## LISTEN TO LUKE

In a more serious tone: Below is a reprint of an editorial that appeared in the Dal Rio News Herald July 25. The writer, Bruce Boisjoly, expresses our views better than we can and we hope in reading it we are not infringing on the rights of the writer or the newspaper in which it appears. The editorial captioned "Some Take the Joy in Our Reverses" is the U. S. Troops Fight For All".

Two currents abroad in the world must be observed rather than by Americans. One flows directly from our military reserves in Korea, the other from the wider struggle between the U. S. and the Soviet Union.

News men in Europe report that good many Europeans have been gaining smug pleasure from the early defeat of our troops in the Far East.

It is not surprising to enjoy seeing trouble descend on the big fellow who has been telling everybody else pretty much what to do.

Nobody is ever too fond of the man who gives the orders or takes the chief suggestions.

Yet Americans must hope this sentiment is distinctly a minority view. They would hate to believe that party resentments would find large expression among free men.

Any sensible person here, or in Europe or Asia, if he has the facts, knows the U. S. forces have been battling against big handicaps in Korea. Time will be needed to make our strength count. The man who cannot put that perspective in America's performance is poorly qualified to judge events.

More unfortunate than this reaction that has grown up in certain European and Asiatic countries is the cold war is strictly U. S.-Russian power fight. According to this view, the wise course is to steer clear of this struggle between two stubborn giants — if possible.

Nothing could be more unfair or shortsighted. One would think the U. S. had asked to be plunged into the cold war. But it's evident to anyone with an appetite for realities that our role as adversary to Russia was thrust upon us, that we accepted it grudgingly because every other nation defaulted.

It is wrong to imply, as these could-be neutrals do, that the U. S. is blind to reasonable prospects of peace and is obstinately committed to settling accounts with Russia at whatever cost.

In truth, this country is fighting the cold war — as it is fighting the war in Korea — for every free man who walks the earth. In every sense it is the champion of liberty in its gravest hour.

Up to now foreign people could have had — and did have — sincere doubts what America would do when the showdown stage came. And this despite the Marshall plan, the North Atlantic Pact, foreign arms and "Point 4" economic help.

But our action in Korea, however short of its goals thus far, in a conclusive answer to all doubters. We are pouring our substance and the lifeblood of our soldiers into battle 7,000 miles from home. To be sure, we need to do a great deal more, but our goal is right.

In such a crisis for liberty, it behooves a free man anywhere to smile smugly at our reverses, or to declare that it is not his fight.

If he does not make it his fight the Russians may some day be around knocking at his door. And then that smile will disappear.

## Brooks-Ramsey Booked for August Run-Off for Lt. Gov.

Pierce Brooks, who campaigned Texas with a hillbilly caravan "Pappy" style and the quiet Ben Ramsey, veteran politician have locked horns for a run-off for the office of Lieutenant Governor.

The two high candidates from the sweep-stake field seeking the office have announced that all-

out campaigning will be continued until the August election.

A run-off for agriculture commissioner with incumbent J. E. McDonald way out ahead but lacking a majority over the three opponents was assured. John C. White of Wichita County and Charlie McLellan of Eagle Lake were close together for second and third.

Robert A. Lattimore of Dallas led the ticket for the court of criminal appeals with W. A. Morrison of Cameron second, placing the two in a run-off, while Place 1 in the State Supreme Court will be contested in August by Will Wilson of Dallas and Fagan Dickson of Austin.

Meade Griffin of Plainview will go against George Harwood of Dallas for the Place 3 in the State Supreme Court.

It is predicted that a light vote will be cast in Terrell County because of the lack of local candidates being driven into a run-off. The Congressional race here will no doubt attract many voters, however, and much interest has become evident in that race.

## DOROTHY GURLEY HAS MAJORITY FOR REPRESENTATIVE

Mrs. Dorothy Gillis Gurley maintained her majority in the race for representative of the 87th Legislative District after completion of the returns of Saturday's primary. Her majority was 20 votes in unofficial returns Wednesday and a little likelihood of opposition in a run-off reported.

