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LISTEN TO LUKE

An open letter to Senator Tom Connally, Senate Office Building, Washington, D. C., Senator Lyndon B. Johnson, Senate Office Building, Washington, D. C., and Congressman Ken Regan, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C.

Dear Sirs: Being aware of your responsibility to your constituents, and of your knowledge of the demands of the American people as regards the fundamental rights held so dear to the hearts of the American people in all history of our country, this column desires to make known to your office our wishes in legislation matters that can so vitally change our American way of life.

Our President has been quoted as saying that this is no time for petty political bickering. We want to take him at his word and ask you to represent us as you have promised to do, without considering the political favor of any proposed legislation — do not be misled by the false assumption and threat that if you do anything contrary to the administration's recommendations it will certainly lead to an all-out World War II.

We are particularly interested at this time with seeing the entire Texas delegation go on record as opposing HR 3871 and S. 287 asking that Congress amend the Defense Act empowering the President:

1. To take any real estate and personal property he wishes and build what he thinks best.

2. To take, purchase or build factories or industries to make what he wishes and market it as he pleases.

3. To control all residential rents selectively and to roll some back a year.

4. To administer all commercial rents as he deems best for all non-residential property and exempting only farms.

5. To regulate credit for all real estate and so control the market and your business.

If such controls over our lives and fortunes are handed to one man by Congress, representative government is gone. This is DICTATORSHIP.

The people of this section of Texas are not going to sit idly by and watch our liberties slip from us in this manner. You men have been selected to work for us in Washington. You were not sent here to be "yes men" to anything that is proposed by an administration that seeks to press us all into a common mold, to be cogs in its own machine.

The investigation in the Senate committee hearing the testimony of the MacArthur episode is pre-emptive clear proof that partisan politics is weighed above the good of the country and the value of thousands of American lives lost in the conflict which is called by me a "police action."

The citizens of this country are all up on hearing the "backs and fronts" of General Marshall, whether or not's of General Bradley, and the "as of now's" of General Collins. You gentlemen are in position to know that what you may say or fail to say will put General MacArthur back where he belongs. There seems to be little need for the committee to continue the "caucus report" that seems to be edited to the convenience of the administration. What do you want your fellows to do up here is to forget Harry S. Truman, General MacArthur or any other individual or party and keep our country democratic. We don't want any of the umbrella type presentation that deals in appeasement.

This column tried for a long time to feel that the administration was entitled to the confidence of the people in carrying on this war — and it is a war. The confidence we tried to maintain, and which most Americans wanted to keep has been crushed under the adjoining blows of revelations which have left the whole country wondering if the Queer Deal isn't more effective in keeping our lads from winning in Korea than the communists who are our foes. That is a crude way of saying what I want to say, isn't it? What we are trying to say is that there just isn't any aim to winning. General

Rose Butane Co. To Move Into Remodeled Building This Week

The Roger Rose Butane Company will move this week end into the newly-remodeled building recently acquired from Wilton Dishman. Mr. Rose purchased the entire building formerly occupied by the Empire Cleaners and the part occupied by James House Grocery together with the tourist courts in the rear of the building. A new roof has been put on the entire building and the west half has been remodelled and repainted throughout for the butane business.

The grocery store part of the building is being redecored and a new rest room was added.

No plans have been made as yet for the operation of the courts, Rose stated, but his interest now is in the completion of the renovation of the front part of the property and getting his stock of merchandise and butane supplies moved into his new location.

COUNTY VOTE SET JUNE 16 FOR TAX RAISE FOR SCHOOLS

Saturday, June 16, has been set for the county-wide common school district election for the purpose of raising the local school tax 25c per \$100 valuation.

This is made possible by the recent enactment of Senate Bill 371, sponsored by Hill Hudson, Senator from this district. The bill will allow the increase in school taxes in counties where a common school system is county-wide and may be raised without increasing state and county taxes.

The proposed election was petitioned by qualified tax-paying voters of Terrell County so that more revenue could be made available to the schools without materially increasing the over-all taxes of the county citizens.

Being situated in a sparsely settled county of ranches, Terrell County was being penalized in the amount of school taxes available.

Superintendent of schools Matt Bader stated that the increase in school funds made available by the additional 25c should aid materially in carrying on the work of the Terrell County Common School District.

Pioneer Railroad Bridge Man Retires May 31st

On Thursday, May 31, John D. Kelly, Southern Pacific Bridge and Building supervisor, retired after thirty-four years of railroad experience. He is well known in Sanderson, having visited here frequently with his son, Marvin Kelly, who now resides in El Paso.

Kelly was in charge of all culvert and trestle work on the numerous line changes made by Southern Pacific in West Texas during recent years. With other railroad officials he helped rebuild the Devil's River Bridge, west of Del Rio on three different occasions after the structure had been destroyed by flood water.

Much of Kelly's work has been routine but at times he has found himself challenged by the forces of nature. His worst enemy on the railroad, he says, has been rain with fire holding second place.

The rail veteran vividly recalls the three great floods in West Texas that gave him most trouble. One was in 1919 when the railroad was washed out in several places between Langtry and Sanderson and the 1932 flood that destroyed the Devil's River Bridge.

More disheartening to Kelly, however, was the 1949 floods that destroyed the Devil's River bridge twice within ten days. He recalls he and other workmen worked night and day to get the temporary trestle in service on the morning of July 4. That same afternoon a second flood washed out the trestle.

