HILL D. HUDSON OF PECOS ENTERS SENATORIAL RACE

One of the hottest Democratic legislative campaigns in years was assured Saturday when Hill D. Hudson of Pecos, announced his candidacy for state senator assuming a four-way race in the 29th District. Hudson is 47 years old, married, and the father of two sons. He formerly was district judge and district attorney in Reeves, Ward, Loving, Crane, Andrews and Winkler counties. He resigned as judge in 1945 to return to the private practice of law.

He was born in Dallas and came to Pecos in 1906. He was educated in Pecos, at the Texas Christian University where he took his pre-legal work, and at the University of Texas, where he received his law degree, entering practice in 1926. He served as county attorney of Winkler County a year after graduating, remaining in office for two terms. He recently filled out by appointment an unexpired term as county attorney in Reeves County.

Hudson served in the army as a private in World War I. He is a member of the Methodist Church, Pecos, American Legion post, and the Masonic Lodge.

Part of his platform will include: 1. Putting the College of Mines on a basis close to Texas A&M.

2. A re-districting of the state that will give West Texas more representation. He believes the area should be re-districted as to judicial, senatorial and representative participation.

3. The present criminal code is antiquated, he says.

4. He would establish a bill to get state aid for juvenile delinquents, to establish centers for the rehabilitation of wayward youngsters.

5. He favors an increase in teachers' salaries and more aid for districts with suddenly enlarged populations that cannot maintain an adequate school system under the per capita allowance.

Other candidates already announced for the post, vacated by the retirement of H. L. Winfield, are H. A. Coffield of Marfa, M. T. Bobbitt, El Paso, and Chas. B. Moore from Del Rio.
