SCHOOL FACULTY COMPLETE EXCEPT FOR ONE VACANCY

Superintendent J. G. Barry announced this week that only one vacancy exists in the faculty for the schools of Terrell County. A high school teacher for shopwork and boys' physical education is to be elected.

M. B. England, who was coach and principal of the high school for the past two years, will fill that place again this year. He will also teach science. Mr. England has a B. A. degree from SWTSC, San Marcos.

Victor E. Wattner will be the high school principal and social science teacher. He was formerly principal at Martin's Mill, Texas. He has a B. S. degree from NTSC, Denton, and a L. L. B. degree from SMU, Dallas.

Other members of the high school faculty are W. R. Lewis, B. M. Hardin-Stimmons, Abilene, band teacher; Mrs. W. H. Savage, B. A., Texas U., who has taught here for the past six and one-half years will teach English; Curtis Wise, B. S., Abilene Christian College, math and commercial teacher; Mrs. V. E. Wattner, B. S., TSCW, Denton, will teach home making and girls physical education.

O. H. Boulter, B. S., Sam Houston State College, Huntsville, will be principal of the elementary school. Mr. Boulter taught here last year.

The eighth grade will be taught by Mrs. O. H. Boulter, B. A., TSCW, Denton, who taught here last year; and Guenther E. Luckenbach, B. S., SWTSC, San Marcos, who will also serve as junior football coach.

The seventh grade will be under Mrs. W. E. Grigsby, B. S., Sul Ross, Alpine, who has taught in the local schools for 10 years.

In the sixth grade will be Mrs. Dorothy Lindley, B. A., Sul Ross, Alpine, who has taught here 7 years; Miss Barbara Lowe, B. B. A., Texas U., coming here from Del Rio where she has been teaching for the past two years.

Mr. Boulter will be one of the teachers for the fifth grade and Mrs. W. H. Grigsby, a teacher here for the past three years, and a student of Texas U., Austin, will teach the other section of the fifth grade.

The fourth grade will be taught by Mrs. W. A. Davis, B. A., Sul Ross, who taught here last year; and Mrs. H. A. Finger, B. A., TSCW, Denton, who was a teacher in Hondo and Medina County for several years.

The third grade teachers will be Mrs. A. A. Shelton, B. A., SWTSC, San Marcos, M. A., Sul Ross, Alpine, who has taught in the local school for 7 years, and Mrs. Janet Buck, Baylor University, who taught here last year.

There will be three teachers for the second grade: Miss Betty Zuehl, B. S., TSCW, Denton, past two years teaching in Del Rio; Mrs. J. M. Hayre, B. S., SWTSC, San Marcos, has been in the local schools four and one-half years; Mrs. Mary Booker, Baylor College, taught here last year and will receive her B. S. from Sul Ross this summer.

The five teachers in the first grade will be: Miss Mary Buchanan, NTSTC, Denton, a teacher here for four years; Miss Beattie Moore, B. S., Sam Houston State College, taught here last year; Miss Lucy Rector, Howard Payne College, taught here last year; Mrs. Sylvan Walker, SWTSC, San Marcos, has been in the local schools for four years; and Miss Grace Wright, B. S., NTSC, has taught here 1 year.

Mrs. Herbert Winston will return as teacher in the Dryden school. She has an A. B. degree from Sul Ross, Alpine and has taught in the school district for 7 years.

The Independence School will be taught by Mrs. Charley Chandler, a student of TSCW and a teacher in the school district for the past 8 years.

Contract Wool Prices Take Jump in Market

According to Johnny Williams, owner of the local Sanderson Wool Commission Co., area wool was contracted at from 46c to 51c last week end with most of the contracts going for 50c and 51c. Williams said that

these prices were some higher than those of last year when markets were on the up grade.

Emery, Russell and Goodrich is the firm contracting the wool locally.

Wool on the bodies of West Texas sheep continues in stronger demand than wool that has been shorn and is in Texas warehouses.

