VFW INAUGURATES HEALTH CAMPAIGN

The local VFW Post No. 8912 will conduct a clean-up drive in the Latin-American portion of Sanderson, it was decided at a regular meeting of the organization here Sunday afternoon. "It is a known fact that there are many outdoor toilets in this part of town, as pointed out in the 'Listen to Luke' column of the Sanderson Times, but there are also unsanitary conditions existing outside this portion of town," said J. P. Parra, chairman of the sanitary committee named to have charge of the clean-up campaign. Parra continues: "And it has been brought to our attention that the garbage collection is somewhat lax in this sector."

Complying with the suggestion in the editor's column, circulars in Spanish have been distributed and placed all over this area, explaining in detail several sanitary measures to be taken and the grave dangers caused by flies and mosquitos and the general unsanitary conditions.

Parra, in charge of the committee, said, "There will be a house-to-house inspection in this area by members of the VFW from June 19 through June 26."

Dr. J. C. Kern, county health officer, was consulted and he highly approved the action.

J. G. Barry of Smithville, Texas, was elected as superintendent of schools for the Terrell County Common School District, by the board of trustees this week. The school board met with Mr. Barry in Uvalde last Sunday and after talking with him in conference presented him with a contract.

Mr. Barry will succeed C. G. Bradford, who has been here several years, first as principal then serving as superintendent. Mrs. Bradford has been teaching in the high school here for several years. The Bradfords, who are out of town at the present, could not be reached to learn of their plans for another year. Their resignations were accepted by the local board.

Mr. Barry, a graduate of Baylor, has taught in Bastrop, Texas and was superintendent of the schools at Hondo for 13 years. His family includes Mrs. Barry and two children. They plan to move here about June 24th, according to Jimmie Caroline, president of the board. Mr. Caroline stated that Mrs. W. H. Savage, English teacher in the high school, has accepted the position for another year.

Senator James E. Taylor of Kerens, pictured on Jester's left, sponsored the legislation through the Senate. House sponsor was Phillip L. Willis of Kaufman. Covered by the law are all public officers of the state, counties, cities, and school districts. Governor Jester signed the bill into law June 8, and it became effective immediately.

Noelke ranch in the northern part of Terrell County.

The pranksters spent several days wondering how long before they would be apprehended. Finally Wednesday officers at Iraan telephoned the local sheriff's department that the boys were being held there. A confession was obtained immediately and the boys were glad to face the doctor with apologies.

The good doctor was willing to play the role of the "absent minded professor" and not push serious charges since there was no criminal intent involved. Upon the plea of guilty and a payment of a fine for disorderly conduct, they were released much wiser and a great deal tamer.

CORDELL McDONALD, DROWNING VICTIM, BURIED SATURDAY

Funeral services were held at the Church of Christ Saturday morning for Cordell Conn McDonald 8, the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. H. McDonald, who was the victim of a drowning accident. David Dean of Alpine, who is a student at Sul Ross College, was in charge of the service and burial, was made in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

Mrs. McDonald, with her son and daughter, Yvonne, and a nephew, Doyle McDonald, of Del Rio, spent several days at the camp of Mr. McDonald, who is a rider on the Rio Grande River. Mrs. McDonald had taken the children wading in Indian Canyon on several occasions, but late last Friday afternoon when they went, unknown to them, a rise during the previous night had washed the swimming hole into a deep hole. Cordell stepped off into the deep water and sank. Mrs. McDonald was preparing to remove her shoes and enter the water but jumped in fully clothed to try to rescue him. Her efforts were unsuccessful.

The screams of the children attracted Mr. McDonald and E. W. Martin, manager of the local Red Buif Station, and Jim Sample, owner of the station, who had gone to the river fishing. Rescuing the child's body was difficult in the deep water and required several minutes as the men were fatigued from running to the scene. Attempts at resuscitation by artificial respiration were made by the men.

A local physician was summoned and met the party at Dryden where they had brought the body in a pickup. He pronounced the child dead after further efforts to revive the lifeless body.

Survivors, besides the parents and sister, include another brother, Wade, of Sanderson, his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Wallace, of Hext, his paternal grandmother, Mrs. W. H. McDonald, of Sanderson and several aunts, uncles and cousins.

Out-of-town relatives present for the funeral included the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. S. W. Wallace and Sterling Wallace of Hext; Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Wallace of Cleburne; Mr. and Mrs. Milton McDonald and Mr. and Mrs. Jess McDonald of Del Rio; S-Sgt. and Mrs. K. E. Powers and children of El Paso; Mrs. Ollie Everette and Avis McDonald of San Antonio; Mrs. Beverly Canterbury of Alpine; Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Searcy, Mr. and Mrs. George Searcy and Jack and Glenn Searcy of Bandera; Mr. and Mrs. Ollie Stedham of Alpine; Mr. and Mrs. Henry Lemons and children of Marathon; Mr. and Mrs. Will Everette, Mr. and Mrs. Bud Everette and Jack Everette of Fort Davis; Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Morris and children and Claude Baker of Dryden.

Pall bearers were J. J. Whistler, Irvin Robbins, W. R. Turner, Garland Inmon, Frank Turner and Dick Hamilton.

This is the third tragic death in the family in recent years. A son, Theo McDonald, was killed during World War II, and Earl McDonald was killed in a motorcycle accident two years ago.
