McNutt Kills Big Eagle South of Town Saturday

Clarence McNutt, who works on the Roark ranch south of Sanderson, killed a large eagle in the air last Saturday as he drove to town from the ranch. The bird measured 6 feet, 5 inches from tip to tip and had a claw spread of 7 inches.

McNutt brought the big kill down with a .30 calibre rifle as he flew overhead. He was brought into town and displayed Saturday afternoon.

These birds kill many lambs during the spring and fall. They are reported to be a very poor target while flying.

Billy Chamberlain to Legion's Boys' State

Billy Chamberlain, junior honor student of the Sanderson High School left Saturday on an expense-paid trip to Boys' State in Austin beginning Sunday, June 5. He was sent by the local post of the American Legion.

Walter Paul, who was first selected to make the trip, was disqualified because he was a senior and they will not accept one who is a senior in high school. Ernestine Jessup, who was selected to go to Bluebonnet State by the Legion Auxiliary, was disqualified for the same reason.

Young Chamberlain was selected by the faculty of the Sanderson High School as a citizen of this mythical state within the State of Texas and the United States of America. He was advised to obtain and study the constitution of the State of Texas in preparation for admission as a citizen of his country.

While in Austin he will take a conducted tour of the state capitol and if elected to an office will visit the state officer with the corresponding duties. A joint House and Senate committee will escort the Honorable Beauford H. Jester, governor of Texas, to the House of Representatives where he will address the citizens of Boys' State.

The boys will attend the Governor's Ball Friday night, June 10, in the city coliseum of Austin. An outstanding orchestra will furnish the music. High school girls have been selected and invited to attend. Sponsors of the event say that this ball is one of the outstanding events of the week.

All citizens of Boys' State will be dismissed Saturday, June 11, at 9:30 a. m.

LEGION MAINTAINS STRONG LEAD IN SOFTBALL LEAGUE

Last Thursday night the Lions Club won over the VFW in the opening game of the night by a score of 11-6. The Lions came back on the field Friday night against the Legion team and in a swirl of wind and dust were beaten 8-5.

The Railroad lost two games last week end, the first against the Firemen Thursday night 9-4 and the second to the VFW Friday night.

Tuesday night of this week the Legion won over the VFW team in the opener 10-4. The VFW used Falcon on the mound for the first time this year. Falcon has a nice pitching style, but is holding off on the speed to try and find the target. He may show up well on the mound, but leaves a definite weakness in the spot he occupied at short stop.

In the second game Tuesday night the Firemen won over the Lions 13-6. The game stayed tied up 3-3 until the bottom half of the 4th inning when the Firemen made 3 runs. They scored 3 more in the fifth and 4 in the sixth. The Lions made 3 in the second, 1 in the sixth and 2 in the seventh.

The Legion is still leading the league with a wide margin, having lost only one game this year. That ball team was minus the presence of Bill Cochran for a few weeks, but the short stop position has been filled by Wilton Dishman and J. M. Harrell. Cochran is one of the mainstays of the team, being almost airtight in his position as well as a reliable hitter.

Effective June 1, all ball players were situated on teams to remain intact throughout the remainder of the season. No one is allowed to change teams after that date, and any vacancies to be filled on any team must be filled from recruits who have not played with any team since June 1.

The Fire Department is holding their place in second position on the standing list through their defensive ball playing. There is little likelihood that that team will ever come up to the hitting standards of the Legionnaires. The Lions Club, now occupying their place in the standing, will be forced to continue a heavy fight if they keep the VFW out of their place. The VFW is definitely a contender for any one of the places below the Legion, who seems to be a cinch holder of the stellar spot. The Railroad team, without the continual assistance of Pate on the mound, and through necessity, having to rely on different players each night, seems to be having difficulty in winning sufficient games to maintain interest on the part of the players.

The Legion has won 9 for 10, the Firemen 8 out of 12, the Lions 5 for 13, the VFW 3 out of 11 and the Railroad 3 out of 19.

