LISTEN TO LUKE

We have heard much pro and con and read likewise concerning the proposed wage-hike for teachers in our public schools. It seems that some are of the opinion that teachers draw enough across the table now and often times too much for their own good, and there are those interested in seeing that progressive steps be taken to raise the pay of our educators up to par. So that we may not seem to be straddling the fence, let me say that I personally think that the education of our children is one of the basically important things in this country today and the cost of an education — and I mean by that a proper education — should not be measured in terms of its value in dollars and cents, but rather knowledge and sense.

Whatever the cost of an education, it is worth many times as much!

Let us look at it from a business standpoint.

A B. A., B. S. or any other degree qualifies a teacher, theoretically, for many more things besides teaching school. If we hire a classroom teacher, we are going to have to compete with other businesses who are willing to also make a monetary remuneration for the services of a person who has the knowledge which qualifies a person for a degree in a given subject or line.

A teacher may be called to the job because of the "easiness" of the profession, or he may be called to the job because of his love for the cause, or he may be called to the job because of his ambition to attain. Can he meet these obligations and aspire to a great financial success in the profession with the pay rate as it is now? If not, then he is likely to seek a more lucrative position. If then his ambitions are very high.

Where else can you get a baby-sitter with a bachelor's degree or master's degree for 21c per hour? If you really believe that the education of your child is very important, write to your representative and tell him that you would favor taxes from a state if it would help to assure a child of qualified classroom teachers in the future.

We have some good news from the industry in the eastern part of Terrell County this week with the announcement that the Banner No. 1 well was putting out some 6 million cubic feet of gas. This is good news to all of us and possibly mean the opening of a gas field in that section of county since they have had a well flow of gas in three other wells that immediate area.

We had to laugh at Mr. Banner, looking fun either, when he came into the office to tell of his news. He called out to his employees to see if there were further developments and asked first about the rainfall and then finally around to asking about how much gas was being produced by well. You might make sheep molasses, but you can't make a shepherdman forget about the rain, if he does have a producing well on his place.

Two Men Jailed After Assault, Robbery of 'Good Samaritan'

Two youths are in jail here after a Del Rio salesman was slugged, robbed and left in a culvert for dead Thursday afternoon.

Vic Carrier, 29-year-old salesman for the Dittlinger Roller Mills in Del Rio, suffered a large gash and blows on the back of the head and a large gash over his right eye.

Held here under a charge of assault with intent to murder and robbery are Chester Lee Tarver and James Haskell Johnson, who told Sheriff J. S. Nance they are from Picaune, Miss. Both lads appear to be about 20 years of age.

Carrier was enroute to Del Rio from Sanderson when the two youths told him a "hard luck" story at Dryden and he gave them a ride. After about ten miles of driving with little or no conversation one of the boys remarked on how desolate the country appeared. Shortly thereafter the boy riding in the back seat struck Carrier on the head several times. He was dragged from the car bleeding profusely. The men took his billfold from him, tied his hands with his necktie and stuffed him into a culvert, according to Carrier.

Carrier did not lose consciousness, he said, but pretended to be unconscious and the men apparently thought him to be dead. After he heard the car drive away he recovered sufficiently to scamp for the road. Covered with blood, he flagged down Mr. and Mrs. Floyd (Bud) Smith who took him to Cedar Station where they called the sheriff's office in Sanderson. They then drove on to Dryden and called Sheriff A. E. Steinmetz of Del Rio.

Mrs. John T. Williams Placed In Race For School Trustee Vote

It was learned Wednesday that a request had been made to the County Judge that the name of Mrs. John T. (Tommie) Williams be placed on the ballot in the school board race coming up April 4. The request was signed by five qualified voters of Terrell County.

Both Mrs. Williams and the signers of the request were emphatic in explaining that placing of her name on the ticket was in no sense meant as an affront to the incumbent board members, or school officials, collectively or individually, but explained that it was an effort to bring the affairs of the school to the attention of the citizens and taxpayers and keep the position of membership on the school board as an elective post in which all should have more interest than has been displayed so many times in previous elections of candidates for this job.

Mrs. Williams stated that if there were sufficient voters in the county who had confidence in her ability to serve on the school board that she would willingly serve, and devote all the time necessary to the fulfillment of its duties to the best of her ability.

Drouth Broken

All of Terrell County and most all parts of West Texas have received quantities of rainfall varying from one-half inch to two inches in the past week to indicate that the long drouth that has plagued West Texas has been broken. All of the rainfall has come in light showers, some prolonged, during weather that has been almost constantly cloudy since the early part of the week.

Ranchmen are noting a change already in the brush on their ranches and are very elated that the rains came when they did in order to cause the brush to put out tender leaves and cause the grass and weed roots that might still be alive to get the early moisture so they could reap the full benefit of the early Spring sun.

Indications and prophecies from fairly-reliable sources indicate that the moisture this week was the forerunner of more to come and area hopes hang high for a definite reversal of the weather conditions that have predominated for the past five years.

Sunday morning the local gauge registered .19, with .43 on Monday and .03 on Tuesday. Wednesday was a dry day in Sanderson, but the reading Thursday morning showed .14 inches.

BANNER NO. 1 WELL TESTS 6 MILLION CU. FT. OF GAS

Wilson Banner reported Tuesday that the Western Natural Gas Co.'s Banner No. 1, being drilled by the Great Western Drilling Co. in section 28, Block 161, GC&SF RR Co., in the eastern part of Terrell County had struck what was reported to be a 10-million cubic foot gas well. Later tests verified a flow of 6,000,000 cubic feet of gas, according to Banner.

The depth of the strike is reported to be 5,540.

According to Banner the crew suspended operations after bringing the tools up some 2,000 feet to await orders for either continuing operations or coming out. No word has been received as yet as to the plans for drilling operations.

The Banner well is south of the Hoag well and two Goode wells, one of which was completed recently.

The Humble No. 1 Blackstone was reported at 11,175 feet this week in lime and shale.