James F. House of Sanderson received 245 votes in Terrell County against 51 for Mrs. Gurley and 10 for Thomas M. Connor of Alpine.

## Local Wool House Stocks Medicines For Ranch Needs

The Sanderson Wool Commission Co. has bought the stock of medicines, drenches and vaccines from the Haley Supply to add to their stock of needs for the ranchman. The Haley Supply closed its doors this week after Hollis Haley, owner, began making preparations to take over the management of a ranch near Langtry.

Johnny Williams, owner of the wool warehouse, said that they would make every effort to meet the needs of the ranchers' demands for stock supplies but that the business would not be in a position to furnish a man to do drenching for the ranchmen.

"Johnny Appleseed" had nothing on "Texas Bob" when it comes to spreading joy and an appreciation of life.

Alfred H. Lang, who calls San Angelo his home, was in Sanderson the first of the week selling packets of bluebonnet seeds and giving away more inspiration than the small cost of the seeds. "Texas Bob", as he is called over the state, began his enterprise after hearing the talk of passers-by as they praised the beautiful fields of bluebonnets in bloom while he lived at Mason Lang was handicapped by the loss of his right leg several years ago, and being raised without the benefit of an education was handicapped in more ways than one. He began work on ranches at the age of 14 and says "too many horses fell on my leg" accounts for the loss of the limb.

Lang, for several years, gathered his seeds and packaged them himself and was limited to a small area for sales but, since finding a ready market for the beautiful flowers, has determined to make the state each year and as he goes about he builds up for the next year. ### GROUP TO URGE FREE ENTERPRISE IN STATE AFFAIRS

P. V. Spears, local druggist, and Frank Weigand, service station and tourist courts operator, were named as members of the board of directors to the Texas Association of Employers at a meeting at the courthouse here Wednesday afternoon.

Will Bacon, civil engineer, of San Antonio, spoke to a group of citizens who were called for the mass meeting at 2 o'clock. Mr. Bacon has been on the board of directors of the association for the past four years and has been active in the work of compiling data for the group to use in suggested legislation Bacon told of the danger of the State of Texas having to levy an income tax, excess profits tax or some similar revenue raising method unless another means of meeting the state's expenditures are forthcoming.

The grave danger of this country falling into a welfare state was stressed by the speaker who has seen first hand evidence of the plan in England.

"Land values are of no concern to the organization," Mr. Bacon said. "Taxes are levied on valuation of the counties of the state. But what we are interested in is the unfair practice of tax-exempt property in the name of religious and educational groups who are operating business in a competitive capacity."

