### Change to Mutton-Producing Herds Threat To Southwest as Dependable Wool Source

The recent change from sheep-for-wool to mutton producing herds in the Southwest threatens to destroy the area as a dependable source of supply for the nation's wool buyers.

Demands for lambs and sheep for eating purposes are fast transforming the Southwest herds from fine-wool Merino, Rambouillet and Delaine to Suffolk, Lincolns, Hampshires and Southdowns.

Because of this trend, the story says, wool buyers who once were able to depend on pig-in-a-poke buying in the area now need to inspect carefully all purchases to insure the purity of wool fibres.

H. F. Schlemmer, author of the story, says, "although we have seen a lot of changes in ranching during the past 25 years, none has taken place as suddenly as this one."

**KILL THAT FLY!**

Every summer, for years, the mystery has recurred. First from one part of the country then from others, come reports of many persons — particularly babies and children — stricken with a serious and sometimes fatal intestinal disorder.

An infectious organism was known to cause the malady. But how it was spread has been an enigma. Now it is no longer an enigma. The common housefly is the culprit.

While the organisms of cholera, typhoid, dysentery and other maladies of the intestinal tract have been found on the bodies of flies, medical men have not been able to say with scientific certainty that the fly was the carrier causing infections in humans.

Research recently reported, however, shows that the fly not only carries the disease organisms, but that it spreads them over wide areas.

This disclosure is made by the United States Public Health Service, after two years study involving 80,000 people in Hidalgo County, Texas. The study was supervised by Dr. James Watt and Dale R. Lindsay of the Public Health Service.

The towns in the Texas county were ideal for the experiment. They not only had a major fly problem, but also hundreds of children in the area were stricken each year with severe and often fatal intestinal infections.

The several communities in the area were divided into two comparable groups. One of the groups was sprayed every six weeks with fog and mist machines that sent huge clouds of DDT over all the likely breeding places of the insects. Careful counts were taken of the flies and additional spraying was done when required.

The other set of towns received no treatment aside from the normal precautions taken by the residents. However, in both sets children were carefully examined for the presence of germs and

records were kept of all illnesses and deaths due to intestinal infections.

The results at the end of the first year brought condemning evidence against the fly. In the towns that had been sprayed, and where the fly population had been almost wiped out there was a marked decrease in the number of cases of intestinal diseases. The untreated towns continued to show their previous high record.

The next year, to check their results, the government investigators reversed the procedure. They sprayed the formerly untreated towns and left the others unsprayed. As they had suspected the results also reversed themselves. When the spraying was stopped there was not only a great increase in the number of flies but the number of cases of infection returned to its former level. To procure more evidence the study will be continued another year.

In the meantime, a similar experiment will be carried on in New York State this summer. Towns within a 20-mile radius

of Albany have been chosen as the site. Those on the east bank of the Hudson River will be sprayed, while those on the west bank will not.

Now that scientific proof has been given by the Texas experiments of the "criminal" role that the fly has played in spreading intestinal diseases, health authorities as well as private citizens should renew their efforts for its destruction. The wider use of DDT and other chemicals insecticides is one means of combating the fly. However, according to Dr. Watt, the effect of these poisons is only temporary.

"In the light of our Texas study," he says, "something more basic, particularly the elimination of man-made breeding places, must be done if the full effect of fly control on disease is to be achieved."

**FIVE POLIO PRECAUTIONS ARE LISTED FOR PARENTS**

Warning that the 1949 polio season is "just around the corner," the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today issued a list of precautionary measures to be observed by those in charge of children during the epidemic danger period which usually runs from May through October, reaching its peak during the hot, mid-summer months. The five easy-to-follow health rules for children are:

1. Avoid crowds and places where close contact with other persons is likely.
2. Avoid over-fatigue caused by too active play or exercise, or irregular hours.
3. Avoid swimming in polluted water. Use only beaches or public pools declared safe by local health authorities.
4. Avoid sudden chilling. Remove wet shoes and clothing at once and keep extra blankets and heavier clothing handy for sudden weather changes.
5. Observe the golden rule of personal cleanliness. Keep food

tightly covered and safe from flies or other insects. Garbage should be tightly covered and, if other disposal facilities are lacking, it should be buried or burned.

The National Foundation also listed the following symptoms of infantile paralysis: headache, nausea or upset stomach, muscle soreness or stiffness, and unexplained fever. Should polio strike in your family, call a doctor immediately. Early diagnosis and prompt treatment by qualified medical personnel often prevent serious crippling, the National Foundation pointed out.

The organization emphasized that fear and anxiety should be held to a minimum. A calm, confident attitude is conducive to health and recovery. Parents, it said, should remember that of all those stricken, 50 per cent or more recover completely, while another 25 per cent are left with only slight after effects.

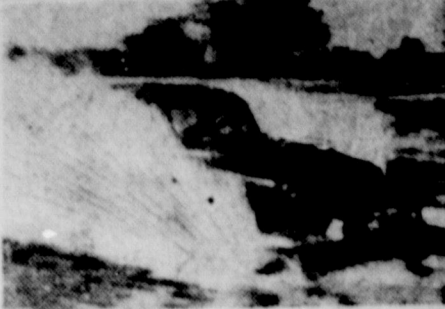

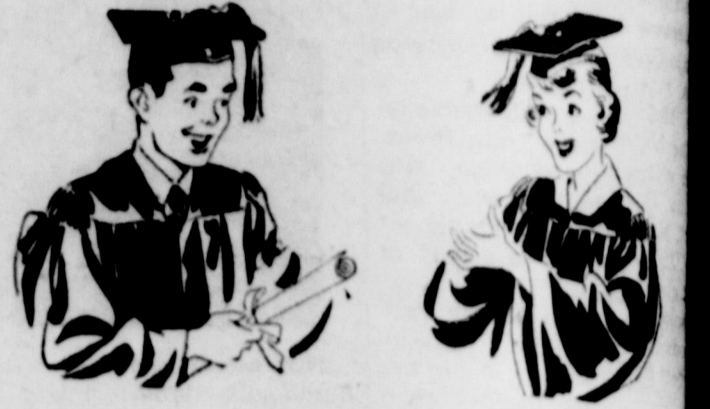

**Contributions Asked For Tornado Victims**

The midwestern area offices of the American Red Cross has announced the allocation of \$50,000 and the help of eight full-time disaster workers to the Amarillo chapter following the tornado that struck the veteran's community in that city early Sunday evening.

Reports from the manager of the Amarillo chapter show six dead and 79 injured, including 63 in hospitals, as results of the storm. About 75 homes have been destroyed and 350 damaged in a twelve-block area. Red Cross headquarters have been set up in the Alice Chapters in Texas and Oklahoma and the other fourteen states of the midwestern area have been authorized to accept contributions for those who wish to help the tornado victims.
