LISTEN TO LUKE

Governor Stevenson made a speech at Salt Lake City Tuesday night. Senator O'Connor's committee has been trying to weed out the subversives from the American Security Council of the United States — of all places.

Both of the above statements are matters of news happenings which are in all the daily papers. At this point this column wishes to make the closely related events the remarks by the Illinois Governor who is aspiring to the best office in the United States. Yesterday's news released the fact that some of the U. S. employees of the Security Council refused to answer the questions if they have or have not been members of an organization which advocates overthrow of the United States Government, and a direct question: "Are you now or have you ever been a member of the Communist party?"

Some witnesses before the committee refused to answer the question and Senator O'Connor replied that he was convinced by their attitude that they were Communists. On the very next night Governor Stevenson attempted to quote a verse from the Bible where it says that certain things are Caesar's and certain things are God's. Then he comments he made it clear the thoughts and ideas of God are God-given and no Senatorial committee can question the mind of a man to think as he pleases.

Some of you who heard the big man speak know that he has had reference to none other than the Communists who are doing the work of our Security Council. If Mr. Stevenson believes what he said Tuesday he himself must be upholding those who reply to such a question: "I refuse to answer that question on the grounds that it incriminates me."

A columnist wants no contact with anyone in any office of public trust who cannot and will not stand up before any committee and tell them in no uncertain terms that he is not a Communist and that he does not belong to any group which would aid in the overthrow of this government. We will not, under any name, vote for a man for office who will use his influence to protect and cover the Communists who have infiltrated the most sacred position of our government. You, as Harry said, that it has happened. But it has happened when a man has no intention of denouncing Communist affairs.

Governor should also study a little more before trying to take the actions of Communists government by the Holy Scriptures.

About this. If you want the Communists protected and favored in the important service in this country it would be your duty to go to polls November 4 and vote for a man who says that it is not for a man to be questioned as to his beliefs in such a manner.

FIRE DEPARTMENT FUND DRIVE IS SHORT OF GOAL

The executive board of the Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department met Tuesday night to discuss the financial condition of the organization and plan for further improvements in the efficiency of the fire-fighting unit.

It was revealed that approximately \$450 had been spent by the group in repairing the trucks and paying outstanding bills that had been owed by the department for several months. Plans for insuring the members of the fire-fighting crew against accident or injury incurred in their work were discussed and it was thought to be to the best interest of the people of the town and members of the department to afford this protection in the event that it was ever needed.

Members of the executive board have plans immediately for the purchase of additional hose for the trucks and are asking that those who have not contributed to the fund raising drive to please do so so that their immediate plans can materialize to affect the safety of the entire community. They estimate that an additional \$800 or \$1,000 could be placed to good use in equipping the fire-fighting team.

Fire Chief W. W. Sudduth stated that more members could be used to good advantage in the organization and added that they would be expected to turn out as regularly as was possible for drills and fires. The present active membership of the organization is about 16 men, and with the necessity of absence of "some members" at times it was pointed out that a crew of about 25 should be trained in the techniques adaptable to local necessities.

Any member who feels the desire and urgency of becoming a member of the crew is asked to contact Sudduth.

Parents Asked To Watch Children For Poor Vision

Poor eyesight can make a child "slow" in school. Uncorrected visual defects can cause a normally bright youngster to dislike school, fall behind in his class and become self-conscious about playing sports and games, says Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer.

A child will rarely complain about poor vision. It may be blurred, he may see double, yet in three cases out of four, he will not tell anyone because he does not know how well he should see. That is why it is so important for parents and teachers to know the symptoms of eye trouble. An intelligent child may be victimized by poor vision both at school and with his playmates.

Too often a youngster's eyes are neglected because no one knows that they will need care, Dr. Cox points out. For this reason, visual tests should be continued throughout the child's school career.

Some of the symptoms which may mean that a youngster has eye trouble are:

1. Rubs eye often, attempts to brush away blur.
 2. Becomes irritable when doing close work.
 3. Blinks more than usual, stumbles or trips over small objects.
 4. Is over-sensitive to light; can not play games requiring distant vision.
 5. Red-rimmed, encrusted or swollen eye lids.
- When any of these symptoms are present, those responsible for the child's condition should have his eyes examined at once. Early correction will save many days of unpleasantness and possibly blindness.

Van Horn Falls Prey To Eagles; Bracketville To Bring Struggle Here For This Week's Tangle

The Sanderson Eagles took their second district game from the Van Horn aggregation last Friday night in that city by a score of 42-27. The Eagles were favored with the opportunity to use several of the reserve men in the game to give them both experience and the opportunity to show their mettle against the opposition in a game. Some of the regulars who have been plagued with aggravated minor injuries from one game to the next were given an opportunity to watch the major portion of the game from the bench.

Juan Olivares scored the first TD for the Eagles from the 7-yard line in the first period. The set-up play was a pass from Olivares to Frank Vasquez which was good for plenty of yardage. Billy Hargis for Van Horn carried the ball 45 yards to glory for that team in the same quarter and carried the ball over for the extra point.

Raul Flores scored from the 4-yard line in the second quarter, followed by a 72-yard run by Rosendo Silva to account for the two touchdowns for the Eagles in the second period.

Roman Zepeda tallied twice in the third quarter, once from the 29 and from the 69.

David Mitchell scored in the fourth period from the 8-yard line after making a 35-yard gain.

Hargis scored again in the last period after a pass play which took the ball to the Sanderson 10-yard line. Again late in the fourth period Hargis scored after a pass interception by the Van Horn team which took the ball to the Sanderson 19. Two more plays were required for the fourth Van Horn score of the night.

Roman Zepeda kicked all the extra points for the Eagles, completing 6 out of 6 tries to give the extra margin in the score for the local team.

The regular Eagle linemen aided the substitute backfielders in their offensive and defensive efforts and were also used to supplement the strength of the line-up for some of the substitute linemen. Power plays were predominating over the light Van Horn team and the adeptness of the Eagles in the gridiron sport was outstanding.

This Friday night the Bracketville Tigers will invade Eagle territory for the first time, in a non-conference game. The Bracketville team has showed up well in their own conference play and are expected to give the Eagles a run and fight for the pigskin honors in their game on Eagle Field.

Football fans who love to see the game well played and evenly-contested are urged to come out to watch the Eagles and the Tigers here Friday night.

F. F. A. Boys Have Long List of Projects For Year's Work

Members of the Sanderson Chapter of the F. F. A. are showing improvements and gains in their projects work. Several of the boys are getting into the registered sheep business and all of the boys have some type of project projects.

Five boys have a total of 55 registered sheep on their ranching record. About 1,000 head of range sheep are listed and a total of 115 lambs are on feed along with 5 head of baby beef steers.

Some of the boys also have chickens, rabbits and range cattle. One boy produced a hay crop.

Boys who have had vocational agriculture for three years will be eligible for Lone Star Farmers degrees this summer if their supervised farming programs are good and they make a total of \$250.

Most of the third year boys will meet the requirements and may obtain that degree with a little extra work this year.