Monday night it was estimated that 80 per cent of the fall wool clip had been contracted at prices ranging up to 52 cents with a discount for defects, per pound.

While 90 per cent (between 3 and 4 million pounds) of the fall clip has been sold during the last week, there has been less than half a million pounds of 1949 spring 12-months wool sold. It is estimated that approximately 20 million pounds of the 12-months wool is unsold.

Jack Hughes of San Angelo, buying for Emery, Russell and Goodrich, of Boston, has been leading the way in the fall wool mart since he started last Wednesday.

Hughes was also buying some wool at 52 cents per pound and estimates that his contracts on fall wool at from "2 1/2 to 3 million pounds." He has been purchasing wool at Sonora, Del Rio, Uvalde, Ozona, and Alpine besides the lot that was contracted here. The 52 cents per pound was paid at the Del Rio Wool & Mohair Co.

Sources close to the fall wool supplies estimated Monday night that the wool was just about all gone to buyers through contracts. They estimate the fall tonnage possibly won't amount to more than 4 1/2 to 5 million pounds.

The mohair market this week continued steady around 40 and 41 cents for adult hair and 60 to 61 cents for kid hair.

URANIUM 'FINDS' BEING REPORTED IN ALPINE AREA

Specimens of "float" assaying as high as five per cent uranium represent the latest development in search of the wonder mineral in the Alpine area.

Geologists, prospectors, and mineralogists have for months been scouring the entire Big Bend area from Van Horn to Sanderson, but have yet to locate a "mother lode" of the valuable ore.

Sul Ross College, Frank Woodard, H. R. Gard, Fred H. Gaston, and other residents of Alpine have acquired Geiger counters to aid in the search. Drs. Nelson and Lake, respective heads of the Geology and Chemistry departments at Texas Western College in El Paso have expressed interest in the showings in the area.

Authentic specimens of carnotite have been found on the Texas side of the Rio Grande, and pitchblend has been located on the Mexican side.

Million Dollar Ranch Deal Involves Cross L, Paint Mare Spreads

Final papers have been signed on a West Texas-New Mexico ranch deal involving more than \$1 million.

This was made known here this week with the announcement that J. J. Russell, San Angelo, had traded two ranches

near Dryden for around 240 sections in Western Central New Mexico, from Crockett Morrison, now of Dryden, but formerly of Pie Town, N. M., and that Dr. F. T. McIntire, San Angelo, had purchased about 65 sections of the former Crockett ranch properties in New Mexico.

MRS. A. J. HORTON'S CONDITION UNFAVORABLE

Mrs. J. W. Downum left last Friday to be with her mother, Mrs. A. J. Horton, who is ill in a Mineola hospital.

Mrs. Downum called her husband here Wednesday and reported that Mrs. Horton's condition was not very favorable. She has had several light brain hemorrhages.

Mrs. Marvin Kelly of El Paso is here to manage the Kerr Hotel and Coffee Shop during Mrs. Downum's absence.

Russell traded his Paint Mare and Cross L ranches in the Dryden country for the W Bar, Double Circle and Mangus ranches on Highway 60, between Magdalena, N. M., and Springerville, Arizona.

Dr. McIntire has bought the west end of the property known as the Mangus ranch.

Associated with Russell in the business to be known as the J. J. Russell Land & Cattle Co., are a son, Lee W. Russell, and a son-in-law, J. H. Powell. Lee Russell is on the W Bar ranch and Powell is on the Double Circle.

The Russell firm plans to stock the ranch with cows and sheep.

Headquarters of the W Bar include a \$50,000 ranch home with \$50,000 worth of improvements, Russell said Monday. The Double Circle ranch headquarters has \$75,000 worth of improvements including a fine ranch home.

Dr. McIntire's ranch has a \$25,000 ranch home, 10 wells that range in depth from 20 to 150 feet, one spring and creek at the headquarters that runs for a mile and a half through the ranch.

