OFFICERS RETURN PRISONER TO FACE MURDER CHARGE

Sheriff Richard Hoskins, Deputy Sheriff Percy Waters and Coroner Alva Hooper, of Nevada County, Calif., arrived in Sanderson Monday about noon and left on the return trip in about two hours. They had come to return Joseph Leslie Hardy, 24, who was an escaped prisoner from that California county jail. He and his common law wife, Lois Hunt, were being held for the murder of J. L. Martin, at Hirschdale, Calif., on November 17.

The pair was alleged to have lured the elevator operator to a lonely woods nearby where he was shot to death while the girl was caressing him. Lois Hunt is now on trial as an accomplice in the murder.

Hardy was arrested here by Sheriff Jim Nance after he was apprehended in the theft of cash and other items from the burning cafe in the T&NO depot on the night of December 4.

Man's peculiarities pop up in the darndest places and he seems to reserve a hunting trip into the fields and woods for some of his silliest traits.

The same man who would holler to high heaven at the mere thought of flying with an experienced pilot will hunt with a companion who is positively ignorant of the hunting sport. He will endanger his own life and the lives of others without a second thought.

Each of these neophytes cause hundreds of accidents. The National Rifle Association, in surveys conducted during the past years, has proven that the vast

majority of mishaps in the field are caused by ignorance of the equipment involved and of the habits of the quarry he is following.

One "zany" in Maine last fall was sure a black bear he was following had sought refuge in a hollow tree. He not only built a fire in the tree but threw in a couple of 30-30 cartridges to shoot the critter out. While he

If you intend to go hunting this season, make sure you know your gun and ammunition. Keep your gun clean. Make sure you are using the right cartridge in the right gun. Read the direc-

tions on the ammunition box amateur can't improve on it. Do not tinker. The manufacturer knew how to build that gun and make it safe for everybody. An amateur can't improve on it. Do not take chances with a foreign gun. Have it thoroughly checked and examined by a competent gunsmith before firing it.



KAISER PREDICTS 300,000 OUTPUT FOR NEXT YEAR

WILLOW RUN, Mich., Dec. 15. —The Kaiser-Frazer Corp. has raced past the production milestone of 1000 cars a day.

"During 1947 the company kept boosting output to roll out approximately 145,000 units, making it the world's fourth largest manufacturer of passenger cars, according to Edgar F. Kaiser, vice-president and general manager.

"Earnings for 1947 will approach the \$19,000,000 figure and about cancel out the expenses of the tool-up year. Achievements in manufacturing and sales this year have turned Kaiser-Frazer into a profitable company," he said. Starting-up costs had caused it to show a \$19,284,000 loss in 1946.

The huge Willow Run plant is being geared up to turn out more than 1,500 cars a day by next summer. The next new model will be a convertible to be produced in mid-1948.

The company at the same time is advancing plans to open an assembly plant in Long Beach, Calif., to serve its flourishing western markets, he said.

Willow Run — converted from post-war idleness into the world's largest auto plant under one roof — now is employing more than 15,000 workers in direct operation, plus 4,000 in branch plants and tens of thousands through supplier factories and dealers, Mr. Kaiser said.

Kaiser-Frazer dealers have an aggregate investment that exceeds \$200,000,000 and the dealer organizations are being expanded to market twice as many cars in 1948, Mr. Kaiser recounted.

In excess of \$10,000,000 worth of parts and accessories have been placed in 146 distribution points dotting the nation. The service departments of dealers are being expanded still further to serve the Kaiser-Frazer owners who are increasing by the thousands each month, he reported.

Kaiser-Frazer executives named a combination of factors when asked for the secret of 1947

accomplishments — unparalleled in American history.

"First — shortages of materials and parts had to be licked. Skeptics claimed these shortages were insurmountable. Several plants were acquired and expeditors and management worked night and day. The result: 1947 production multiplied the 1946 output of 11,754 cars by more than 12 times.

"But, of course, the biggest key to success was in offering America's first real post war car, with beauty of styling and lines that the whole industry is copying; roominess; roadability, safety and ease of driving, and economy in use of gas."

"Kaiser-Frazer leased the Detroit engine plant of Continental Motors Corp. It tripled production from 200 engines a day to more than 600 a day at the Detroit Engine Division in December and substantial expansion is now under way. K-F also gets engines from the Contin-

ental plant in Muskegon. To help relieve the nation's desperate shortage of steel, Kaiser-Frazer opened or expanded several sources of supply in addition to its Portsmouth Steel commitments acquired in 1946. It bought the Indianapolis steel

rolling mill of the Chapman-Priece Steel Company and the Round Oak Stove Company and its foundry at Dowagiac, Mich. A blast furnace was also acquired at Struthers, Ohio, and improvements made for greater

output. Other investments have been made in sources of pig iron. During 1947 all automotive assets of the Graham-Paige Motors Corp. were purchased by Kaiser-Frazer.

The deluxe Frazer Manhattan was introduced in March and became "America's largest selling fine car." Willow Run employees share the unique Kaiser-Frazer Security Trust Fund plan by which

the company sets aside for employees \$5.00 for each car shipped. Mr. Kaiser today said that relations with employees at Willow Run and other plants are good.

Martha Logan's Recipe for MINCEMEAT

| 1 pound cooked beef shank, chuck, or neck meat | 1 1/2 pounds brown sugar |
| 1 cup meat stock | 1 quart cider |
| 1/2 pound suet | 2 teaspoons salt |
| 4 pounds apples | 2 teaspoons nutmeg |
| 1/2 pound currants | 2 teaspoons cloves |
| 1 pound seeded raisins | 3 teaspoons cinnamon |
| | 5 tablespoons lemon juice |
- Pare, core, and chop apples. Chop together currants and raisins. Add apples, sugar, cider, and meat stock. Cook about 5 minutes. Grind meat and suet. Add with seasonings to apple mixture. Simmer 1 hour, stirring frequently to prevent burning. Add lemon juice. This mincemeat may be made ahead of time and canned for use throughout the holiday season. (Yield: 4 quarts)

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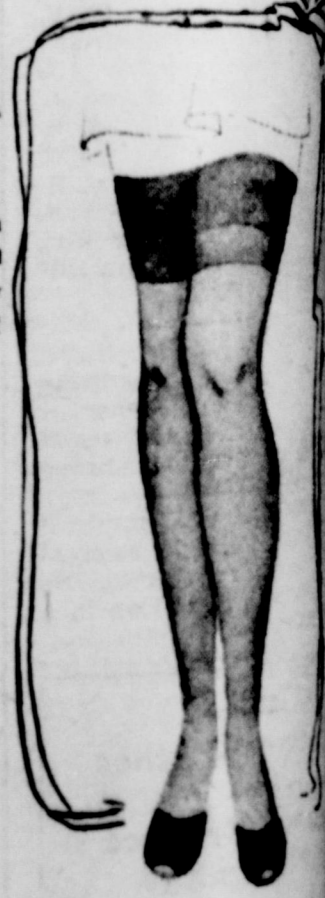
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
