Judge Walter R. Ely, Jr., of Los Angeles, California, will deliver the main address at the 28th annual reunion of Callahan County pioneers to be held at Treadway Park in Cross Plains Friday, Aug. 12.

Judge Ely is a native of Baird and a member of one of the first families to settle in this section of the county. He is the son of W. R. Ely, an Abilene attorney, and the grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jasper McCoy, who homestead here before the county was organized.

He is judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit, which includes Washington, Oregon, Arizona, Nevada, Montana, Idaho, Alaska Hawaii and Guam.

The reunion will open its one-day stand at 10 a.m. with group singing led by Mrs. Dorothy Boydston Harper of Abilene, followed by the Invocation which will be offered by the Rev. Roger Butler, Cross Plains Baptist pastor. Addresses will then be given by Paul Shanks of Clyde, old settlers president, and Doyle Burchfield, mayor of Cross Plains.

Judge Ely will speak just before the noon hour, at which time basket lunches will be spread by an estimated 2,000 persons.

Program for the afternoon will be devoted to recognition of the earliest settlers in the county, election of officers for the coming year, an old fiddlers contest and square dancing.

B. H. Freeland and James Paul Shanks, both of Baird, and Randall C. Jackson of Abilene will be master of ceremonies for the occasion.

Proposed Amendments To Be Decided Upon In November

Part of the 16 proposed Amendments to the State Constitution, on which voters will decide November 8, are being published in this newspaper.

Among the proposals causing the most discussion are those authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board; voting requirements for armed forces personnel; and repeal of the poll tax.

A chronological list of the proposed amendments is as follows:

1. Taxation of agricultural land.
2. Creation and operation of Airport Authorities.
3. Withdrawal of Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.
4. Terms of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.
5. Establishment of a State-wide Cooperation System of Re-

6. Payment to survivors of firemen.

7. Repeal of poll tax.

8. Voting residence requirements for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and all state-wide races.

9. Create five-member Court of Criminal Appeals.

10. Invalidation of school taxes by any change in boundaries.

11. Texas Water Development Fund.

12. Dissolution of hospital districts.

13. Consolidation of functions of government for any county with more than 1,200,000 population.

14. Armed forces personnel voting requirement.

15. State participation in privately-financed programs.

16. Establishment of date on which newly-elected members of the Legislature shall take office.

Loan Approved For Electric Co-Op

WASHINGTON, D. C. — CONGRESSMAN OMAR BURLISON is pleased to announce the approval of a \$64,000 Rural Electrification Administration loan to the Comanche County Electric Cooperative Association, serving Callahan, Comanche, Eastland, Shackelford, Stephens, Brown and Mills Counties.

This loan is for the purpose of financing construction of 127 miles of distribution line to serve seven hundred new consumers, as well as extensive system improvements including 16 miles of new tie-line and conversion of 63 miles of existing line. Also included in the loan are funds for the construction of a branch headquarters facility to be located at Eastland.

