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THE LADY AND HER TAX BILL

(Editor's note: The following thoughts, gleaned from a recent address of Representative Marshall O. Bell of San Antonio to several women's organizations, and reprinted from the January issue of South Texan, official publication of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce, emphasize some little known facts about the impact of taxes on the average American woman.)

The average American woman is the most perfect taxpayer the world has ever known. Year by year she pays more and more, but, if she fully realizes the facts and the position she occupies, she might not be so complacent and long-suffering.

Let us observe a few simple matters that might awaken and startle our lady taxpayers. Women own or are their children's trustees for, approximately seventy per cent of the wealth of the United States. Yes, women own and control seventy per cent of the cash, stocks, bonds, insurance and real estate that constitutes our real and personal property.

cent of the costs when our interest and dividends are reduced or your cost of living is thereby increased. Have you ladies thought of this?

The record further shows that women buy eighty-four per cent of all merchandise. Consequently, when the price of food, clothing, cosmetics, etc. is raised by higher taxes and you and your children must take less for your family needs, you realize that you are caught in a vicious circle and you must reduce your standard of living accordingly.

Further, there are more than three widows for every widower. Most insurance is carried by a man for the benefit of his wife and minor children. The insurance dollar which you invest fifteen and twenty years ago provided security when a husband died, today has a value of fifty-nine cents on the pre-war dollar, and next year it may be worth less. Yes, the security the average woman wants and needs is being substantially reduced by taxes, direct and indirect.

Now let us consider the so-called luxury taxes. Every man expects his wife to be charming and attractive, but practically every item that the ladies need in this important enterprise is taxed at a high rate. A man can buy his suit, overcoat, and shaving cream, without the luxury taxes of twenty per cent but when a woman buys a jar of beauty cream, a fur coat, costume jewelry, lipstick, powder, nail polish, or many other modern day necessities, the twenty per cent tax applies.

Let us go a little further and

see what a high income tax can do. As previously shown women own and control seventy per cent of our national wealth, so it follows that they and their property must pay seventy per cent of the taxes. When the earnings of different companies are cut down the interest and dividends on bonds and stocks may be reduced or even stopped, so the income of the woman is directly affected. When taxes on real estate become excessive the net rental on houses or business property are lowered. As the interest rate on loans or investment falls, the revenues for the woman and her minor children is taken away materially.

Well by now maybe the average woman begins to realize that she has a personal interest in the taxes she pays. But there is an important item she should not overlook. There are two per cent more women voters than men, as recently pointed out by President Truman. Does this not give you ladies an idea? It has been said that in recent years ours has become a government of organized minorities. It appears that there is considerable truth in that statement. If so, why don't the good women who pay seventy per cent of the taxes directly and indirectly, organize their majority group into a tax forum, study these matters carefully, then step into politics in a most active and aggressive manner. I feel your voice would be promptly heard and your requests for sound and economical government quickly granted. It has been said that a

politician looks from one election to the next election. Under these conditions I am certain you would get his eye and attention.

Recently former President Herbert Hoover pointed out that the average man contributed each year about sixty-one days out of 235 days of his working time to pay taxes. Yes, the average family is paying more than one-fourth of its income for taxes. England turned socialist when the tax rate took thirty-eight per cent of the average worker's pay, so we are closer to the turning point that we realize.

If the women of America do not alert themselves to the tax danger, and act, then they have only themselves to blame. Yes, it may be later than we think!

KITCHEN MEMO BY JEAN CLARKE

Like ripe olives, some people love bread pudding, others abhor it. Molasses Bread Pudding, because of its high flavor, will convert the bread pudding-haters in your family. It contains plenty of body-building iron. Arrange 10 slices diced stale bread in a well-greased baking dish. Beat together 2 eggs, 3 tbsps. molasses, 2 tbsps. sugar, 1/4 tsp. salt. Add 2 cups scalded milk, 2 tbsps. melted butter and pour over the bread cubes. Put baking dish in pan of hot water and bake in moderate gas oven of 350° F. for one hour or until firm. Serves 6.

A coarse quarter-inch wire mesh fastened under the register of your gas floor furnace will catch dust particles. Clean it occasionally to keep free passage for hot air.

Added flavor for gravy: Stir in a bouillon cube while the gravy is cooking.

Store meat or poultry unwrapped in your gas refrigerator because contact with the air delays spoiling.

The rusty scale that drops down from the bottom of your automatic gas water heater should be brushed off the burner about twice a year.

While your noodle soup is simmering on the top burner, add chopped green pepper and chopped pimiento. Or parsley can take the place of the pepper.
