Under Preference Nominations Given Local Pupils

Under vocational preference nominations are being given this week to students in grades eight and high twelve. Though referred to as tests, in reality they are cards revealing preferences in regard to vocational choices.

The preference record is composed of a series of questions in groups of three. The student merely determines the vocation or activity most preferred of the three. There can be no wrong answers as the papers are not graded. However, results do reveal a preference thereby showing preference for against certain vocations. The preference record does not diminish the ability of a student to enter the vocation for which he expressed preference. The records offer a means of making an sympathetic approach to narrow the range of occupational choices by eliminating the vocations to which the student records no preference.

It is felt that the preference record will aid in the selection of vocations by individual students during their high school days. Plans for the future include a more comprehensive test program to better determine abilities and preferences of students so that more intelligent decisions might be made by students in regard to college training and occupational selection.

George W. Geaslin Local Ranchman, Buried Here Sunday

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the local Church of Christ for George W. Geaslin who died at his home in Sanderson Friday afternoon. Jimmy Glivident, minister of the Sheffield Church of Christ, officiated at the service. The Clarence Hallie Mulkey Post of the American Legion was in charge of military rites at the graveside in Cedar Grove Cemetery where burial was made.

Mr. Geaslin, who had been in failing health for the past three years, suffered a stroke in February, and after being hospitalized in Fort Stockton for several weeks, was moved to Sanderson where his condition grew steadily worse until death came.

Born in Hamilton, Texas, on August 9, 1893, Geaslin moved with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Geaslin, to Fort Davis when he was about four years old. He came to Sanderson in 1923 and with Tip Frazier, opened a grocery store and market which they later sold to Sam Spears and Geaslin moved in 1925 to the ranch southeast of Dryden.

In 1932, the Geaslins moved to Van Horn, residing there for ten years. He was engaged in the mercantile business there. They returned to the Dryden ranch in 1942 and were operating there until February.

Mr. Geaslin was married to Miss Ruth Holmes of Sheffield in December, 1924. Two children were born to the union, Mrs. Dean Farmer of El Paso, and George Holmes Geaslin of Sanderson.

He was a member of the local Church of Christ, and as a veteran of World War I, held membership in the local American Legion Post and served as commander of the Legion post in Van Horn.

Survivors besides his widow and two children include two grandsons; his mother, Mrs. W. P. Geaslin of Big Spring; five sisters, Mrs. Robert Martin of Los Angeles, California, Mrs. E. C. Cassey of Big Spring, Mrs. Russell Cornelius of Edna, Mrs. R. T. Smith of O'Donnell, Mrs. Ralph Skelton of Midland; two brothers, Cecil Geaslin of Van Horn, and E. A. Geaslin of Dallas. All of the relatives except Mrs. Martin, Mrs. Smith and E. A. Geaslin were here for the funeral services.

Pallbearers included R. B. Dyer, G. E. Babb, E. E. Farley, Joe Kerr, Jr., W. H. Savage and E. J. Hanson.

Lobby Arrangement And New Boxes Add To P. O. Appearance

Installation of new boxes and enlarging the lobby has added greatly to the appearance of the interior of the Sanderson postoffice as well as increased the facilities offered to patrons of the institution. The number of boxes now available almost doubles what was in the old setup of equipment. Many patrons were having to "double" on box service before the new addition was made.

The new arrangement of fixtures allows much more lobby space and adds greatly to the appearance of the establishment.

Postmaster Clyde Griffith stated that the scramble for new boxes is now over and all the patrons are struggling to learn to operate the new combinations. Since the equipment is new, Mr. Griffith said, many of the boxes will be difficult to open until they have been used for some time. Comments from patrons entering the office indicate that everybody is happy with the improvement, Griffith stated.

Alan R. Fraser Seeks Court of Civil Appeals Post in July Primary

Judge Alan R. Fraser of the 33rd District Court today formally announced as a candidate for the Eighth Court of Civil Appeals, El Paso.