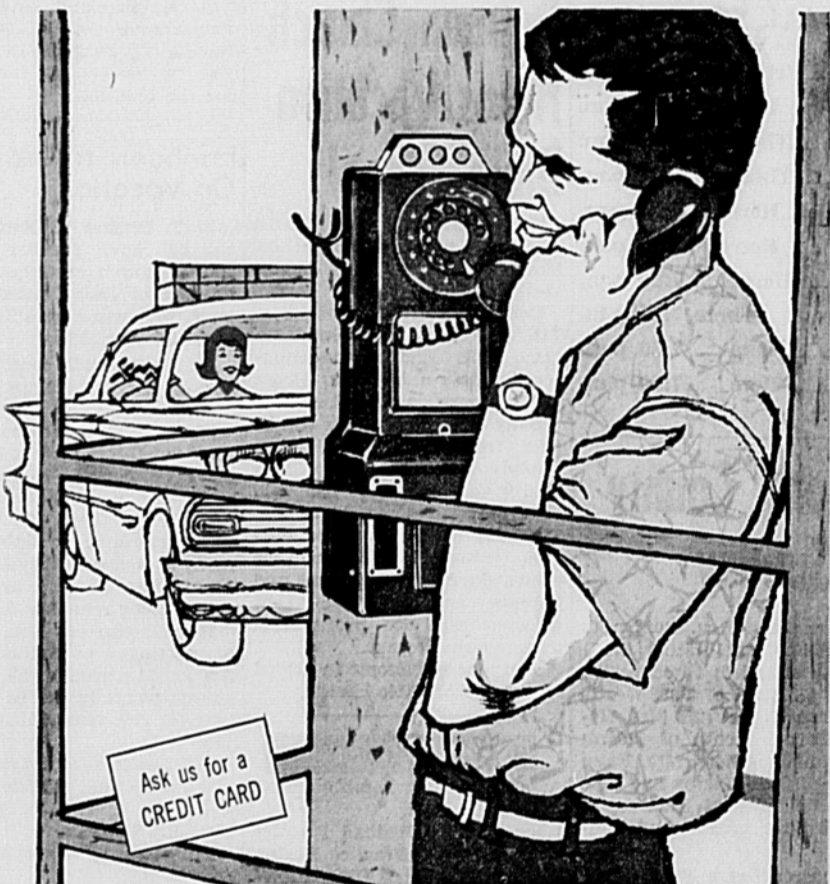

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 65 proposing an Amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that school taxes therefor voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall bonds voted, but unissued, at the time of such change, be invalidated by such change; authorizing the levy of taxes after such change without further election in the district as changed; providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended to be and read as follows:

"Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district and no tax for the maintenance of a junior college district, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unissued, shall be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools or the maintenance of a junior college, as the case may be, and the payment of principal of and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as changed, for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any such independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount or at not to exceed the rate theretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be

subsequently sold and delivered and any voted, but unissued, bonds of other school districts involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 3-b of Article VII of the Constitution of Texas providing that taxes or bonds previously voted in any independent school district or in any junior college district shall not be abrogated, cancelled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizing the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective on and after the date of its adoption.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Section 62 of Article XVI a new subsection to be denominated subsection (c), of said Section 62; authorizing the Legislature to enact laws establishing, subject to the limitations stated, a State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation benefits for the officers and employees of the counties and other political subdivisions of the state, and of the political subdivisions of any county.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a subsection (c) which shall read as follows:

"(c) The Texas Legislature is authorized to enact appropriate laws to provide for a System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for all the officers and employees of a county or other political subdivision of the state, or a political subdivision of a county; providing that when the Texas Legislature has passed the necessary enabling legislation pursuant to the Constitutional authorization, then the governing body of the county, or other political subdivision of the state, or political subdivision of the county shall make the determination as to whether a particular county or other political subdivision of the state, or subdivision of the county participates in this System; providing further that such System shall be operated at the expense of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and providing that the Legislature of the State of Texas shall never make an appropriation to pay the costs of this Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System.

"The Legislature may provide for a voluntary merger into the System herein authorized by this Constitutional Amendment of any System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Benefits which may now exist or that may hereafter be established under subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution; providing further that the Texas Legislature in the enabling statute will make the determination as to the amount of money that will be contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county to the State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits, and the Legislature shall further provide that the amount of money contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or subdivision of the county shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each officer and employee covered by this State-wide System.

"It is the further intention of the Legislature, in submitting this Constitutional Amendment, that the officers and employees of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of a county may be included in those systems regardless of whether the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county participates in the Retirement, Disability and Death Benefit System authorized by this Constitutional Amendment, or whether they participate in a System under the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as the same is herein amended."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officials and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or political subdivisions of a county; authorizing the Legislature to provide for a voluntary merger into the system authorized by this Amendment by those officers and employees covered by the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as now existing or may hereafter be established; providing that costs of this System shall be borne by the counties and other political subdivisions of the state and political subdivisions of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and forbidding the Legislature from making any appropriations for the operation of this System."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of such amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said proposed Amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas, and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 79 proposing an amendment to Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding Section 1-d to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-d to read as follows:

"Section 1-d. (a) All land owned by natural persons which is designated for agricultural use in accordance with the provisions of this Section shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use. 'Agricultural use' means the raising of livestock or growing of crops, fruit, flowers, and other products of the soil under natural conditions as a business venture for profit, which business is the primary occupation and source of income of the owner.

"(b) For each assessment year the owner wishes to qualify his land under provisions of this Section as designated for agricultural

use he shall file with the local tax assessor a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted.

"(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as to agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.