On the W Bar and Double Circle there are 38 windmills and wells and about 50 surface tanks. The wells range in depth from 30 to 200 feet.

Fences are constructed of a five-strand barbed wire with heavy posts every 12 feet.

The new owners plan to construct sheep proof fences over much of their property.

Russell says the country is in good condition at present and has a carrying capacity of 15 cows and 150 sheep to the section. Grass is predominantly Grama and the rainfall averages from 17 to 20 inches.

The ranches are located in the basin of the White Mountains on the western slope of the divide and is said to be the best in that part of New Mexico.

Russell said that Morrison ran yearling steers there during the years he owned the ranch. Average calf off that range weighs around 400 pounds.

The property adjoins the Hubble Sheep Ranch on the east. The Hubble outfit is said to be the largest sheep ranch in New Mexico, running around 40,000 breeding ewes each year.

According to a recent report that 65 million dollars had been sent into one county, Aroostook in Maine last year to hold the price of potatoes. One or two brook County potato growers get checks for half a million dollars each from Uncle Sam for their 1948 crop. A or so more got government checks for more than \$100,000 each, according to the report.

Bill Smith of Ashland, Me., Francis Reardon of Charles, Mass., a wealthy Boston broker, partners in the Seed Potato Growers at Del Rio, sold 99 per cent of crops to the government for \$5,000.

Records of Fort Fairfield show \$426,000.

Late Harold S. Marke of one sold \$276,000 to the support program.

Others were listed in the report as having sold more than \$100,000 worth of spuds to the government.

There is an estimated 100,000 acres in the county mentioned in the report. In the year ending 30 the Commodity Corporation bought \$67,000 worth of the 1948 potato crop in one county of 100,000 acres.

It was not announced when payment would begin, but it was said that those receiving these special dividends will not be subject to additional income tax thereby. They should not be classed as earned income, inasmuch as they are refunds of the policyholders' own money and no interest is included therein.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION SUMMERIZED

Qualified voters of Texas will vote on ten proposed amendments to the state constitution at the polls Tuesday, November 8. The first publication in the newspapers of Texas was last week and the proposed amendments will appear in a total of three consecutive issues.

One of the most interesting of the proposals is repealing the tax as a voting requisite, and changing the registration system.

Another proposal is removing the sex barrier for jury service. Women have never served on a jury in this state.

It proposes a system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties.

Resolution No. 5 concerns the pension of legislators in lunacy cases without it proposed in No. 32.

Capital districts are proposed in No. 36 and rural fire protection districts in No. 5.

It proposes that the District Judge conduct his proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is being made in No. 10.

It proposes civil service commissions upon vote of the people effective in counties of more than 100,000 population, which makes Terrell County.

The law requires that the names of the candidates be returned by the county clerk within ten days following the date of election which means that members of the new school board will be officially recognized on November 23.