Judge Fraser has had long experience in the courts of this state, having served for 12 years as District Attorney and District Judge. He was elected District Attorney in 1936, and served continuously in that capacity until the early spring of 1943, when he resigned to enter the armed forces. He returned to the U. S. in the fall of 1947, and was appointed District Judge of this same district and has served as such ever since, and is now completing his fifth year in that capacity.

He spent over four and one-half years in the army, of which three and one-half were spent overseas. Judge Fraser saw service both in the infantry, until the end of the war, and then as presiding judge of the Military Government Court in Frankfurt, Germany. His overseas duties carried him into seven foreign countries, including the invasion and landing in France and the campaigns in Holland and Germany.

Judge Fraser is a member of the state committee for consideration of legislation for better protection for children. He is known throughout the state for his interest in juvenile delinquency problems and crime prevention. He has addressed many organizations on the subject of juvenile delinquency throughout the state, and presented his plan of crime prevention through education, in England, Scotland, Norway, Germany, during and after the war. In addition to the various offices held by Judge Fraser, he has been a regional director of the Big Bend Boy Scout movement and served as president of the Alpine Chamber of Commerce.

He is seeking the post now held by Associate Justice Claude R. Sutton who has announced that he will retire after this term. The district takes in 22 West Texas counties including Terrell.

Judge Fraser was admitted to the bar in 1932 and practiced for a while in Austin before moving to Alpine. He is married and the father of one child, a high school student.

More Activity Proposed For Puckett Well

From the Fort Stockton Pioneer

Though its Puckett ranch Ellenberger exploration is being drilled tight, and no official announcement has been made of the new activity, Phillips Petroleum Co. plans to drill four additional deep tests in the vicinity of the test 30 miles southeast of Fort Stockton, and approximately 35 miles northwest of Sanderson.

Two company rigs are being moved in, and local reports are that the firm plans to contract two additional wells. Water wells are being drilled this week, roads are being built, and dirt work is under way for locations on two of the proposed Ellenberger tests.

All this is happening while company officials continue an absolute clamp on information regarding prospects for production in their No. 1 Glenna, the Puckett ranch test.

Local reports are that the Phillips drilling program has an appropriation of \$2,000,000 for the four wells, each expected to go 14,000 feet or more to explore the Ellenberger.

No. 1 Glenna last week was making Schulmberger survey at an unannounced total depth reportedly in preparation for running casing for completion tests. It was credited with a heavy flow of gas on drillstem test above 14,000 feet and has cored several hundred feet below that point.

Rain, Hail Cover Most Of Terrell County Wed.

Rain covered practically all parts of Terrell County late Wednesday afternoon. In some places damaging hail was reported from ranchmen. The extent of livestock loss has not been learned as this paper goes to press but hailstones up to two inches in diameter were reported from several parts of the county.

H. A. Smith, who lives on a ranch about 7 miles west of Sanderson, reported large quantities of hail but in small pellets and not damaging. In the Dryden area .7 of an inch of rainfall was reported and large hailstones bombarded the earth in that section.

At the Arvin headquarters one inch rainfall was reported and some hail fell with the rain.

Here in Sanderson there was .47 inch precipitation which was accompanied by a hail storm of small stones which covered the ground for a short time.

Exceptionally large hailstones were reported in the Dryden area.

Voters Urged To Attend Precinct Conclave Saturday

Terrell County voters are urged to attend their precinct convention Saturday, May 3. This is the first step in the selection of candidates for the presidency W. W. Sudduth, County Democratic chairman, stated this week while insisting that more interest should be placed in the affairs of the local Democratic Party activities.

In the past little or no interest has been in evidence in politics on the precinct level, Sudduth said, and continuing he stated that the most important step is the selection of delegates to the county convention who will name delegates to the state conclave to see that proper delegates are named for the national convention.

Prisoner Returned To Local Jail To Await G-J Action

Manuel Gonzales of Uvalde was returned to the Terrell County jail Wednesday after having been hospitalized in Fort Stockton Tuesday of last week for treatment of multiple knife stabs and wounds.

Elena Rios, allegedly the victim of knife and stab wounds inflicted by Gonzales, was also returned to Sanderson Wednesday.

