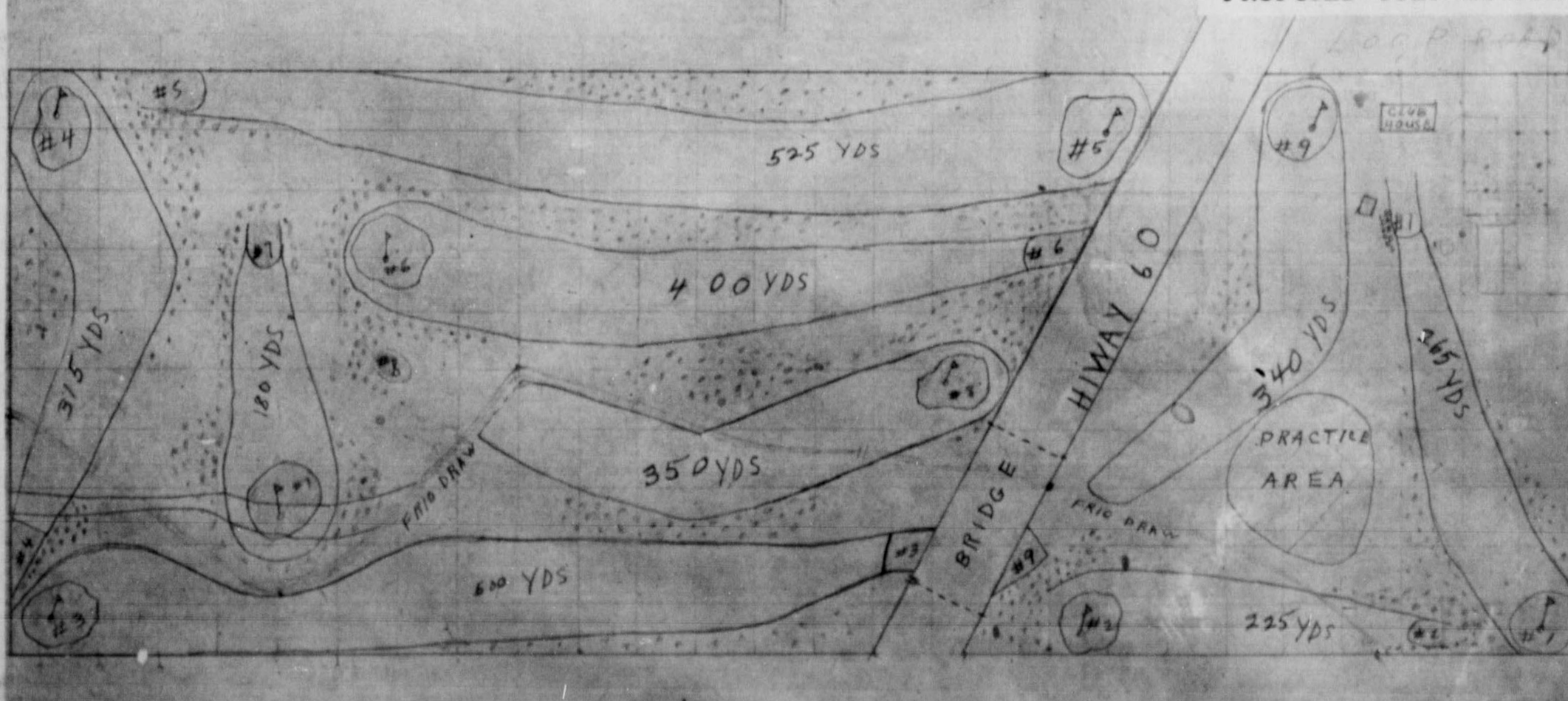

Unemployment in this country is becoming a serious problem as it increases toward the five million mark.

Politicians kick around all sorts of explanations for the cause of this situation. The new administration has indicated it will adopt an inflationary economic policy in an attempt to put the nation's unemployed back to work.