"(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

"(e) No land may qualify for the designation provided for in this Act unless for at least three (3) successive years immediately preceding the assessment date the land has been devoted exclusively for agricultural use, or unless the land has been continuously developed for agriculture during such time.

"(f) Each year during which the land is designated for agricultural use, the local tax assessor shall note on his records the valuation which would have been made had the land not qualified for such designation under this Section. If designated land is subsequently diverted to a purpose other than that of agricultural use, or is sold, the land shall be subject to an additional

tax. The additional tax shall equal the difference between taxes paid or payable, hereunder, and the amount of tax payable for the preceding three years had the land been otherwise assessed. Until paid, there shall be a lien for additional taxes and interest on land assessed under the provisions of this Section.

"(g) The valuation and assessment of any minerals and subsurface rights to minerals shall not come within the provisions of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide that all land owned by natural persons designated for agricultural use shall be assessed for all tax purposes on the consideration of only those factors relative to such agricultural use."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Never has the Texas Legislature had money problems like those it will face in 1967.

Although the fact has been little publicized, state agencies are requesting an unprecedented \$1,200,000,000 in appropriations from the general revenue fund during the next biennium. This figure does not include activities financed by extensive special fund revenues and federal aid. Neither does it allow for the \$120,000,000 pay raise sought by school teachers.

By way of comparison, present general revenue appropriations add up to \$623,900,000, so the agencies are seeking almost twice as much as they now are getting from tax sources controlled by the Legislature.

Sharp pruning is inevitable before official budget proposals are submitted to lawmakers by Gov. John Connally and the Legislative Budget Board. Making the task more difficult is the fact that the bulk of requested increases would go to such worthy purposes as:

Improved education, new community action programs for mental health and mental retardation, tuberculosis control, Medicare implementation, park improvements, a \$50,000,000 mental hospital and special school building program, water facilities and pollution control, new prison buildings and a pay raise for state employees.

Financial authorities estimate state Taxes would have to be

raised \$400,000,000 to meet the new spending demands.

Most of the demands, of course, will not be met. But high ranking officials, including House Speaker Ben Barnes, see a tax bill in the magnitude of \$2,000,000,000 shaping.

Although most forecasters are predicting that a sales tax hike of one per cent is inevitable, look for a "surprise" revenue bill with top-level backing.

CONNALLY BACKS SENTENCE — Governor Connally, returning to this capital city while it still was numbed with shock and grief over the senseless sniper slaying of 13 at The University of Texas, suggested a new state law ordering mandatory life prison sentences for insane killers.

Connally said he is considering a recommendation for a non-parolable life sentence because too many criminals escape extended punishment on pleas of insanity.

The governor, who cut short a South American tour after the August 1 UT tower murders, also directed the State Department of Public Safety to gather all facts on sniper Charles J. Whitman, an ex-Marine and honor student. He further directed

a study of Whitman's brain by a conference of medical experts at M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston.

Connally said he does not believe the August 1 tragedies, which "could have occurred in any city of the world," will reflect on Texas or Austin.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith promptly directed the Texas Legislative Council to study the feasibility of enacting mandatory life imprisonment provisions for accused killers pleading insanity.

LAWMAKERS DECLINE NOMINATIONS — Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa and State Rep. Bill Satterwhite of Ennis served official notice they are declining Democratic nominations for re-election.

Rogers' completely unexpected decision to return to private law practice leaves the job of naming his successor to Democratic county chairmen in the Panhandle counties he long represented. Satterwhite accepted a job with the Lone Star Gas Company in Dallas.

Republicans say the bow-out of Rogers will improve chances of their congressional nominee, Bob Price of Pampa, who ran strong in 1964.

HISTORIC SUIT ENDS —

Prompt appeal of final judgment in the 11-year-long lawsuit over Rio Grande Valley water rights is expected to be filed soon.

District Judge J. H. Starley of Pecos entered the judgment, ending the trial of controversy last week at Edinburg.

A 100-page decree covers U. S. share of water at Falcon Dam and the Rio Grande flow below the reservoir. Case will have far-reaching effect on land values and water use in Hidalgo, Cameron, Willacy and Starr counties.

Judgment proposes division of water among irrigation districts and independent pumpers on a priority system in five categories. It doubles amount of water previously allowed cities in preliminary judgment but retains acreage basis of figuring allotment.

