

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the terms of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:
"Section 30c. (a) The terms of office of persons serving on the first monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."
"AGAINST the Constitutional AMENDMENT of the provisions do not provide for a term of office which exceeds six years."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment changing the maximum term of office of directors of conservation and reclamation districts from two to six years."
