IS THIS A RECORD TO BE PROUD OF?

1. Failure to support our allies in Korea

Ken Regan voted twice against economic aid to Korea. The first time, the proposal was defeated by one vote — 192 to 191. He voted against it again when it was finally approved by Congress. If dollars had been spent sooner in Korea, the United States probably would not be spending the lives of our young men then today.

2. Failure to look after the farmer's interests

The Pace Bill is designed to make the growing of cotton a monopoly of the worn out areas of the South at the expense of the 16th Congressional District. Ken Regan said he was against the Pace Bill. He voted to amend it, and lost. Then he switched around and helped to keep it alive by voting against sending it back to a committee.

3. Failure to support a fair minimum wage

Ken Regan voted against the 75-cent-an-hour wage standard approved by the last Congress for employees of business concerns engaged in interstate commerce. Instead, he supported a Republican-sponsored compromise proposal designed to keep down the wage scale and to fill the law with loopholes. Ask your self: 'Can a working man support himself and his family on less than \$6.00 a day?'

4. Failure to fight high freight rates

The Bulwinkle Bill, which was sponsored by the railroads, allows the railroad to fix freight rates with only the formal aproval of the Interstate Commerce Commission. It was another move to keep high freight rated pinned on the Southwest. Ken Regan not only failed to fight the measure. He voted for it.

5. Failure to provide facilities for veterans

Ken Regan took office at a time when construction of a Veteran's Hospital in the 16th Congressional District — near Ysleta — seemed to be a certainly.

Today, plans for the hospital have all but been abandoned. In addition, the number of beds allotted to veterans at William Beaumont General Hospital has been drastically reduced.