The wounds on Gonzales are reported to have been self-inflicted, according to Sheriff J. S. Nance.

Nance stated that Gonzales was being held in the local jail for grand jury action and he would be charged with assault with intent to murder. No time has been set for the grand jury meeting.

It is reported that both of the parties are much improved and are in a satisfactory condition.

PMA ASSISTANCE TO 88 RANCHES DURING LAST YEAR

Assistance for carrying out conservation and better management practices totaled \$83,583.26 in 1951, according to Jesse G. Meredith, local P. M. A. secretary. He estimated that this is about 50 per cent of the total cost for carrying out these practices, estimating a total of over \$157,000 was spent in Terrell County in 1951 for improving ranches.

Breaking this down into different practices we find that: 21 wells were drilled on 21 ranches, 74,724 linear feet of pipeline installed on 12 ranches, 5,984 cubic yards stockwater dams on 2 ranches, 71,012 cu yards of spreader dams on 8 ranches, 222.6 cubic yards rubble masonry dams on 2 ranches, 23,258.8 acres of pear, cedar and lechugilla eradicated on 50 ranches, 114.2 acres brush control on 1 ranch, 4,192 acres deferred grazing on 3 ranches, 500,000 linear feet furrowing on 1 ranch.

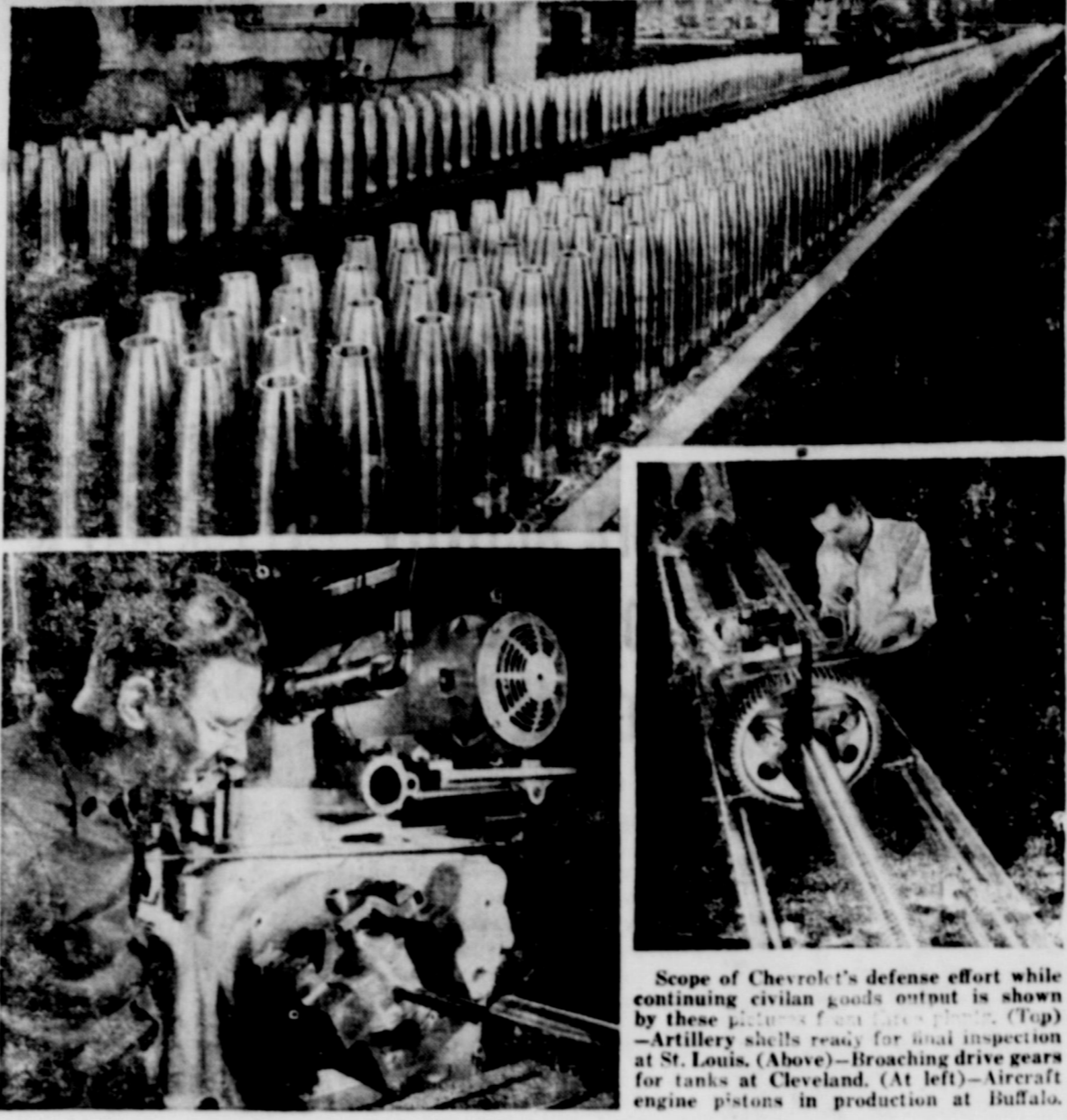


Shivers Takes Stand On 'Uninstructed Delegation' Move

The following is a statement by Governor Allan Shivers concerning his stand on the support of an uninstructed delegation to the national convention:
"The self-styled 'Loyal Democrats' have made it plain that they will bolt the legal precinct conventions of the Democratic Party on May 3 and hold rump conventions of their own, open only to those who agree with them.
These are the same boys who have been hollering for six months that unless everyone agreed with them, they would bolt the party. Their ambition is to destroy the Democratic Party of Texas.
