Mohair Project Agreement Signed

SONORA, June 24 — A cooperative agreement between the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association and the United States Department of Agriculture to carry out a Mohair Market Research project has been signed, Sayers Farmer, TS&GRA president told directors and other members at a quarterly meeting here last week.

"We have taken a very important step and now we need the financial backing of every mohair grower in raising our \$10,000 quota. This is the first of several attempts made by the association to alleviate the mohair situation in which the grower can take an active part. I believe this project will do a great deal to stimulate the mohair market," Farmer said.

The directors recommended to Farmer that he appoint a committee of 20 or more warehousemen and non-warehousemen whose responsibility would be to raise the \$10,000. Farmer stated that he had already talked to a number of growers who had expressed a willingness to donate one-half cent per pound on all of the mohair now in the warehouses. These donations should be turned over to warehousemen, he added, and if all growers took this action the quota would be quickly raised.

F. L. Thomsen, director, marketing research branch of the Production Marketing Administration, U. S. D. A., wrote the association that the mohair problem would be approached from an identical point of view, and with the same techniques, as would a single firm having a new textile raw material to develop and merchandise. He also inferred that this project would be handled as others costing from \$75,000 to \$100,000 and should obtain the same results.

NOLAN LEE SEARCY SECOND LOCAL POLIO VICTIM

The second case of polio for Sanderson developed last Thursday night and Nolan Lee Searcy, the nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Searcy, was taken to the Robert B. Green hospital in San Antonio Friday. He was taken to the Dryden airport about noon and an ambulance plane from Alpine flew the child to San Antonio. He was accompanied by his parents who remained in that city.

Physicians in San Antonio diagnosed the ailment as a mild case of polio Saturday and the boy was placed in an isolation ward for two weeks.

His condition is reported to be very favorable. It will be from five to eight days before it can be ascertained if the disease has any crippling after-effects.

LOCAL DRIVE FOR POLIO FUND AMOUNTS TO \$349

Immediately following the outbreak of the second case of polio in Sanderson, W. W. Sudduth, local fund chairman, distributed a letter seeking donations to help pay for the treatment of the case. Wednesday morning \$222.90 had been collected.

It was explained by Mr. Sudduth that the local polio fund has been depleted by the loan of \$700 to the Texas Polio Foundation in their treatment of the disease last year, and the treatment of Dorothy Jean Litton, the other polio case, leaving a deficit of some \$218. The treatment of all cases of polio locally will be paid for out of the National Foundation Fund, says Mr. Sudduth, but they consider it a loan to be repaid as soon as possible. All money donated now will be kept in the local polio fund.

The letter put out by Mr. Sudduth was of a very personal and frank nature, bringing out in plain words the duty of every citizen in helping in the drive for funds as well as their own responsibility in keeping their premises as clean as possible.

It was noted after the first outbreak of the disease that local people were very cooperative for several days, but soon lapsed into almost complete indifference toward the upkeep of their grounds, trash, etc. This same diligent spirit was found after it was learned that Nolan Searcy had contracted the disease and Mr. Sudduth expressed in his letter the need for constant vigilance against flies, filth and trash.

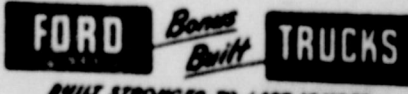
