## Flower Show Huge Success

The Second Annual Flower Show sponsored by the Sanderson Garden Club surpassed the show last year in the number of entries. There were few entries in the arrangement classes where the flowers had not been grown by the exhibitor and this fact attested the patience, skill and perseverance of local gardeners in the face of the prolonged dry weather that has prevailed in this area. Flowers in the cultural classes had to be exhibited by the grower and showed a surprising variety and beauty.

The show was held at the Community House Saturday with exhibits open to the public in the afternoon and evening. Tables held the attractive displays with attached cards noting the entry, the entrant, and the winning specimens. In order to utilize the available space to the best advantage, many arrangements had been made in shadow boxes. Flower and garden plants were offered for sale.
