## San Felipe, Sanderson Both Scoreless Here Last Friday

### MUDDY FIELD MARS ACTIVITIES OF BOTH TEAMS

Sanderson and San Felipe, Del Rio football teams battled to a scoreless tie on the local grid-iron Friday night on a wet field. Fine rain fell intermittently throughout the game hampering the activities of both teams. Passing was held to a minimum in effectiveness because of the wet ball and slow running on the parts of potential receivers, making it almost impossible to get in the clear for a pass. San Felipe failed to score one almost certain touchdown because the ball slipped from the hands of a wide-open receiver with not more than twenty yards left between him and the goal line.

San Felipe kicked the ball to the Eagles to open the game. Sanderson started with the ball on their own 21-yard line. They lost nine yards on a fumble recovered and kicked to the San Felipe 45-yard line. San Felipe was unable to gain any ground and punted on their fourth down to the Sanderson 10. San Felipe was penalized 5 yards for off sides, leaving 5 to go for a first down and four attempts ahead. Harrell carried the ball over for a first down, followed by an eight-yard run by Chamberlain. Smith made the extra yardage for another first down. The Eagles were held for the next three downs and punted to the San Felipe 32. The Mustangs carried the ball to their own 44 for a first down, attempted one pass and punted to the Sanderson 30. Hill carried the ball for a first down for the Eagles just before the first quarter ended.

San Felipe intercepted an Eagle pass attempt on the Sanderson 40 stripe and carried the ball on for another first down. Flores recovered a fumble on the 32-yard line to give the Eagles possession of the ball again. Harrell carried the ball through the middle for a nine-yard gain, followed by an incomplete pass attempt. Harrell made the first down yard. Sanderson was the recipient of a fifteen yard penalty against San Felipe for unnecessary roughness which put the ball into play on the San Felipe 46 yard mark with first down and ten to go. The Eagles fumbled the ball and the Mustangs recovered on their own 40. The Mustangs were penalized 15 yards for holding, and they punted to the Sanderson 43-yard line. Sanderson attempted a

It would be better to try to lift the cloud of election frauds and vote stealing and thereby gain the confidence of the people than to get into office under the false pretense of being the "party nominee".

pass that was intercepted by the Mustangs who in turn attempted two passes, both incomplete, and then punted. Sanderson picked up eight yard by Harrell to end the half.

Sanderson kicked to San Felipe to start the second half play. They made two first downs in fast succession, picked up fifteen yards extra on a penalty against Sanderson for unnecessary roughness, attempted one pass which slipped from the hands of a receiver who was wide open and lost the ball on downs on the 19-yard line. The Eagles kicked after three attempts to make a first down, to their own 42-yard mark. The Mustangs failed to make their first down and punted over the goal, bringing the ball out to the 20-yard line to begin play with Sanderson in possession. Sanderson quickkicked on their third down to the San Felipe 45, ending the third quarter.

The Mustangs made one first down early in the last period, then were penalized 5 yards for off sides. They attempted two passes and then again punted over the goal line. Sanderson picked up five yards on a play and received a 5-yard gain on a penalty against the Mustangs for off sides, putting the ball on their own 32-yard line. A pass attempt ended up with an interception by the San Felipe Mustangs. The Mustangs attempted a pass and made a first down on an end run. They received an extra fifteen yards because of unnecessary roughness by the Eagles. The Eagles recovered a fumble on their own 20, and lost the ball on a fumble on their own 13. The Mustangs then fumbled and the ball was caught in the air and ran to the Sanderson 40 yard line by one of the Eagle players. Sanderson then made a first down but their march forward was again halted by a pass interception. San Felipe then attempted a pass that was intercepted just before the final whistle of the game.

The ball had changed hands several times in the last quarter, many times on consecutive plays. Both teams were fighting very hard in almost desperation as some way carry the ball over the opposition's goal line, but neither was successful in doing more than penetrate the opponent's 20-yard line.

The Eagles played their game Friday night with but one substitute, Jimmy Harris being on the sick list with influenza. Flores played the end position in Harris' place and not once was it necessary to use Fisher, the only sub. The Eagles upheld their fine record of the past three games in playing a good quality of football. Their tie with San Felipe will in no way change the district standing since it was a non-conference game. The Eagles have yet to play Fabens and Alpine in conference tilts. The game with Fabens will be here October 29, this Friday night, starting at eight o'clock. The Eagles will go to Alpine the following week for their return game with that team. Sanderson won over Fabens when they played in Fabens earlier in the season, and were beaten by Alpine when they met on the local grid. Both games have promising interest and the Eagles deserve and need the backing of all the fans in their noble efforts to keep Sanderson on the district 6-B roll of honor and respect.