Funeral Services Wednesday For Donaciano Sanchez

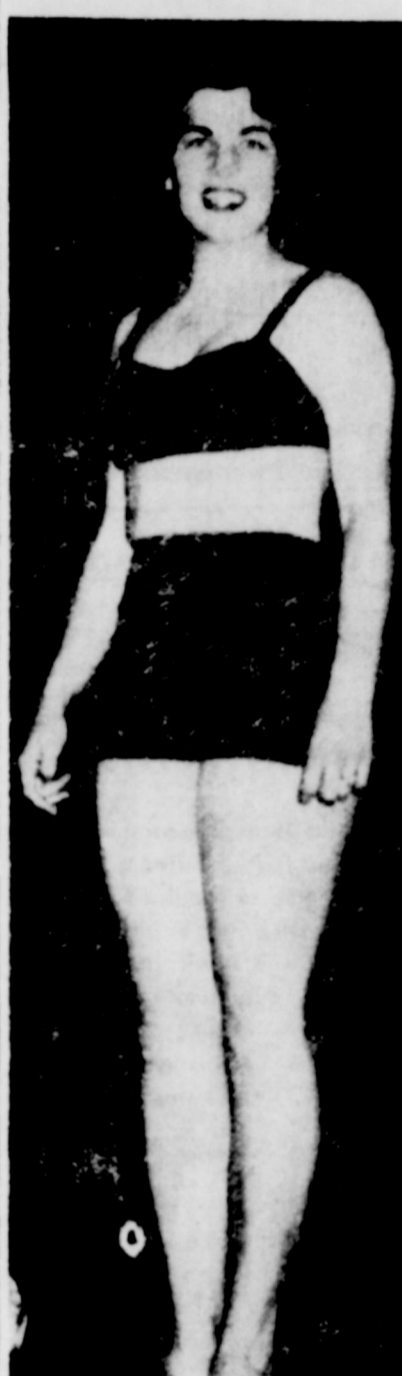

COOLER WEATHER AND RAINS FOR NORTH OF COUNTY

Cooler temperatures have prevailed in Terrell County since Sunday when cool breezes began to blow day and night. The temperature moderated some Tuesday, but dropped again late in the evening.

Rains have continued to come to sections of the county, following the usual spotted pattern. Most of the rainfall has been in the north part of the county.

Local precipitation Sunday night measured .37. The rain fell heavy to the north and northwest with none to the south or east and only showers a short distance out toward the west.

Sanderson Men Escape Serious Injury Saturday

Woody Leatherwood and John Lewis Whistler, both of Sanderson, narrowly escaped more serious injuries Saturday morning when the car in which they were riding sideswiped a small truck near Ozona.

Whistler was taken to a San Angelo hospital after a crew of motorists spent about forty-five minutes extricating him from the wreckage. Cuts and bruises and loss of blood weakened him and it was thought that possible internal injuries made his condition more serious. Examination determined no broken bones and after a rest until Tuesday he was permitted to be brought home.

Leatherwood, driver of the vehicle, suffered minor cuts and bruises and it was not thought necessary for him to be hospitalized. He was treated by a physician in Ozona and taken to the home of his mother there.

The accident occurred as the Leatherwood car attempted to pass the truck about four miles north of Ozona. Damage to the car was said to be such as to cause a total loss.

DEL RIO LODGE B OF RT CELEBRATES 50th ANNIVERSARY

Observing the fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the Del Rio Lodge No. 578, Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, the members celebrated with a barbecue supper and social hour last Saturday night at the Masonic Hall here with about 100 members and guests present.

A roll call of members of the organization meeting fifty years ago showed only one remaining charter member present for the celebration, J. M. Fusselman, sheriff of Medina County, was present to answer the roll call.

Fusselman started railroad work in Mexico in 1896. Returning to the States, he started to work for the SP in 1899, and on June 4 of that year the local brotherhood was chartered. Rather than form a lodge here and at Del Rio, it was agreed to retain the Del Rio name for the lodge with the understanding that the organization remain in Sanderson.

