Friday, May 30, was Memorial Day. Being a veteran it is one of the holidays that come near to my heart. On that day the nation pauses to pay tribute to the men and women who made the supreme sacrifice. Our attempt to pay proper tribute to their sacrifice falls far short of our desires. First, the preservation of the liberty they died for is our responsibility. I regret that the people of Sanderson were not properly informed of the beautiful Memorial Day service that was held at the high school auditorium last Friday. We were told that there were a mere handful of people among the participants in the program.

To regenerate this newspaper and to make the proper use of the affair—so that people might have the pleasure of participating in and witnessing the beautiful service, to explain our failure with a statement that we knew of the plans for the service. This column was not represented at the service for the reason that we knew nothing of it until one hour before it was scheduled, if it was scheduled, it was presented.

A program is to be presented under the auspices of the Legion. It seems that the membership of that organization has not been informed so that the service is over we have to face the embarrassing comments that "there is not half a dozen Legionnaires present."

I don't know who was to blame for the failure of membership of the local post knowing that it but we hope it never happens again.

NET ROSS DIED HERE MONDAY P. M.

Funeral services were held at 2 o'clock Sunday evening at the Baptist Church for Arnet Ross of Dryden. Rev. Cliff Spencer, pastor, conducted services with O. T. Sudduth in charge of arrangements. Burial was made in Cedar Grove cemetery.

Bearers were Wade Harrell, S. Nance, J. Turner, E. H. East, Lonnie Cash and Jim Ross.

Survivors include his widow, Alice Ross of Dryden, his father, Dan Ross of Dryden; two brothers, Rufus Ross of Dryden, and Ross of Sanderson; three sisters, Mrs. S. E. Evans of Wilcox, Mrs. Cliff St. Clair of Arizona, and Mrs. John Latta of New Mexico.

Ross was born in Llano county, February 13, 1898, and moved to Crockett county in this family. He was married to Alice Gilbert May 16, 1925.

Children were born to the couple on the following dates: one dying at birth and the other only a few hours old. The couple had resided at Sanderson for many years. Mr. Ross being in the logging business. He had been in health for the past five years and was ill for a week before he came Saturday afternoon at his home in Dryden. He had been a member of the Baptist Church since 1921, holding membership at Ozona.

Ross's daughter, Barbara, was picked up and was badly damaged when the bus was hit by a school bus from Sinton.

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Alfred E. Creigh, III Reburial Saturday In Ronceverte, W. Va.



Private funeral services will be held from the Presbyterian Church in Ronceverte, West Virginia, Saturday afternoon at 3 for Pfc Alfred E. Creigh, III. Six cousins will serve as pallbearers. Re-burial will be made beside his late mother, Mrs. Dorothy N. Creigh, in that city.

The body of young Creigh was one of 5,329 to arrive in New York on the U. S. S. Haiti Victory May 17. He had been buried in the U. S. Cemetery at Neuville-in-Coudrez, Belgium.

His father, Alfred E. Creigh, Jr., of Alpine, with Mrs. Creigh, and their daughter, Margaret Lynn, went by train to Ronceverte to attend the funeral services.

Born in Boulder, Colorado, November 16, 1923, young Creigh came to Sanderson with his parents when about one and a half years of age and resided here until he entered the service in June of 1943. He went overseas in September of 1944 a member of the 307th Airborne Engineers Battalion, and was reported missing in action December 22, 1944. He was subsequently reported killed in action on that date near Vielsalm, Belgium, while he and his platoon were engaged in demolishing a bridge under heavy enemy fire.

Sunday morning memorial flowers will be placed on the altar at the Sanderson Presbyterian Church of which he was a member.

Annual Fort Stockton Water Carnival To Feature Historical Pageant June 9-10-11, Along With All-Southwest Bathing Revue

Fort Stockton, June 3—Everybody in Fort Stockton is busy these days in preparation for the big community show—the 1949 Water Carnival.

This year's big show will feature a colorful historical pageant about the history of the beautiful Comanche Springs free swimming pool—from the days when the Mendoza Expedition brought the first white man to the site to disturb the enjoyment of the traditional modern touch, the annual All-Southwest Bathing Revue with entrants coming from towns of this entire section of the Southwest.

Gellar Productions of Hollywood has contracted with the Fort Stockton Lions Club under a \$2,500 contract which provides for colorful costumes, stage scenery and lighting and professional direction of a cast of local talent 150 strong. Robert Campbell, director for Gellar Productions, is in the midst of rehearsals for the colorful "Cavalcade of Comanche Springs."

Water ballets, scene from the famous court of Judge Roy Bean, "Law West of the Pecos", and glamorous beauties, both of the past and modern vintage, will feature a thrill-packed show on the nights of June 10 and 11.

Young ladies from all parts of West Texas will compete for the title of Miss Southwest, won last year by lovely Ann Mims, Sul Ross College entrant from Alpine. A free trip to Hollywood, with entertainment arranged through Gellar organizations, is the coveted prize.

The Water Carnival starts on Thursday afternoon, June 9, with a big street parade in Fort Stockton, followed that evening by Fort Stockton's own bathing revue and a special revue of the big stage spectacle. Winner of the senior division of the Fort Stockton contest will be crowned Queen of the Water Carnival on Friday night, June 10.

Many communities of the area have held their own elimination contests to choose the community entrants for the All-Southwest Revue.

A new feature for the Water Carnival this year is a Saturday afternoon matched calf roping between two of the most promising young ropers of the area, Clay Cade of Alpine and Bill Teague of Crane, together with a jackpot roping and bronc-busting exhibition. The new Sheriff's Posse Arena in Rooney Park will be the scene of the event starting at 2 p. m.

Dances on the nights of Friday and Saturday at Gibbs Field sponsored by the Fort Stockton Fire Department, will round out the entertainment.

CREW HERE TO REPAIR EMERGENCY LIGHT PLANT

A crew of workmen came in to Sanderson Tuesday to repair the emergency power plant of the Community Public Service Company here, according to Jimmie Caroline, manager of the local plant.

Emmett Beauchamp of Pecos, manager of this district for the company, arrived late Tuesday evening to supervise the work.

Necessity of the emergency plant has been brought to the attention of the company officials as well as the local patrons lately after a series of high line breaks that have disrupted the service in Sanderson.

All places of business were forced to a standstill on two occasions lately because of the interrupted service. Hard hit, especially, have been the theatre and cafes and service stations where dependence for operation was entirely on the high line current. Presses at the Times office were stopped for about eight hours recently after a line break caused a shut-down.

Mr. Beauchamp assured the Times that the crew would remain on duty here until the local plant is again in shape to take care of any emergencies in high line stoppages.

Fight Mosquitos At Source, Urged By Health Officer

Dr. J. C. Kern, county health officer, told the Times this week that complaints had reached him that in certain sections of town there had been a noticeable number of mosquitos since the recent rains.

Pools of stagnant water are breeding places for the insects, Dr. Kern said, and should be drained or covered with oil to prevent further breeding. There are some houses, the health officer said, where drains from kitchen sinks and wash basins are allowed to run on the open ground. When this condition is not properly drained on a slope, care should be taken to cover any standing water with oil to prevent the increased breeding of the dangerous insects.

In an altitude like we have in Sanderson and the sloping areas in all parts of town, there is no reason for any mosquito-breeding places to exist, Dr. Kern said.