## LARGE BALLOT FOR GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2

Tuesday, November 2, is the date of the General Election in the United States with one of the largest ballots in history to be presented to the voters of the nation. A President, Vice-President and U. S. Senator are to be elected; also a governor and lieutenant governor, along with other state, county, precinct and district offices to be filled. In Texas eight constitutional amendments are to be voted on.

When a sheet of paper about the size of a page of this newspaper is handed to the local voter at the polls, he will know that is the official ballot. If seven columns do not contain the name of the candidates favored for the various offices, an eighth column is provided for any write-ins needed.

Much interest is manifested in political circles this year and a record vote is expected. It will probably be several days before the final tally is completed and the official returns made.

In Texas the candidates receiving the nomination at the July Democratic primary is generally conceded elected to that office.

Twelve absentee ballots have been cast to date in Terrell County with P. V. Corcoran sending in the first ballot. Friday midnight is the deadline for absentee voting.

The eight amendments to the state constitution to be voted on Tuesday are non-political in nature and will enhance the efficiency and the economy of our government.

The amendment calling for the redistricting of Texas will no doubt have the approval of West Texans who realize that their section of the state has unbalanced legislative representation at present. The amendment provides that the legislature shall redistrict every ten years. If this is not done, an automatic board is set up and if this board fails to function, it can be mandated by the supreme court. This is SJR 2.

HJR 24, Number 7 on the ballot, provides for abolishing the state ad valorem tax and enables the county to levy the tax for local revenue purposes. The measure would permit the counties which do not at present receive tax remissions to have the thirty cents for flood control and farm-to-market roads purposes.

The other amendments to be considered by the voters include one which would provide workman's compensation insurance for county employees.

Provision for husband and wife to partition in writing "between themselves in severalty or into undivided interests community property existing at the time of partition so as to convert same into separate property of the respective spouses without prejudice to the rights of pre-existing creditors."

To allow for gubernatorial succession in the event the governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies.

A \$3,000 state tax exemption of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads.

Placement of all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, constables, deputy constables, and other law enforcement officers on a salary compensation basis.

Authorization for the legislature to provide for the retirement and compensation of judges and commissioners of the appellate courts and judges of the district and criminal district courts of Texas for length of service, age, or disability, and for their re-assignment to active duty where and when needed.

### Only 7 Driver's Licenses Shown In School Survey

Of the fifty-two high school pupils questioned in the "Operation Safety" campaign conducted by the American Legion here only seven have drivers licenses. In answer to the questions listed on the survey sheet, 34 students claim that they are now driving a motor vehicle; seven have valid drivers licenses; three claim to have obtained their license through permission of a county judge, and one says the license was obtained by taking the driver's test. Nothing is noted on the blanks to show how the other three obtained the licenses.

This survey should be beneficial in that it shows the drivers now operating vehicles without a valid license.

Admission for adults will be fifty cents and twenty-five cents for students.

Jack Hardgrave had over three inches of rain in one hour at his place last week with much damage to fences and the roads as a result. Alfred Shelton reported approximately one-eighth of an inch to the south of Sanderson.

The warm days this week finds the weeds and grass growing almost as if by magic. The rains were delayed so long that every ranchman faces a heavy feed bill for several past months but the ranges will soon provide pasture and relieve the feeding for a few weeks until cold weather comes.

The rainfall in Sanderson last week totalled 1.15 inches.

### Legion to Start Membership Drive

The local post of the American Legion is starting this week on an intensive membership campaign, according to Hal Rowlett, Jr., adjutant.

The present membership here is approximately 125 and it is hoped to have as many more on the roster of members next year. Plans for civic activity in the coming year prompts the intensive drive at this time, Rowlett said.

Dr. William Aston, 35, the amnesia victim featured nationally in an Associated Press story from Grand Rapids, Mich. is well known in Sanderson.

Dr. Aston came to Sanderson in 1940, practicing here for two years and then leaving the latter part of 1942 to enter military service. They resided in the house now occupied by Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Fletcher and Dr. Aston had plans for a hospital at his home during his residence here.

According to the story from Grand Rapids, Dr. Aston vanished twenty months ago while on a trip to the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. Aston of Vernon, Texas, and a sister in Dallas as well as his wife had given him up as dead.

