It's worthwhile to be able to spot and stop those leaks be-fore they do real damage.

Here are some tips to help: 1. A slow, seeping leak usually indicates a loose or missing roofing

- 2. A leak that begins with the rain but stops before the rain is over, means an opening that closes by
- swelling ... usually a crack. 3. leaks that occur only during windstorms, usualy mean water being blown upward under roofing that is damaged or does not have
- enough overlap. 4. Bad leaks, of course, mean a damaged roof, insufficient or rusted out flashing.

of your GUTTERS

You can easily double the life of your gutters by a twice yearly program of cleaning and repairing. Best times are BEFORE spring rains and AFTER the leaves have fallen in the fall.

1. Clean out all gutters and down-spouts. Use a stiff whishbroom for leaves and litter. Brush all rusted spots with a wire brush. Paint with asphaltum paint. If gutter has rust-ed through, clean rust inside and out; paint with asphaltum, allow to dry; then smooth sheets of alum-inum foil into coating of plastic cement so that each sheet of foil laps in direction of water flow.

Make sure gutters have enough pitch toward downspout so that water runs out quickly.

Replace worn or broken gutter

4. Make sure downspouts are either connected to drain or a pipe that will carry roof water away

Sally Says:

If the ice cube trays are always getting stuck in the freezing unit of your refrigerator, try coating bottom of trays with a thin film of salad or cooking oil.

When you're storing your electric fans for the winter leave one out and try using it to slirect heat from the radiator or heater to that cold corner that is always so hard to

An easy way to separate egg white and yolks is to break the egg into a small funnel. The white will slide through and the yolk will remain unbroken in top of the funnel.

Johnny Says:

Try using an electric soldering iron for removing old putty from a window. Heat softens the old putty and paint; makes it easy to remove.

If you are an amateur at masoury work and have trouble using a trowel, just put on an old pair of rubber gloves, pull a pair of cheap cotton gloves over these . . . then throw away the trowel and go at it with both hands.

You can waterproof ordinary kitchen matches for that hunting or camping trip by dipping them head down into melted paraffin. Just melt paraffin, allow to cool slightly, then dip matches about one-fourth their length, and draw out quickly. To strike, just rub gently, then