I have said time and again, for over a year, that I would do what a majority of Texas Democrats wanted to do. The State Democratic Executive Committee has now ruled that precinct, county and state conventions must be governed by majority vote. This prospect is not pleasing to the so-called 'Loyal Democrats.'
I charge that the self-styled 'Loyal Democrats' are not interested in an expression of the will of the majority of Texas Democrats. On the contrary, they are not willing to race a majority vote of the Democrats of Texas. They are not

willing to let the people decide in a legal convention what they, the people, want to do about the party pledge and an uninstructed delegation to the National Convention.
"Rather they want to rule out at the start any and all who do not share their devotion to the boss-controlled, left-wing dominated political machine they call the Democratic Party.
"Their real objective is to capture the Democratic Party organization in Texas and hand it over to the national machine. They would like to assure this result by barring at precinct conventions any Democrat who happened to have a different idea.
"But the State Democratic Committee has held that the Texas election code does not permit the requirement of a so-called party loyalty pledge at the convention door. The executive committee further held that, once a convention is legally organized, the pledge may be required if a majority votes for it.
"The so-called 'Loyal Democrats' do not want that. They shudder at the thought of such a question being put squarely to the voters. They are now brazenly instructing their followers to ignore the law, bolt the legal conventions and attempt to gain by technicality what they most surely could not gain in a free and fair vote.
" My ambition, and my only ambition, in connection with this fight is to strengthen the Democratic Party of Texas. I want to