What about the immigrants that come to this country each year, seeking one of those high-paying American jobs they have heard so much about? Well, they are still coming. There are no places for them to find work. They have to compete with those who have lived here all their lives for the job openings that are available.

But the government has ignored this factor that is contributing to the unemployment problem.

While the unemployment figures climb to

a dangerous mark not reached since the final days of the depression, the number of persons who do have jobs has reached an all time high.

Moving a person from a country where job opportunities are scarce to another country where job openings are equally scarce solves nothing. America wouldn't be cold-hearted or brutal if she stopped immigration quotas until there is something here for people to do that come to this "land of opportunity."

The Kennedy administration has indicated it will increase immigration quotas after it is in power. To compensate for this, a system of public works will have to be started, to give these people and those already here who are out of work, something to do. In case you don't know who pays for public works, look at the withholding tax statement in your next payroll check.

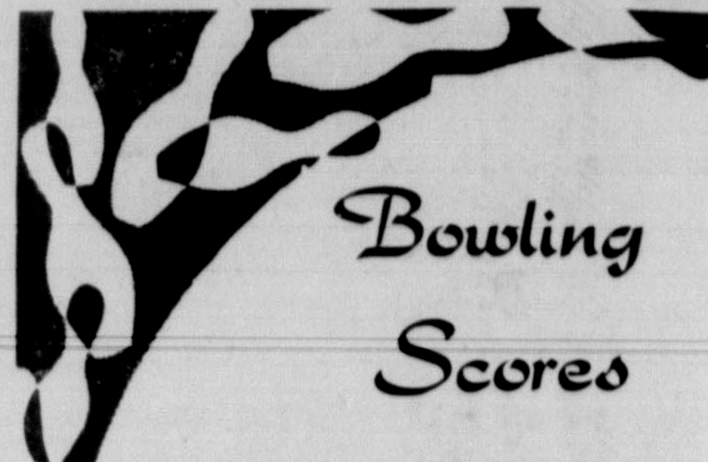

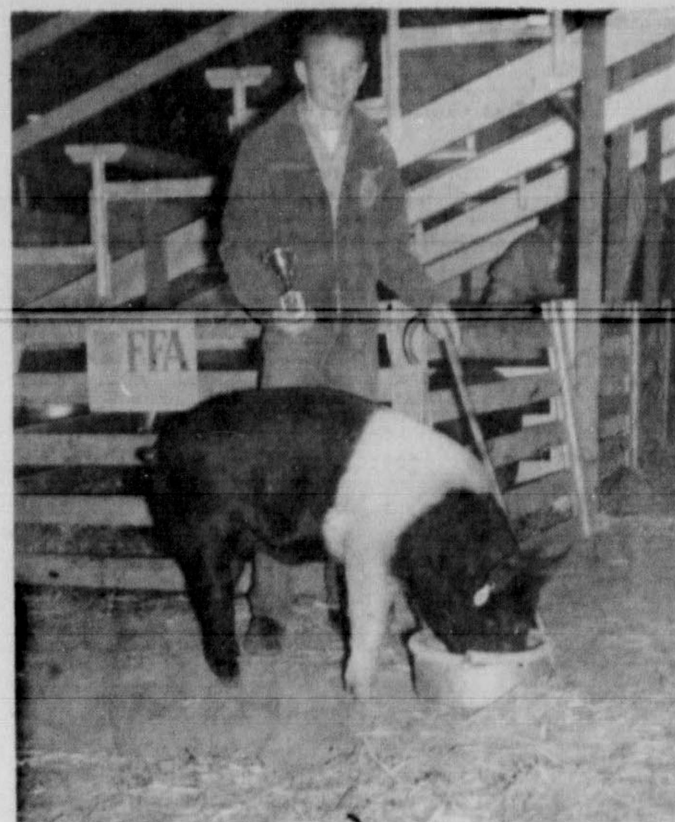

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It's Tax Time!