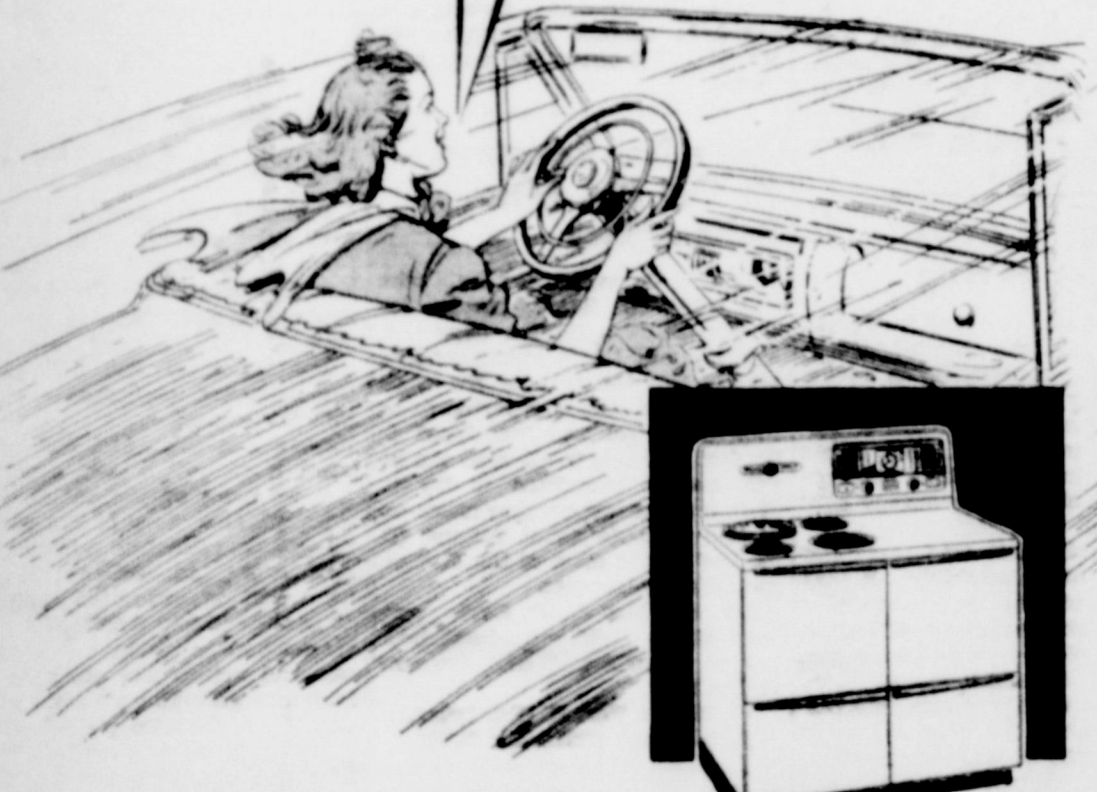
From where I sit... by Joe Marsh

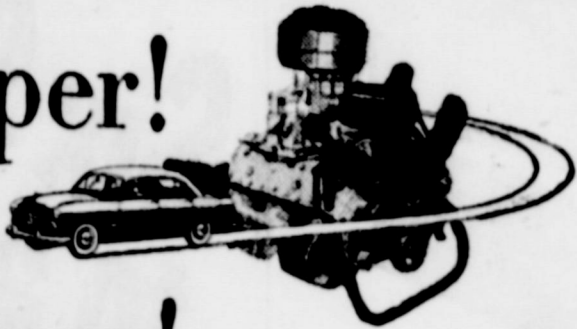

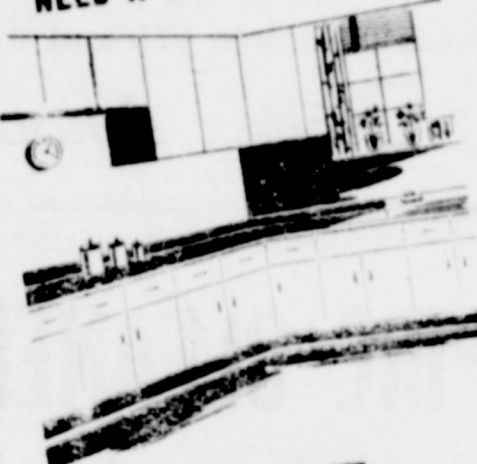

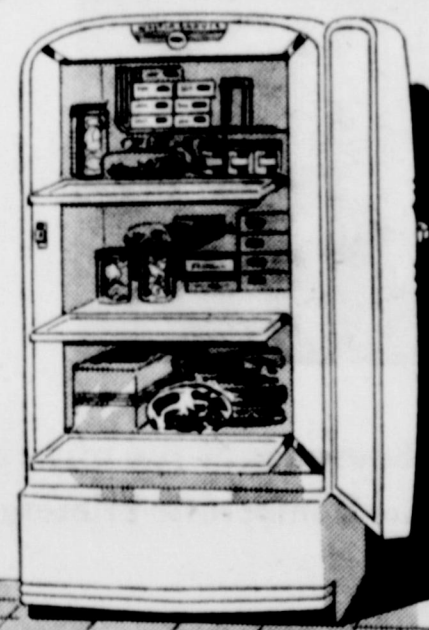
