

Franklin Roosver at election time always took occasion to tear into the Republicans, accusing them of little short of treason for failing to adopt his new deal philosophies.

"In making appointments to the Federal courts, Mr. Roosevelt flooded the benches with Democrats rather than striving to keep some sort of political balance in that important branch of the government. His example was followed diligently by Harry Truman, the result being a heavily-loaded Federal judiciary dominated by men of the same political faith.

"President Truman's 'blowing out' speech at the Jackson Day linner in Washington the other night largely was a bitter condemination of all Republicans whom he accused of being 'fakers trying to pull the wool over the people's eyes', phony propagandists and friends of the 'specal interests.