MILLIONS FROM LEASE SALE — State permanent school fund received more than \$5,800,000 from oil and gas lease sale on 101,236 acres.

Total of 143 tracts were leased for average of \$55.35 an acre. Fifty-two tracts in the Gulf of Mexico leased for \$3,800,000.

SHORT SNORTS — State Board of Education can contract with Department of Corrections for production of Braille textbooks for blind, At. Gen. Waggoner Carr held in official opinion.

Texas will need to spend \$500,000,000 a year in new highway construction by 1985 to keep up with growth, predicts a State

Highway Department Study. This is \$152,000,000 more than in 1965.

House Speaker Ben Barnes has announced September 16 symposium here on children's language disabilities. About 2,500 are expected to attend.

July revenues from cigarette taxes increased \$1,300,000 over 1965 but declined from previous month by nearly \$1,000,000.

Hearings on the Nueces River Basin water plan are set for August 12 at Carrizo Springs and August 16 at Corpus Christi.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has set September 1 to October 30 in the North Zone and September 24 to October 30 in the South Zone, except for special dates for those counties having whitewing dove.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has announced that the fourth Oil and Gas Lease Sale for 1966 on Permanent Free School Lands will be Tuesday, November 1, and the deadline for nominations is September 16.

Dr. James E. Peavy, State Health Commissioner, says the basic document upon which an expected \$17,500,000 will be granted to eligible Texas health facilities has been completed and the department will apply for the federal grants.

Tom McCrummen Jr. of Austin was sworn in as a member

of the State Securities Board, replacing Maurice R. Bullock of Midland.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

Divorce is usually an unfortunate experience that both parties would like to forget as soon as possible. However, many divorced couples forget to settle their tax affairs as a part of the divorce settlement. Under the community property laws in Texas, each spouse is entitled to half of the income and/or community deductions from the income, up to the date of divorce. This is true regardless of which spouse earned the income. It pays to get your tax affairs straightened out at the time of the divorce instead of getting into a tax audit.