Extensive Repairs To Church of Christ Now Completed

EFFORT TO BE MADE FOR 100 PER CENT CHEST X-RAY

Every Terrell County resident fifteen years of age and over is being urged to have a chest x-ray made when the mobile chest x-ray unit will be in Sanderson Thursday and Friday, June 28 and 29. The unit will be stationed in the Henshaw Building west of the Ferguson Motor Company.

Examination hours will be from 9 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. on both days and all x-rays will be made free of charge. It will not be necessary to remove any clothing to have the picture made.

The largest number of persons to have the x-ray pictures made in Terrell County was last year when 642 x-rays were made, representing 30.6 of the population.

It is hoped that even a larger number of the citizens will avail themselves of the opportunity again this year.

The project is sponsored by the Terrell County Tuberculosis and Health Association and the mobile unit and staff to operate it will be sent from the State Department of Health, Austin.

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Car Inspection Act Plans Underway By Dept. Public Safety

Austin, May 22 — Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that preliminary plans are under way for the administration of the states new Motor Vehicle Inspection Act.

Recently passed by the 52nd legislature and signed into law by Governor Allan Shivers, the act, which is designed to enhance traffic safety by removing unsafe motor vehicles from the highways, will become effective 90 days after the adjournment of the 52nd Legislature.

According to Garrison, an additional period of about 60 days will be required to complete the organizational details of the inspection division which, by law, will fall under the supervision of the Public Safety Department.

Garrison stated that garage owners and other individuals interested in making application for official inspection stations in their areas may do so by writing directly to him at Austin. The proper application blanks will be mailed to those making inquiry as soon as they are available. Those selected will be subject to a thorough examination of facilities and equipment and will be instructed in inspection standards. Garrison further stated that no testing devices have yet been approved and it was not advisable for applicants to purchase such equipment until his department has set up the official standards for such devices.

All of which brought relief to state trappers.

When they first contemplated trapping some of the West Texas beauties to stock new areas and to reduce over-population, the trappers were skeptical of how the ordinary wooden deer traps would withstand the impact of the mule deer.

The West Texas deer are from fifty to one hundred pounds larger than the white-tailed variety.

But, as related in Texas Game and Fish, the official publication of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, the big deer behaved perfectly after they had been lured into the small enclosures.

Furthermore, according to the article, the mule deer also proved they can withstand hauling distances up to 500 miles without ill effect.

OPS Inspectors To Survey Sanderson Restaurants Soon

Surveys of restaurants and other eating establishments in West Texas to determine their compliance with Office of Price Stabilization regulations have been launched by the Lubbock district office on orders from Edward P. Morgan, national OPS Director of Enforcement.

The surveys are being made simultaneously with similar OPS checks in other parts of the country. The investigators in the Lubbock district, which includes Terrell County and adjoining counties, began their survey in the northern half of the district, which reaches from the Oklahoma Panhandle on the north to the Big Bend and El Paso on the south and west, early this week. Upon their completion, they will move into the southern half to complete their survey.

All operators of restaurants and other eating establishments, except those specifically exempt by Ceiling Price Regulation 11 - were required to file basic reports with OPS by April 30. This report includes a base period statement of food costs per dollar of sales.

The enforcement officers were instructed to give warnings to operators known to have failed to file the report required under the ceiling price regulation. In cases of willful violations, action looking toward injunctions has been requested by the Washington office of Enforcement.

Meanwhile, price officials said that the reports continue to come into the district office, Broadway Building, 1202 Texas Avenue, in Lubbock. Operators who have not filed are urged by price officials to do so immediately.

Regan Committee Continues Inquiry Of Mining Program

Washington, May 23 - To insure that the defense effort gets the vital but short manganese it needs for steel production to back up the boys in Korea, and to provide the necessary copper, aluminum and other stockpiles, the Regan subcommittee on Mines and Mining this week held its second inquiry into the conduct of the program by Defense Minerals Administration.

Rep. Ken Regan, Midland, 16th District, is chairman of this committee. This is the second such inquiry in recent months. It was launched because the defense minerals program was almost completely bogged down. Members of the subcommittee began to re-raise quickly that the \$10-million supplied for exploration of necessary and short minerals was so stymied by faulty administration that "the war could easily be lost here," as one observer put it.

When Dr. James Boyd, administrator of Defense Minerals, and his staff returned the second time this week, however, they showed unusual improvement and gave some promise of achievement so that Regan is now more hopeful. He feels that the hearings have therefore accomplished much for the defense effort. Otherwise the nation might have been hit by scarcities of materials and never known just what was the cause of its unsuccessful mobilization.

There still seems to be considerable red tape to cut and answers to questions put by congressmen are sometimes given on both sides of the fence, but by repeated hammering, Regan and his colleagues have finally been able to pin down the correct status of mining contracts so that the program can be expedited somewhat. Dr. Boyd promises that there will be considerable improvement by June 30.

Tired of getting the answer from one section of the defense program that some other agency would have to supply information at a later date, Regan inaugurated the plan of bringing in all interested agency heads at one time, seating them in a row. Thus when one could not answer a question, the man next to him was there to supply information. This worked amazingly well, especially to avoid buck passing.

Of considerable interest to West Texas is the plan to spend some six million dollars in the El Paso area to buy low-grade manganese-bearing ore from Mexico and New Mexico and process it in a plant to be erected in El Paso.

MERCEDES MUNOZ KILLS LARGE PANTHER

A large male panther, which had been molesting sheep on the J. Garner ranch for over two weeks was found and killed Monday by Mercedes Munoz, who is employed on the ranch and was hunting with two dogs belonging to Bill Haynes.

The panther was an unusual color, being Maltese grey. Munoz is continuing his hunt in an effort to find other predatory animals, maybe more panthers.
