OUTDOOR LIGHTING AT CHRISTMAS PLANS ANNOUNCED

At the regular meeting of the Sanderson Garden Club Saturday afternoon, the club voted to sponsor an outdoor Christmas lighting project in the homes and churches of Sanderson. Picture windows, doors, evergreen shrubs, trees, yards, roofs may be entered.

Cash prizes will be awarded to the winners and the judging will be by a secret committee. Everyone in the community is eligible to compete in the contest and the club hopes that a town-wide interest will be shown in the project designed to make Sanderson more attractive during the Christmas holidays.

Judging will take place on December 22.

Deer Hunters Fail In Area Findings

Probably some of the best hunters of the West Texas area hunting in this portion of the state for the biggest game animal of the state, the mule or black-tail deer, failed to find their game this year.

Many reasons and excuses could be propounded, but probably the one that makes the most sense, is the lack of the male of the species. Numerous does were reported sighted by most all hunters.

Strangely enough, a view of the bucks that have been taken in this area reveal that they have been taking care of themselves in the matter of food to the best advantage and are in good shape for serving delicious meals for those fortunate enough to have killed one.

Some hunters and old-timers in this section are talking of the advantages of possibly closing the season on bucks for from 3 to 5 years to allow the population to increase where the drought conditions have hit the deer and caused a high death loss. This is merely speculation, of course, since such matters are under the jurisdiction of the Texas Game and Fish Commission who makes recommendations to the national organization equal for their rulings and laws.

Sfumberg Reports On Meeting For Wool Promotion

Three former presidents of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association have just returned from Washington, D. C., and New York City where they attended meetings pertaining to wool promotion and possible future legislation of interest to wool growers.

Penrose B. Metcalfe, San Angelo, immediate past president of the TS&GRA, and S. L. Stumberg, Sanderson, also a former president, took part in a two-day meeting with other representatives of the United States wool growers and Jan Moolman, chairman of the International Wool Secretariat, in New York, at which time policies of the National Wool Growers Association as they pertain to the program of the Wool Bureau and the International Wool Secretariat were discussed. The Secretariat is an organization of wool producers of the British Dominions. It cooperates with the American Wool Council through the Wool Bureau to promote the use of wool in the United States.

Fred T. Earwood, Sonora was in Washington at the request of Secretary of Agriculture Fred T. Benson as a member of a 14-man committee to advise the United States Department of Agriculture on "matters relating to a future program for wool." The thirteen other members represented growers in the western wool states, the National Wool Marketing Corporation, the American Farm Bureau Federation and the domestic segment of the Boston wool trade.

SS TAX RATE TO INCREASE JAN. 1

The social security tax rate for persons whose work counts toward old-age and survivors insurance is scheduled to increase on the first of January, Jack Calvert, manager of the Odessa social security office, reminded employers, employees and self-employed people this week.

This scheduled increase in tax contribution is in accordance with the 1950 amendments to the social security law, and was enacted by Congress in anticipation of future obligations of the program.

Employees in jobs covered by the law will have 2 per cent instead of the present 1-2 per cent deducted from their pay beginning with the first of January up to earnings of \$3,000 a year; their employers will contribute an equal amount.

The new rates will apply to all taxable wages paid after December 31, 1953, regardless of when earned.

The social security tax for the self-employed is scheduled to increase from the present 2-1-2 per cent to 3 per cent for the period commencing January 1, 1954. Since the self-employed whose work is covered by the law pay their tax just once yearly at the time of filing their Federal income tax return, they will pay the present 2-1-4 per cent social security tax on their 1953 income that counts toward social security. This will be due not later than March 15, 1954.

Their first payments at the increased rate of 3 per cent will be due on March 15, 1955, for the calendar year 1954.

In the meantime the Internal Revenue Service reports that employers will be furnished late this year with income tax withholding tables and Federal Insurance Contributions Act (Social Security taxes) tables reflecting rates applicable next year.

The next scheduled increase, six years from now, in 1960, will be to 2-1-2 per cent each for employer and employee, and to 3-3-4 per cent for the self-employed.

Legion Asks Texas To Perpetuate Nov. 11 Holiday

The Sanderson Times has been informed that the American Legion will spearhead a movement for the passage of a bill by the next Texas Legislature to declare November 11 "All Veterans Day," according to a resolution unanimously adopted by the organization's state community service committee which met in Austin last week end.

The community service committee, headed by Mayor R. C. Gorman of Bay City, as chairman, in its recent resolution stated that since November 11 is now a national holiday because of Armistice Day, that it could well be the day to honor veterans of World War II and the Korean conflict also.

The resolution stated that VE Day, VJ Day and Pearl Harbor Day, all as significant as Armistice Day, had failed to gain recognition as had November 11. "The result is that there is no set day now in which the people of Texas can give pause and honor to those who died in the wars of the past two generations."

The resolution calls upon all of the Texas posts and the districts and divisions to support the movement.

Lt. James Chappee Escapes Injury When Jet Plane Explodes

Lt. James H. Chappee, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Greene Cooke, narrowly escaped serious injury and possibly death on Friday night, November 13, when the jet aircraft he was piloting caught fire. He was accompanied by Lt. Robert H. Dubberly on the routine flight.

Occupants of a companion plane noticed that the plane was on fire and warned the two officers by radio.

Seconds before the airplane was destroyed by an explosion, Lt. Chappee and his radar-observer had parachuted to safety. The two officers were about a mile and a half apart when they landed and both had used signal flares to spot their location for rescue planes that left immediately from Elmendorf AFB, their home base. The two men were in a helicopter on their way back to the base about 1 hour after the accident and were given routine check-ups at the base hospital. Both officers were uninjured except for bruises sustained when they hit the ground.

Lt. Chappee and his wife, the former Miss Betty Cooke, reside in Anchorage, Alaska.
