is acting drum major. The band did intricate marching patterns and favored the fans with several numbers.

Early in the third period the Eagles again scored with the honors repeated by Smith on an 80 yard tote. Following the kickoff the Clint team came to life and began a rally that ended with their only score for the night. The kickoff was returned to their own 29 yard line. They completed a pass to the Sanderson 46, good for 25 yards, they made 11 yards rushing and another pass good for 14 yards. After getting the best end of a 5

yard penalty, they made a first down, leaving only 4 yards for scoring. They crossed the double stripe and failed to convert the extra point.

The plays following the Clint kickoff set up another Eagle TD that was run across by Hill A Smith to Hill pass gained the extra point.

Clint punted the ball after 3 plays from the kickoff. The kick went to the Sanderson 39 yard line. Line plays put the ball on the Sanderson 45 from where Smith scored another touchdown. The third period ended soon after the ensuing kickoff.

The second string Eagle team came into the game in force right after the beginning of the last period. They soon intercepted a Clint pass and Jack Talbot with the ball scooted 54 yards through the middle for a touchdown. The following kickoff was fumbled and Saenz recovered the ball on the Clint 40. The B boys failed to make their first down and punted to the Clint team who returned the ball to their own 30 yard line.

Clint made three first downs and were in a threatening position when they lost the ball on downs. The A string came back into the game and Saenz took the ball and ran 80 yards for another Eagle TD.

Hill intercepted a pass after the next kick and ran 50 yards for the final Eagle touchdown. Coach M. B. England and his boys are to be commended for their sportmanship throughout the game. The entire team was playing with fire and determination that was witnessed by fans who watched the Eagles of last year.

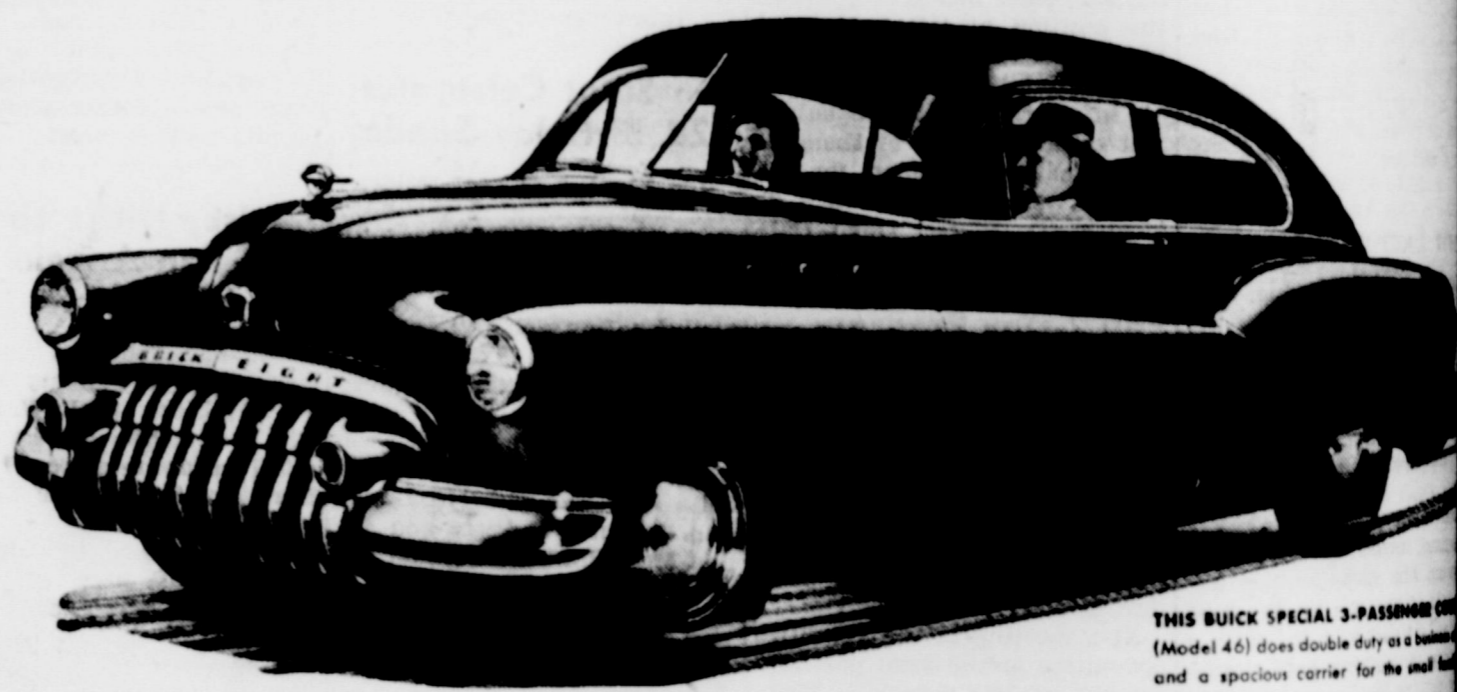