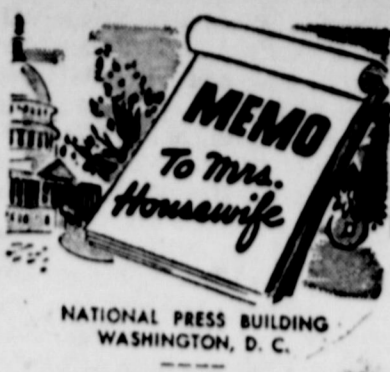
Former Sanderson Girl Weds In Del Rio

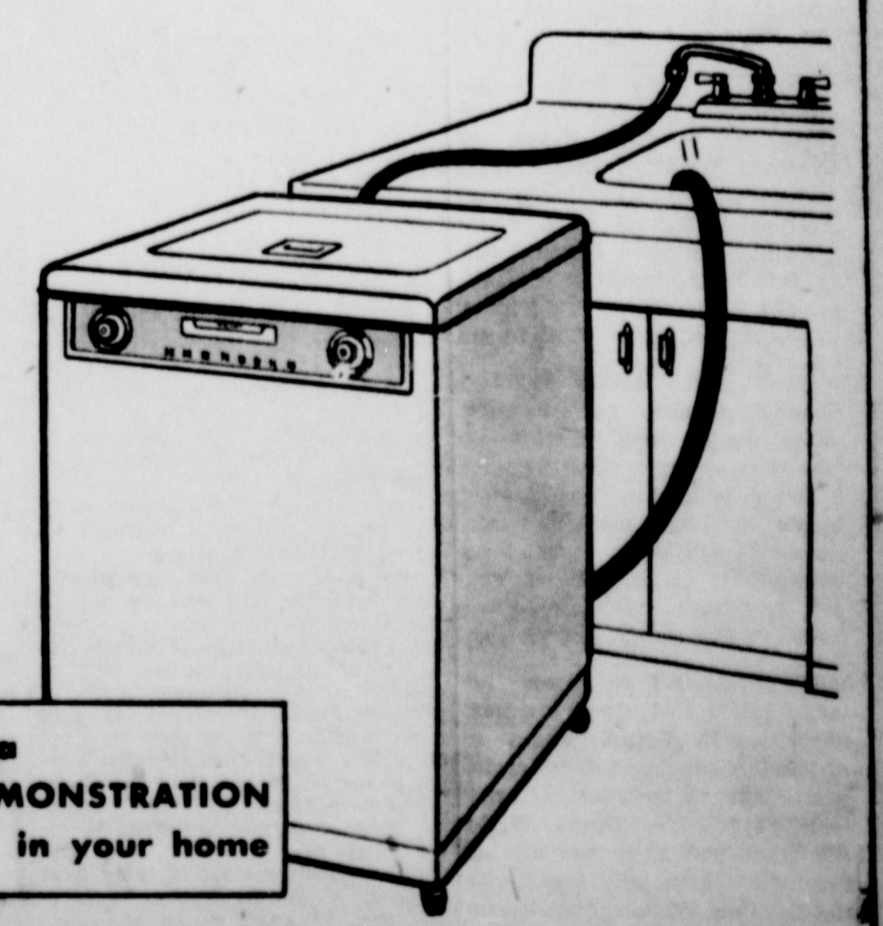

joy. Be there Saturday and take part in the first step toward riding this country of the traitors to our freedom.

It is stated in an editorial from the Sioux City Journal-Tribune so much better than this column can say it that we are taking the liberty here to reproduce that editorial.

"Most Americans have forgotten the days when a president of the United States, although having been elected by one political party, was nevertheless the representative of all the people. He was a man of dignity, this president of yesterday, who placed his high office above the level of bitter partisan politics.

"As a result he was respected by both parties, and that fact was reflected abroad, giving the U. S. prestige internationally. Such men were Theodore Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson, Calvin Coolidge, Herbert Hoover. And while men of varying political faith differed in principle with those presidents, they respected them as honorable officials who lived up to the high office they occupied.

"During the last 19 years, however, the men who served as president resorted to different tactics. They made it clear they represented not all of the people but only those people who voted the democratic ticket. Franklin Roosevelt at election time always took occasion to tear into the Republicans, accusing them of little short of treason for failing to adopt his new deal philosophies.

"In making appointments to the Federal courts, Mr. Roosevelt flooded the benches with Democrats rather than striving to keep some sort of political balance in that important branch of the government. His example was followed diligently by Harry Truman, the result being a heavily-loaded Federal judiciary dominated by men of the same political faith.

"President Truman's 'blowing out' speech at the Jackson Day dinner in Washington the other night largely was a bitter condemnation of all Republicans whom he accused of being 'fakers trying to pull the wool over the people's eyes,' phony propagandists and friends of the 'special interests.'

"Those are harsh words. They lack the dignity one somehow expects from a president of the U. S.

"A rebirth of presidential dignity is needed. The country would benefit from the election of a president who despite his own political faith will respect the views of all the people, including the minority party."