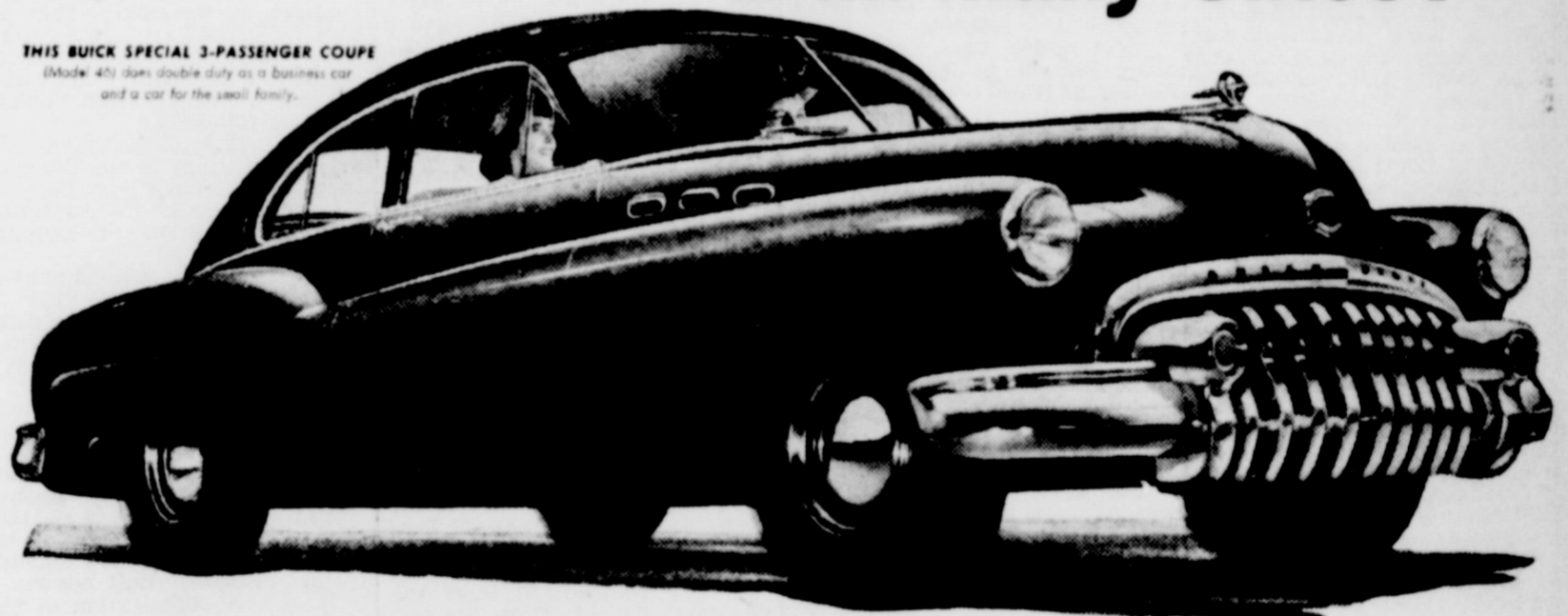

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for a period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such a manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 8, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment in counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature, specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3,600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller.

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of

the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday of January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session.

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered.

Sec. 3. The Amendment's proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified

electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorates of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 6 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in

counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is, hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that no tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the state at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts"; and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32

proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from such judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Leg-

islature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be Numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal

retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election all ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment authorizing a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State, and the Legislature shall be authorized to provide for the same.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