At the time Fusselman worked on this division he said they were paid approximately \$7.00 for the round trip from Del Rio. Jack Whittle, recently retired conductor, was introduced as the only member of the lodge with 50 years service. Mr. Whittle was awarded the 50-year pin last month.

FIRE AT BRIDGE DISRUPTS TRAIN SERVICE TUESDAY

Train service to the west was disrupted Tuesday when approximately 60 feet of the west wooden approach to the Devil's River railroad bridge burned early Tuesday morning. Railroad employees pumped later from the river and extinguished the fire which was discovered about 3 a. m.

The west-bound limited passenger train was held in Del Rio, arriving here in the afternoon. The bridge was repaired by noon and traffic continued.

TERRELL RESIDENTS HEAR PLANS FOR ELECTRIC CO-OP

Approximately 60 Dryden and Terrell County residents met at the courthouse Tuesday morning to hear Tom Heard, manager of the Bracketville Rio Grande Electric Cooperative, discuss the possibilities of extending a co-op electric line in this part of the county. In Sanderson with Mr. Hurd were Leo Frierich, president of the company, and Harold Toft, a member of the Bracketville co-op.

Mr. Heard outlined the workings of the Bracketville organization to show how such a unit could be extended to Dryden and other points in the county. The line to Pumpville, Langtry and Pandale, a distance of 320 miles, was contracted last month at \$999 per mile. It is estimated that service will be available within the year.

In explaining the system of the co-op to the Terrell County residents, Mr. Hurd said that since the populace was so sparse generally throughout the county it would be necessary to raise the 5-year-guaranteed payment to approximately \$25 per subscriber to insure payment of the RFC-financed loan to REA. After that five-year period each subscriber would be metered and pay only for the electricity he uses. The power would be bought from one of the utilities companies operating in the area and resold to the subscribers on a cost basis.

The Bracketville organization is the headquarters for an electricity co-op furnishing all communities from that town west where other sources of power are not available. Terrell County would be a part of that co-op due to the few people and the difficulties incurred in beginning a new organization. That organization is governed by a board of nine directors elected by the members. They in turn hire a manager for the organization and the clerical help necessary for the administration of the unit, and maintenance men that are necessary for the installation of new services and maintenance and repair work. Two-way radio communication links outlying service men with the office in Bracketville so that maintenance supplies and assistance can be obtained in emergency. Plans would be to establish a maintenance man in this area if the service is extended in the county.

All those present were listed by Mr. Hurd and will be mailed an application blank for entrance in to the Rio Grande Electrical Cooperative and if sufficient demand is noted, plans will be laid immediately for the extension of the service into Terrell County.

C. G. Riggins Elected To Head Texas Watchmakers' Assn.

Charles G. Riggins, one of the founders of the Texas Watchmakers' Association, was elected president of that organization at their second annual convention in Galveston this week.

Mr. Riggins is prominent in the movement for legislation requiring the registration of watchmakers and their passing state examinations, for the better protection of the public. Work on a bill to be presented to the 1950 legislature was begun immediately after the close of the convention.

He was accompanied by Mrs. Riggins and they visited friends and relatives in San Antonio and Gonzales en route to Galveston.

importance of liming. If it were thought advisable, this letter could be translated into Spanish and copies distributed to non-English speaking residents.

The local post of VFW is an excellent organization which enjoys the respect and cooperation of practically all of our Latin-American citizens. This fact was evidenced by the outstanding results achieved by the VFW in last year's drive for paving funds. I believe that the VFW, along with the two churches mentioned above, could obtain

almost 100 per cent cooperation in any individual fly control program within reach of the average pocketbook. The other service and civic organizations could undertake the problem of control in other sections of town, where outdoor toilets definitely do exist, but in lesser numbers.

A sack of lime purchased by the privy owner should be kept readily available in each outdoor toilet, along with an empty tin can or scoop with which to sprinkle the lime into the pit. A system of inspections and

block responsibility should be instituted to encourage and obtain conformance with the basic aspects of the plan.

