The club wishes all donors to write his or her name inside the book so that students who read that book year after year will know who cared. Perhaps you wish the book to go to a certain class, from a student in that class! An ideal gift! Or you could give a book

or books in memory of an ex-student. — The idea is — help the club to help the school library. The second step the Junior Woman's Club plans to undertake is to be a secret for the time. But — (a hint) I can say everyone will have a real good time! More about that next month!

ment to the Constitution of the United States providing for the abolition of the electoral college. Congressman Gossett is the only member of the Texas delegation that has been outspoken in his disapproval of many of the administration's policies. Speaker Sam Rayburn, who recently was recognized for his long term as speaker of the House, has been kept pretty busy for the most of his long tenure in that high position making apologies to the people of Texas for the failures of the administration. He has tried to explain away all the inconsistent moves of the state department but has had little to say to the people of Texas about what, if anything, could or would be done by the Congress to help rectify those mistakes. Having lived in Wichita Falls for some time, this writer is pretty well acquainted with the record of the Hon. Ed Gossett. We know him to be a fearless, straightforward man who will fight for his convictions. He has the best in-

terests of the Democratic party and the nation at heart and his resolution, if adopted, will help this country to get back to the principle of majority rule. If we had the space we would give more of what the Gossett Resolution stands for. In a few words, it would:

- (1) Abolish our fictitious electoral college.
- (2) Abolish electors.
- (3) Provide for direct voting for President and Vice President.
- (4) Retain the electoral vote of each state as at present, but provide that such electoral vote be divided in exact ratio with the popular vote.

Some benefits of the proposed reform are:

- (1) We will have absolutely democratic elections, everybody's vote counts for the person for whom cast.
- (2) There will be little opportunity for fraud or pressure-group control.
- (3) There will be no tie votes; the high man wins.
- (4) Sectionalism will be largely abated.

Regan Busy On Lands Committee

The House Public Lands Committee to which Representative Ken Regan, 16th District, has just been re-appointed for another two years, will bear a much heavier burden because of the national defense effort.

In fact, members of the committee have decided that "Public Lands" does not describe accurately or sufficiently the duties of the committee, so there is a movement on to change the name of the committee.

In the Senate, the comparable group is known as Interior and Insular Affairs Committee. Such would be much more accurate a designation, believes Regan and other members of the committee.

The House Public Lands Committee works through seven subcommittees. Congressman Regan is chairman of the mines and mining sub-committee which has to do with mineral resources of the public lands, mineral land laws, plains and entry thereon, geological survey, mining schools and experiment stations, petroleum conservation on public lands and conservation of radium supply in the United States.

The subject matter under jurisdiction of the committee includes: Public lands, generally, including entry, easements and grazing, forfeiture of land grants and alien ownership, alien ownership of mineral lands.

Forest preserves and national parks and battle fields and national cemeteries, preservation of prehistoric ruins and objects of interest on public domain.

Irrigation and Reclamation, water supply for recreation projects, easements for irrigation, acquisition of private lands to complete irrigation projects, apportionment of water through interstate compact commissions.

Territorial and Insular affairs and measures relating particularly to Hawaii, Alaska and island possessions except those relating to revenue and appropriations.

Indian affairs including the relations of the United States with

Indians and tribes, measures relating to their care, education, and management, including care and allotment of Indian lands and general and special measures, relating to claims and payments from Indian funds.