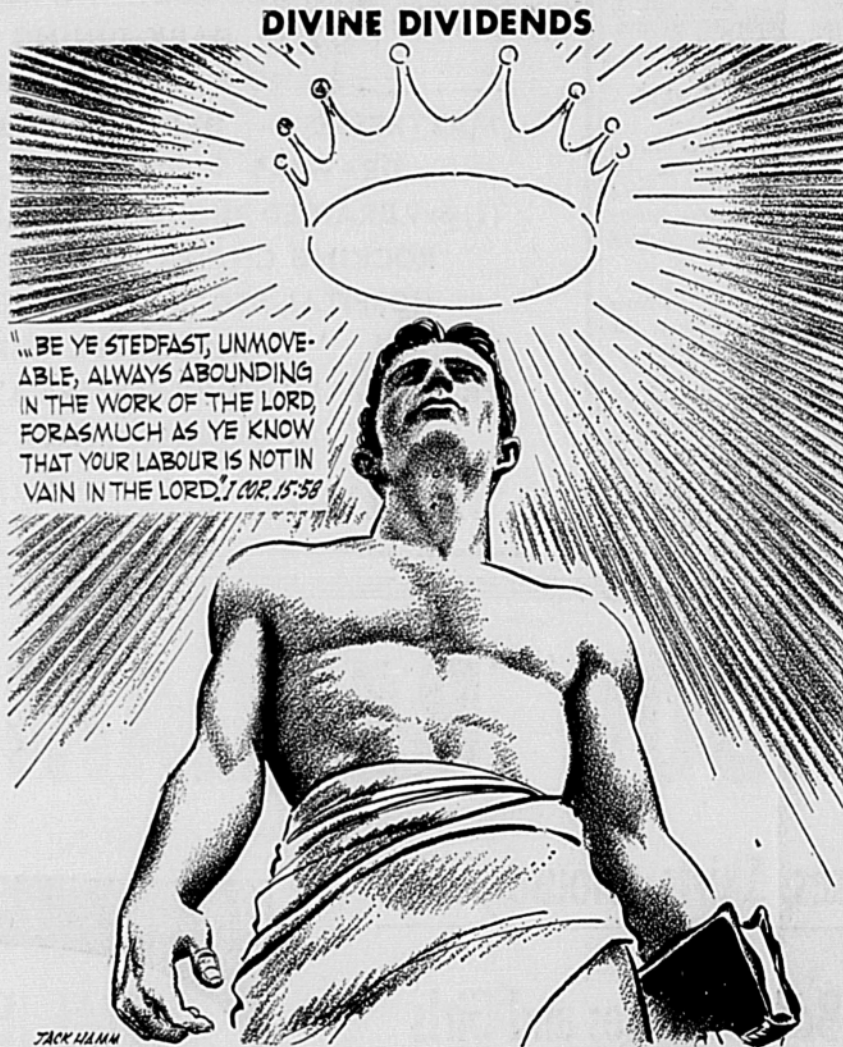

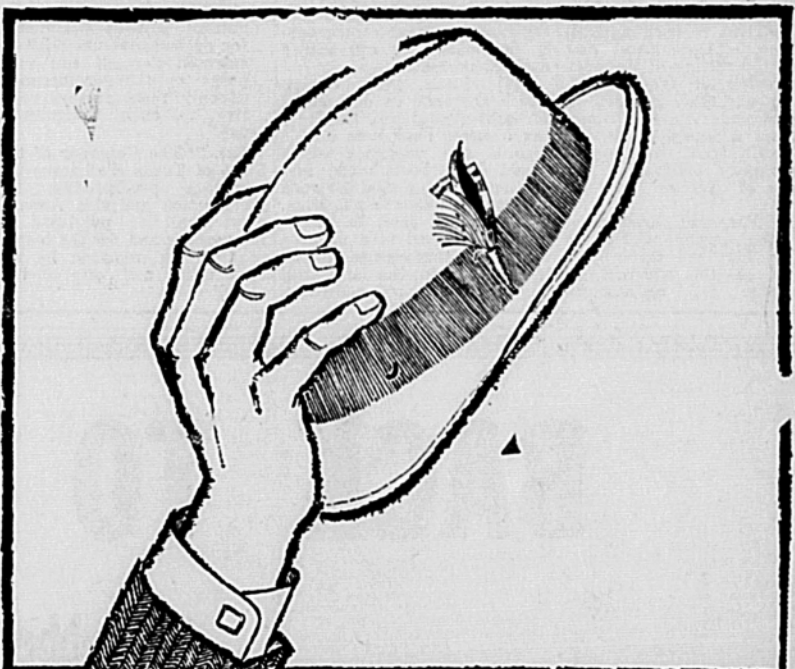

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the terms of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 30c. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the governing body of a political subdivision of the State created to further the purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, of this Constitution, shall never exceed six years.

(b) Statutory provisions enacted before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, relating to the terms of office of governing bodies of political subdivisions created to further the

purposes of Section 52, Article III, or Section 59, Article XVI, are validated, so long as the provisions do not provide for a term of office which exceeds six years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.



Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 12; authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties; authorizing the creation of a board of directors by appointment or election; providing that the membership of the board shall be based upon the proportionate part of the population of each county, with no county having less than one member; providing for the necessary election; authorizing the levy of an annual tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; authorizing the Authority to employ or appoint an assessor and collector of taxes whose duty it shall be to assess and collect the taxes on the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors of said Authority, said taxes to be assessed equally and uniformly throughout the county or counties, comprising the Authority, as required by the Constitution; granting to such Authority the power to acquire by purchase, or through eminent domain proceedings existing publicly financed airport properties or other sites necessary to have and to improve the same, power to issue and sell general obligation bonds and revenue bonds, or either of them; authorizing the assumption of outstanding indebtedness secured by general obligation bonds and assuming the obligations of the city or cities under ordinances and bond indentures under which revenue bonds have been issued and sold; to enact zoning regulations and other measures to protect the airport facilities from hazards and obstructions; providing for the adding of an additional county or counties to the Authority.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 12, reading as follows:

"Section 12. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of

Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, with power to issue general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, either or both of them, for the purchase, acquisition by the exercise of the power of eminent domain or otherwise, construction, reconstruction, repair or renovation of any airport or airports, landing fields and runways, airport buildings, hangars, facilities, equipment, fixtures, and any and all property, real or personal, necessary to operate, equip and maintain an airport; shall provide for the election by the governing body of the city or cities whose airport facilities are served by certificated airlines and whose facility or some interest therein, is proposed to be or has been acquired by the Authority, to either appoint or elect a Board of Directors of said Authority; if the Directors are appointed such appointment shall be made by the County Commissioners Court after consultation with and consent of the governing body or bodies of such city or cities, and if the Board of Directors is elected they shall be elected by the qualified taxpayers voters of the county which chooses to elect the Directors to represent that county, such Directors shall serve without compensation for a term fixed by the Legislature not to exceed six (6) years, and shall be selected on the basis of the proportionate population of each county based upon the last preceding Federal Census, and shall be a resident or residents of such county; provide that no county shall have less than one (1) member on the Board of Directors; provide for the holding of an election in each county proposing the creation of an Authority to be called by the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts, as the case may be, upon petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxpayers voters within the county or counties, said elections to be held on the same day if more than one county is included, provided that no more than one (1) such election may be called in a county until after the expiration of one (1) year; in the event such an election has failed, and thereafter only upon a petition of ten per cent (10%) of the qualified taxpayers voters being presented to the Commissioners Court or the Commissioners Courts of the county or counties in which such an election has failed, and in the event that two or more counties vote on the proposition of the creation of an Authority therein, the proposition shall not be deemed to carry unless the majority of the qualified taxpayers voters in each county voting

thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that an Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for a two or more county Authority or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property, provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority, said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certificated airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities, or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certificated airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from

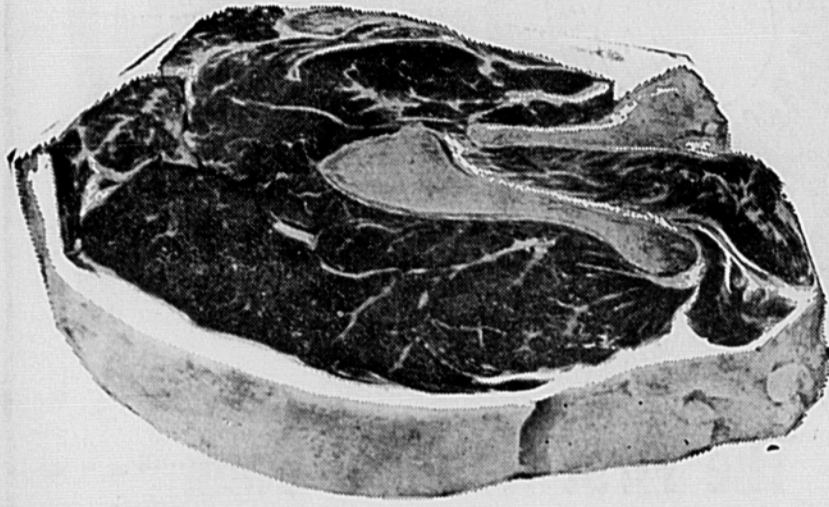
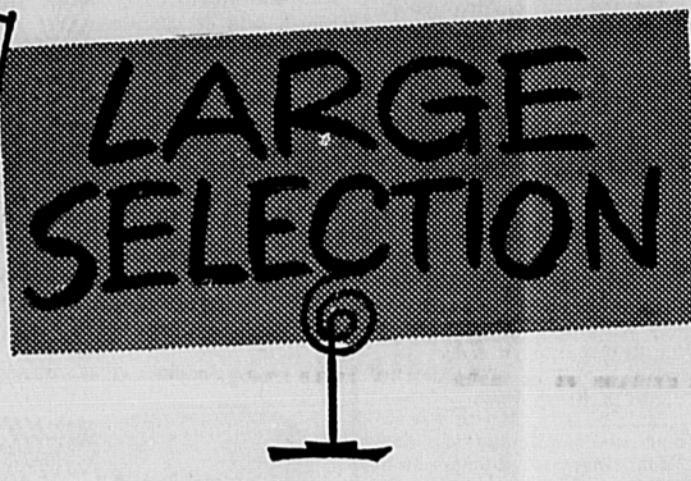
hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority if a petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxpayers voters is filed with and an election is called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority and the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the then existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be so added to the then existing Authority shall be given representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."

"AGAINST the addition of Section 12 of Article IX of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, and authorizing the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of all taxable property within such Airport Authority except the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets, after approval of its voters."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