A meeting of the civic, religious and official groups to be involved should be accomplished at once in order to get the ball rolling.

It is the natural duty of all citizens, and especially those in positions of leadership and authority, to do what is in their power to protect the mutual health and welfare of our people. Every man or woman in

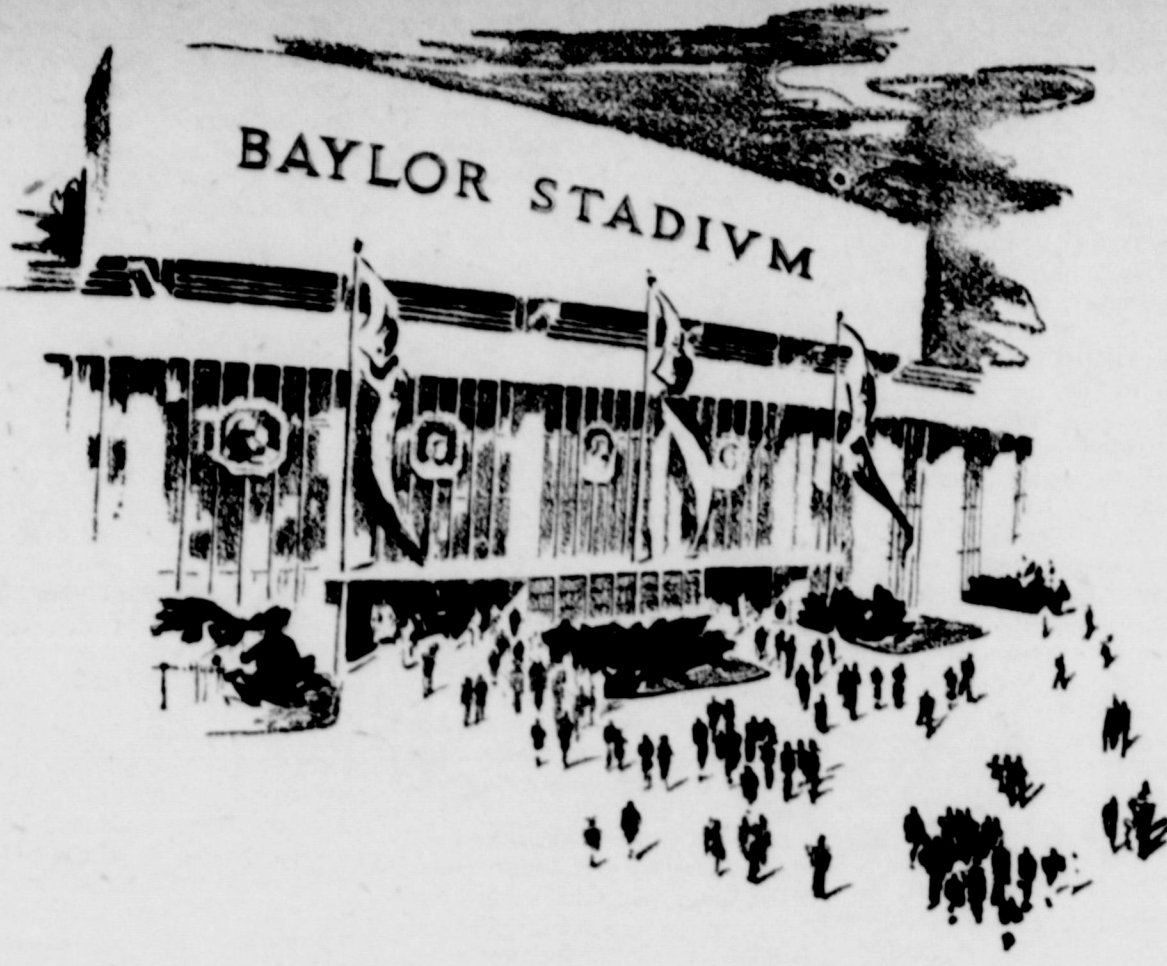
The new pastor for the local church is Rev. J. C. Chavez, who is being transferred here from Van Horn.