It's that time of year again. Not only is Uncle Sam breathing down everybody's neck for his share of a person's earnings, but the deadline for paying city taxes, county and state taxes, school taxes and poll taxes is next Tuesday, January 31.

Local taxes not paid by that date will be placed on the delinquent rolls and a penalty and interest will be charged. The penalty for payment during the month of February is 1 1/2 per cent and it increases each month thereafter.

Persons who do not pay their poll taxes by Tuesday will not be afforded the opportunity to vote in any election during the year. There are already several elections slated in this "off year," including a state senatorial election, local, city and school board elections.

Lee Thompson, county tax assessor-collector, says that collections of county and state taxes has been "pretty good" this year, but that there are still many who have not yet paid.

Normally, the early tax collections during October, November, December and January are an indication of economic

conditions in the county. While the collections have been down somewhat from last year, "they

Swift Plant Should Give Area Tremendous Boost

"A tremendous boost to agriculture in this area," has been a widespread reaction to an announcement last week that Swift and Company will locate a new meat processing plant in Clovis.

Construction of the \$2 million plant will probably start sometime this summer and it should be completed within a year from the time that work gets under way.

The official announcement by Swift that it will locate in this area, is the culmination of several months negotiation between the City of Clovis and the major meat packing firm.

There are many ways in which the plant will be a boost to the economy of Curry and Parmer counties, but basically it should increase cattle feeding operations and local utilization of milo and other feed grains produced in this area on a large scale.

"There's no question but what it (the plant) will provide a new supplemental market for locally-grown feed," says J.R. "Bob" Spencer, manager of the Clovis Chamber of Commerce. Local utilization of this area's largest cash crop is something that has long been vital to the region.

In pointing out that increased cattle feeding activity will probably come about in the form of larger feed-lot operations, Spencer says that "I doubt seriously whether it will increase small-scale feeding

operations to any great extent." He explains this by saying that much of the cattle processed by Swift will probably be bought on a contract basis from large feed lots, and also that the same thing which has kept many small cattlemen out of the business in the past will continue to apply.

Spencer cites a situation which came about in the cattle business eight or ten years ago, when the market price suddenly shot downward. "This separated the cattlemen from the sidewalk boys," the Chamber manager says.

However, whether or not the average farmer will get back into the cattle business again, is not of real essence regarding the location of a major packing plant in this area.

The important thing is that the new plant will provide a ready local market for cattle and grain. With a large-scale meat processing plant located in this area, the market for cattle will be here instead of several hundred miles away.

It is expected that initially 1,200 head of cattle will be slaughtered at the plant per week. "This is not too many," Spencer points out and quite likely the plant will soon handle considerably more than that.

Spencer says that, to meet the demand for more cattle, present feed lot operators in the area will probably expand their operations and new feed lots will be started.

"The thing we hope to do now is to encourage more peo-

ple to get into the cattle feeding business," Spencer says. The more local feed lots there are, the more cattle there will be for slaughtering in the new plant.

Because there will be a much greater demand for cattle in this area, the acquisition of the Swift plant is expected to be a big "shot in the arm" to the livestock auction business in Clovis.

Cattle from many other parts of this Southwestern region, which has been going to market elsewhere in the country will now be going to Clovis.

Location of the Swift plant in this area is a step toward the reversal of a condition which has existed for many years. In the past, Texas, New Mexico and other Southwestern states have raised the cattle and shipped them to the Midwest, where they were fed out with corn and sent on to the larger meat processing plants like those in Chicago.

Also, the large amounts of grain sorghum produced in this area have also been shipped to other areas where these feeding operations have been carried on, and eventually some of the finished product would be shipped back to this area in the form of U.S. good, U.S. choice and U.S. prime meats.

Local independent packers have helped to remedy this situation some, but this is the first time that a major packing plant has decided to locate here. The market that the Swift company will serve, according to an announcement from the company, is that of the far Southwest.