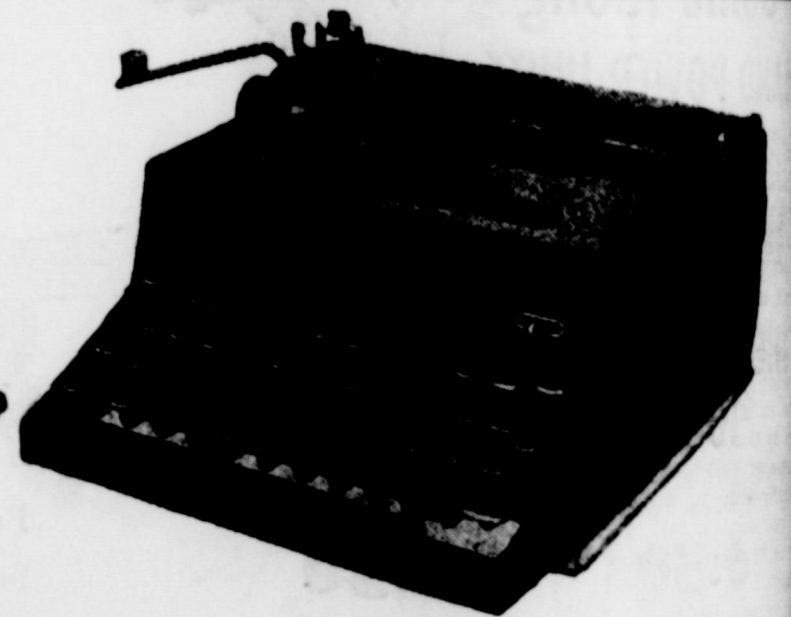
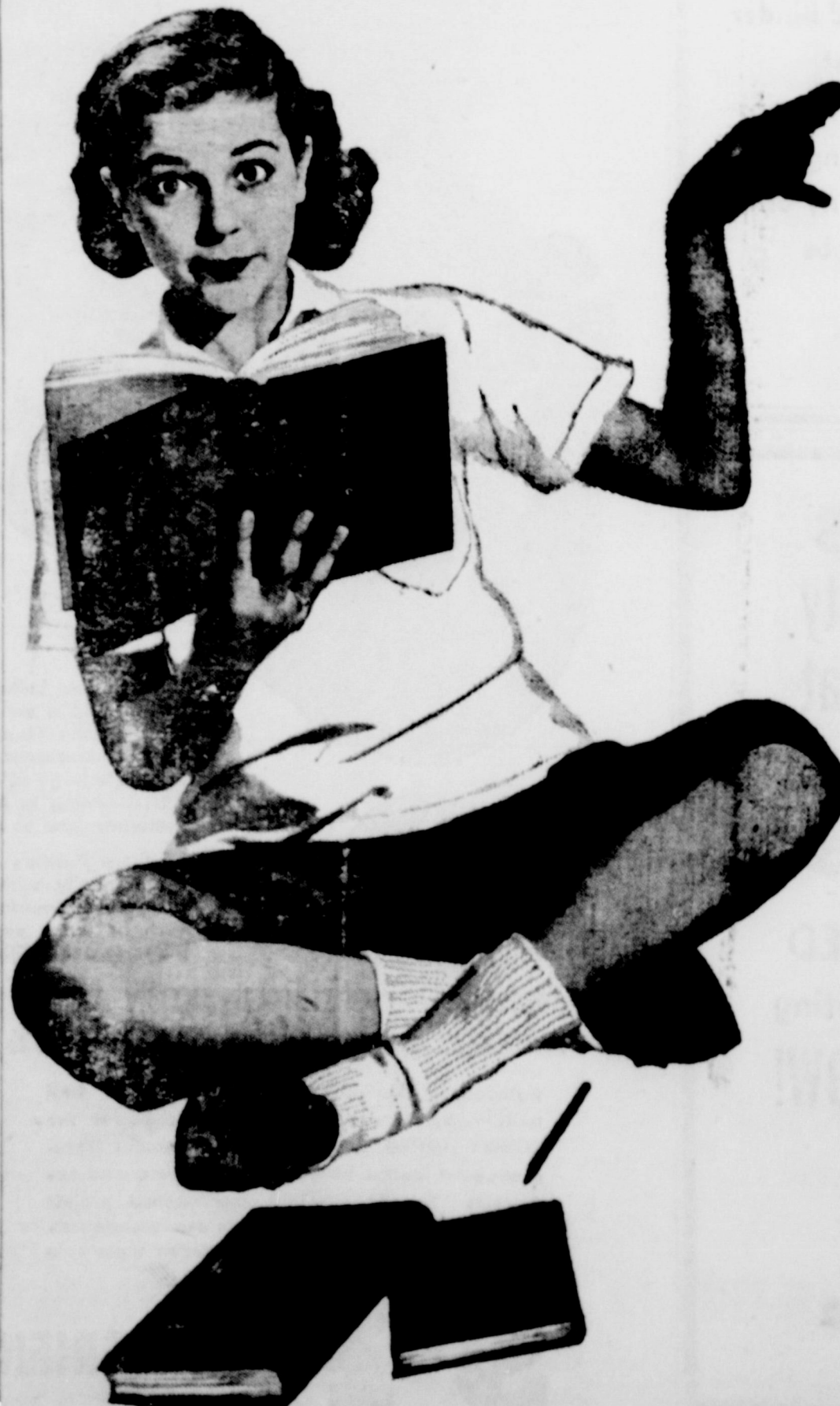