Dr. Aston sat in a restaurant in Chicago a week ago and as a juke-box blared the song "Because," which was played at his wedding in 1940, he suddenly remembered that he was not the wandering laborer that he appeared to be. His face was thin and gaunt, his fingernails broken and dirt laden, his hands calloused.

As the darkness of twenty-months of amnesia cleared, he hastened to Grand Rapids where he was united with his wife and two little daughters. He does not remember what he was doing in Chicago nor what he had done since his disappearance.

Mrs. Aston, the former Patricia Potts, of Floresville, had gone with her sister, Eva Potts, to Grand Rapids after Dr. Aston disappeared and both were employed there as registered nurses.

### STUMBERG NAMED ON TS&GRA PANEL

Steve Stumberg, local ranchman and former president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, has been named on a committee to study the relationship between the state organization and the National Wool Growers' Association, according to word received from Clayton Puckett, president.

Stumberg will be assisted on the committee work by Sayers Farmer, Junction; J. C. Mayfield of Del Rio; Edwin Mayer and Ray Willoughby, San Angelo; F. T. Earwood and Bryan Hunt of Sonora. All of the members of the committee except Farmer and Mayfield are past presidents and they are now vice-presidents.

This committee is charged to look into the public relations proposal which members of the National's executive committee voted to establish last August at the mid-year meeting in Salt Lake City. Texas growers on the present basis of assessing dues will have to pay an additional \$5,500 to the National each year, if this proposal goes through. The Texas association for the past two years has paid approximately \$11,000 annually to the National.

The committee has instructions to make a report at the annual convention in San Angelo in December.

**Search the Scriptures —**

**KNOWN BY THEIR FRUITS**

In the Sermon on the Mount, the Master issued these thought provoking words: "Every good tree bringeth forth good fruit; but a corrupt tree bringeth forth evil fruit. . . . Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them. — Matt. 7:17-20. Based upon this language, I ask the question, "Where are we headed for in America today?"

There is room for much concern as we stop for a moment and analyze the practices of our people. Yes, this is our democracy and we are all proud to claim individual citizenship; but still there is room for pessimism as we see the direction in which many of our fellow citizens are going. In fact, I am often made to wonder why God spared this nation through the last world conflict — a nation that has wandered so far away from Him and borne so much evil fruit.

According to Emery M. Foster, head of the Reports and Analysis Section, Research and Statistical Service of the Federal Security Agency at Washington, D. C., "In 1944-45 the amount expended for public elementary and secondary schools was \$2,638,865,908." He continues, "The U. S. Department of Commerce reports a consumer outlay of \$7,800,000,000 for alcoholic beverages and \$3,100,000,000 for tobacco in 1945."

How long can a civilization endure such deplorable conditions? Are we headed in the right direction when we spend over four times as much for alcohol and tobacco as we spend on the education of our young people? It seems that serious consideration is needed now, as never before.

These activities serve as a challenge to education, to the church and to our nation. Something must be done about such deplorable conditions. Something will be done! Remember, "Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down and cast into the fire."—Matt. 7:19.

**Judges Retirement Would Improve Texas Judiciary**

The first step toward creation of a more efficient and independent judiciary for Texas will be made November 2 by Texas voters if they approve a proposed constitutional amendment providing for judges retirement.

The amendment is one of eight to be voted on at the general election — it is last on the ballot — and will authorize the Texas Legislature to establish a judiciary system that will provide more economical and efficient administration of justice, a more independent judiciary, more competent judges and security for aged and infirm judges who have devoted their lives to public service.

Texas is one of only 17 states that do not provide for retirement of members of the judiciary. Thirty-one states including Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico, have adopted similar plans. Retirement for Federal judges has been in effect for many years.

The proposed amendment applies to only 47 appellate judges and 132 district judges over the state.

Proponents of the amendment point out that the change will enable more qualified lawyers to seek positions of public service, and allow younger, more active men to decide the controversies of Texas citizens.

The proposed retirement system would help speed the trial of cases by providing for special assignment of retired judges to active duty when and where needed to relieve congested dockets. If this is not done, there will be a need for the establishment of additional courts at increased cost to the taxpayer.

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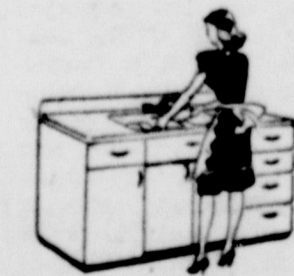