In other words, no longer will as many cattle and feed grains produced in this area, be shipped to other areas for processing.

A statement from the Swift company said that the Clovis unit "will provide a very efficient marketing channel for the increasing volume of fed cattle produced in Eastern New Mexico and West Texas, and

will help supply the rapidly expanding demand for meat in the far Southwest.

Spencer says that the civic leaders in Clovis and the state of New Mexico, in acquiring the Swift plant, are "naturally hopeful" that it will do great things for the area. As to just how much of a boost it will be to the area, "We'll just have to wait and see," Spencer says.

Joe Jones, the Parmer County agent, was contacted this week and asked about the proposed construction of the new plant. "It's only natural that it will be a real boost to the area," Jones says.

He points out that it will be a ready market for our cattle and grain, and that the new plant will afford farmers a chance to produce ensilage as well as other feed stuffs which can be utilized in the new operation.

It's better to process the cattle here, where we have the feed, than to ship them off somewhere else, Jones explains.

Grain Sorghum Demonstration Result Released

Results of two grain sorghum variety demonstrations in Parmer County were disclosed this week by Parmer County Agent Joe Jones.

PAG 665, which yielded 7,737 pounds per acre and test weighed 55.8 was the variety that fared best on a test plot at the farm of Bob Riethmayer. RS-610 yielded 7,540 pounds and test weighed 56 pounds in a similar demonstration on the Melvin Sachs farm.

Both of these test plots were located near Friona. The purpose of these demonstrations was to compare various hybrid varieties, yields and characteristics under as near similar conditions as possible.

The demonstration blocks on the Riethmayer farm were all harvested after the storm which lashed the area in October, the cutting dates being October 29-30-31. The land was pre-watered in March and the crop was watered three times after it was up.

All 12 varieties were seeded May 25 at a rate of 8 pounds.

They were all planted in double rows on ground which had received 82 pounds of fertilizer.

The demonstration on the Sachs farm had 24 one-half mile rows of each variety, except for the 660 and 650 plots, which had eight row plots. The land was not pre-irrigated but had three post irrigations.

Seeding date for all 15 varieties was June 16-17. Seeding rate was 10 pounds per acre, it was planted in double rows and had fertilizer application of 60 pounds nitrogen.

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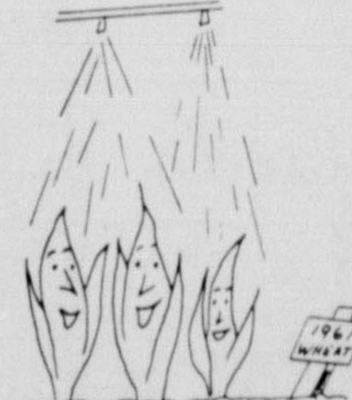

Miss Love is the girls basketball sponsor and the junior class sponsor.



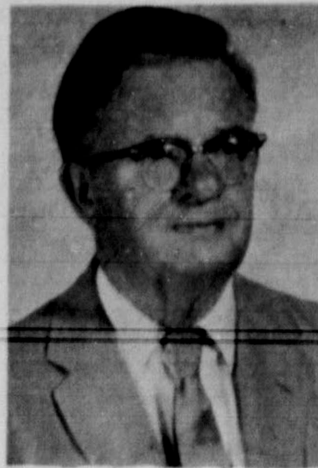

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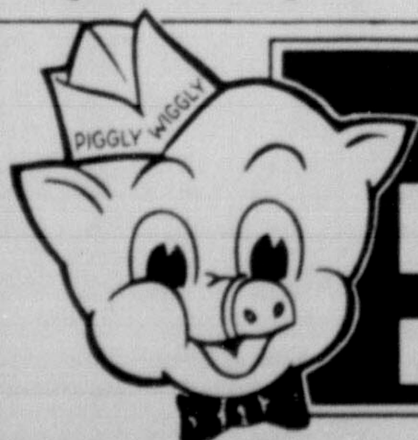
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
