





In Hunting

Practice Equals Safety

No sane man would intentionally walk into the deadly cutters of a moving combine. Nor would an operator direct the swishing blades at another person.

But, with the opening of hunting seasons this fall, many people Sammy Bailey, Galen Brewer, will walk into the path of a rifle bullet fired by a fellow hunter. If each individual would use the same caution when handling firearms as they use around their farm machinery, the number of hunting accidents would be greatly reduced.

There is a compelling necessity today for a code of ethical behavior for the hunters who invade the farms and ranches of

Unless the hunters themselves develop appreciation of proper and improper hunting practices, increasing legal restrictions will be instituted and hunting as it has been and is now known will Carol Knight, Karen Maynard,

Each hunter must take the responsibility to see that game laws are fair and reasonable and that they are obeyed by every man in the field. Each must actively support conservation efforts so that wildlife will be available for future generations -- or even the latter part of his own life.

Above all, each hunter must pass along to our young people the skills and values which are necessary for the formation of a true outdoor sportsman -- and the safety of human beings.

Good rules to follow are:

Always point the muzzle in a safe direction--the true gun expert is easy to spot by the way he handles his gun.

Be sure of your target -- no trophy is worth an uncertain shot. Don't point your gun at anything you don't intend to kill--you might do just that -- kill.

Most of us have heard a great deal about "putting first things first" and no few of us are trying to do something about it. The trouble is that in too mam, cases we do not have a good clear-cut definition of what we are trying to do.

The first step in learning what it means to "put things first" is to understand that Christianity is not a way of looking at certain things, BUT A CERTAIN WAY OF LOOKING AT ALL THINGS. Our evaluation of things is not always a proper evaluation. Notice the following illustration: "Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness . . . " The comparison being drawn is not with things that are wrong, but with food, clothing and shelter. These are things that men evaluate very highly, but the Lord said, "Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat? or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewith shall we be clothes?" (Matt. 6:31) Only one out of the seven requests mentioned in the prayer Christ taught his disciples to pray referred to material things. The scripture always puts the emphasis on the spiritual, not the material. Man has one major purpose in life, and that is to glorify God by doing his will.

Test yourself by God's rule! Do you put material things first? If so, you are making a mistake, our soul is worth more than all the world, don't sacrifice it for a morsel of bread or a moment



JANUARY SESSION TALKED --Chances are that Governor Daniel will have legislators back in Austin during January.

Rep. Murray Watson of Mart suggests that Daniel set up a grass-roots committee of citizens to bring in proposals for removing inequities in the new sales tax law for action at the special session.

Comptroller Robert S. Calvert continues to explain the law. He ruled that the American Red Cross is exempt from the sales tax on its purchases, since it is an agency of the Federal government.

Calvert is studying a request from some large industrial firms that they be allowed to be "direct" payers of the tax. Theory is that life would be simpler if they could keep records and pay the tax once each quarter, instead of paying it hundreds of times a day in the normal course of business.

TAX DOLLAR ANALYZED --Texas Legislative council has taken a new look at where the State's tax dollar comes from and where it goes.

Study reveals that 52 per cent of it is derived from the several types of sales taxes levied in the state, including 15.8% from the new 2% limited

Oil and gas production and severance taxes account for 19.1%, business taxes 11.4%, motor vehicle registration fees 9.5%, state property taxes 4.1%.

Motorists get tapped for 33.9% of the tax dollar, including the motor fuel tax at 21.4%, the sales tax at 3%, and registration fees at 9.5%. Nine per cent comes from tobacco taxes and 2.2% from alcoholic beverage levies.

He has a set of pumps to catch the excess water from the end of his rows and some rain-

Bob uses a crop rotation of one - third wheat, one-third grain sorghum and soybeans and one-third fallow. All residues are worked into the soil to increase the organic content of the soil and there is absolutely no burning of crop residues.

A system of underground pipeline consisting of four miles of concrete and plastic is located so as to stop erosion and water loss for open ditches,

the Farm Bureau Weed committee held their last meeting of the year Monday night in the Farm Bureau Office, Reports were given on the treating of bindweed on state highway right It was believed that practically every plot on these highways in Parmer County was threated, and placs were made for a complete clean-up early next year.

Plans were made for an overall cleanup campaign early in 1962, aimed at the elimination of all bindweed on public right of ways as well as field plots The first meeting in 1962 is planned for March at which time the following schedule will be put in operation:

Rechecking of railroad right of ways for any hindweed that has been missed after which Santa Fe men will re-treat; Effort will be made to get Slaton Branch of railroad, running from Farwell to the Baile County line in the program; lack Patterson appointed to contact Lloyd Killough, state highway maintenance man, for early cleanup on those right of ways; Effort will be made to get location of all field plots of bindweed and get cooperation of ASC and land owners in controlling or eradicating these weeds to prevent spread to other clean areas; Plans were laid for amther county-wide meeting of farmers, railroad officials, highway men, city officials. ASC, SCS, vocational agriculture instructors, county commissioners and others in April, 1962.





One thing we should be on the lookout for this time of year is Verticillium Wilt in cotton, It is a disease caused by soilborne fungus and the disease should be easily noticed at this time of the growing season. Plants attacked by the disease will show mottled coloring of leaves, and the plant will gradually die. Verticillium wilt can also be distinguished by a discoloration in the main stem at the base of the plant. One of the best

fiberous root crop, such as grain sorghum in the areas affected.

There could be a shortage of cottonseed for 1962, due to adverse weather conditions this year in Texas, so if you have cotton seed stored, precautions should be taken to make sure that the seed is not being damaged by insects or weather. Cottonseed can be treated for insect infestations. Bulletins are available in the County Agents office telling how to store cottonseed safely.




