Local Ranchers To National Wool Meet In Portland, Oregon

Among those leaving by train Friday night from San Angelo to attend the 57th annual convention of the National Wool Growers' Association were John T. Williams of Sanderson, president of the TS&GRA; and Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Stumberg of Sanderson. Mr. Stumberg is a director of the national organization and past-president of the TS&GRA. The party arrived in Portland, Oregon, site of the convention, Monday evening.

The convention opened Tuesday morning and will close Friday afternoon.

The delegation is to take part in discussions with growers from all parts of the nation, of common problems facing the sheep and goat industries. Well versed authorities on all phases of sheep ranching, processing and manufacture of woolen materials, representatives of government agencies and packer plant leaders are to have a part in the four-day program.

Among Texas wool growers who were appointed to serve on the various committees at the convention were S. L. Stumberg, who is chairman of the nominating committee. J. T. Williams made the appointments en route to Portland and he will serve with Ernest L. Williams, secretary of the TS&GRA, on the budget committee.

Sanderson football fans this week were basking in the glory of their first bi-district grid title in history.

For the first time in the history of the Sanderson High School, the 6-B champion Eagle football team has advanced to the regional play off. The Eagles have been undefeated in conference play and if they should win this game, they will have gone as far as Class B schools may advance in interscholastic league play.

The Eagles gained admission to the bi-district play-off by the defeat of all district teams. They played Hermleigh Cardinals of District 5-B last Friday night in Sanderson for the bi-district level.

Local Legionnaire Named to National Committee Post

Newly-elected National Commander Donald R. Wilson of the American Legion has appointed a record-breaking total of 264 Texans to national committees of the Legion, State Legion Commander Charlie Gibson, of Amarillo has announced.

Little can be said concerning the opposition for the Eagles other than the fact that they are an aggregation of football players, else they would not have advanced this far in the competition. It is thought that the Eagles have the slight weight edge over Melvin, taking the two rosters as a whole, but the mainstays probably will come very close to balancing the scales. All local fans are expected to journey to Ozona to witness a promised good brand of football by the two teams.

Most of the business houses of Sanderson will close Friday afternoon in order to enable local citizens to drive to Ozona in time for the game Friday night.

Sanderson is enjoying its first district championship since 1947. Snowden, in his first year as head coach, served last year as assistant to M. B. England, who produced the 1947 championship team with only 12 men on the squad. Snowden is assisted by Norman Rath.

The Sanderson Eagles beat the Hermleigh Cardinals in every department here last Friday night. The Eagles were outweighted by the opponents but still managed to show up the Hermleigh boys on the field as well as come out on the top end of the score.

Rosendo Silvas went over early in the first quarter for the first score for the Eagles and the extra point was no good. In the second period Jack Talbot ran 15 yards for the second Eagle tally and Bob Wilkinson converted the extra point. Dickie Wall, for the opposition, went 50 yards through the middle in the third period and the first Hermleigh score and the extra point try was good. In the fourth period Roman Zepeda broke into the clear and went 30 yards for a TD with Wilkinson again making the conversion good. Wall took off again in the four quarter and went 15 yards for the second Cardinal score and the try for the extra point was good.

PLANNING YOUR MEALS



Norman Cake
1 1/2 cup vegetable shortening
1 1/4 cup sugar
1 egg
2 cups flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla

Cream shortening, mix with sugar and yolk of egg. Gradually, add alternate portions of flour and milk until thoroughly mixed. Then add baking powder, salt, vanilla and beaten white of egg.

Prepare filling as follows:
1/2 cup chopped dates (or raisins)
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 tablespoon cinnamon
2 tablespoons butter

Work these ingredients together with the hands. Fill 10" x 10" pan (or 9" x 11") with 3/4 of the batter. Scatter 2/3 of the filling over this. Scatter 1/3 of the filling over the top and scatter filling on top. Bake 40 minutes (or longer depending on depth of cake) in 400° oven.

And here's a cake with real "party" flavor, needing just a plain vanilla icing with a sprinkling of orange rind to set it off.
