Mrs. W. L. Slaughter Buried Monday

Funeral services were held in San Angelo Monday afternoon for Mrs. W. L. Slaughter, 73, who died in that city Saturday morning. Although she was in delicate health, her death was unexpected.

Mrs. Slaughter was the widow of W. L. Lon Slaughter, a partner in Blackstone and Slaughter, one of the big ranching operations in West Texas during the World War I era.

Mrs. Slaughter died in 1925. Blackstone and Slaughter's business was closed out some two or three years later but the extensive ranch holdings and mineral rights of the two families still are held jointly. 656 Scholastics Noted From School Census

The Terrell County school census was taken in January to meet the requirements of the new law and final figures have been made available on the returns this week.

There were 671 scholastics on the approved list last year. This year found 138 new scholastics in the county with 153 to be deleted from the list. Thus, the 1954 census shows 656 scholastics for the county. There are 324 boys and 332 girls.

The largest number of new names to be added to the census comes from the six-year-olds — 71. The smallest group is the nine-year-olds — 38.

According to the new law, any transfers to another school district must be made by June 1 instead of August 1.

Mrs. W. J. Ferguson was the census trustee for Terrell County.

John Harrison Asks Re-Election To Pct. 2 Commissioner Post

John Harrison, incumbent Commissioner of Precinct 2, has authorized The Times to place his name in the list of officers for re-election subject to the action of the Democratic Primary in July.

Harrison served the unexpired term of E. B. Carson, who resigned, and was elected to the post in 1952. LOCAL GIRLS WIN FIRST DISTRICT CROWN IN SCHOOL'S BASKETBALL HISTORY

The Sanderson High School girls' basketball team set a new record in the local gym Wednesday night when they not only took the district title in cage play, but it was also their first district win in the history of the school.

The local girls took a double-header from the Fort Davis team with a score of 33-15 for the "B" game and 43-32 for the "A" game.

Ruby Hibbard was high scorer in the first game with 11 points, followed by Celia Falcon with 9.

In the second game, Maria Silvas scored 21 points and Yolanda Esqueda scored 13.

The local girls played all the second half of the decisive game with never a margin of over 12 points and never less than 9 points ahead of the opposition.

Coach Norman Rath stated that the regional play would be in Odessa on March 5 and 6.

Under Rath's coaching, the girls piled up the enviable season record of 16 games won and only 4 games lost. Coach Rath stated that he was trying to match some of the post-season games for the girls to keep them in shape for the regional competition.

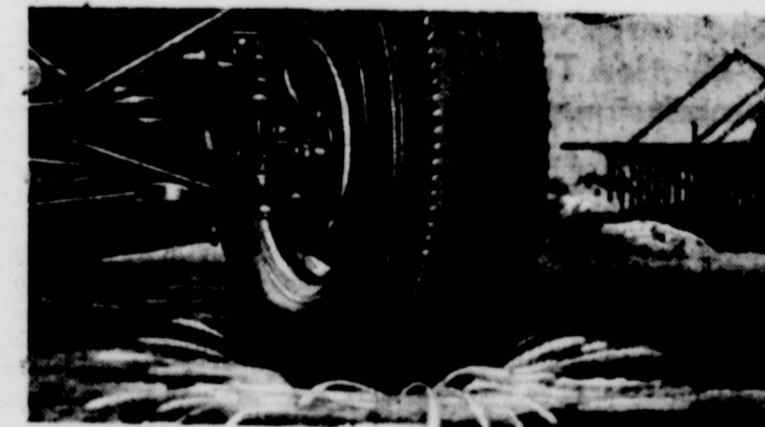

The present furor stems from a courthouse tussle between George B. Parr, often referred to as "The Duke of Duval," and a couple of Texas Rangers - Capt. Alfred Allee and Joe Bridge; plus a Federal investigation of income tax returns of political figures in the turbulent South Texas area - including Parr; and a state investigation of other matters.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd reports that he has had investigators working in Duval County for the past year, looking into the use of state school, public welfare and highway funds in the county.

U. S. Attorney General Herbert Brownell reported from Alice that three special agents of the Treasury Department are investigating income tax returns of George Parr and a few others. Shivers has asked that six more be assigned to assist in an investigation of the county's financial affairs.

Rangers Allee and Bridge were charged with assault with intent to murder George Parr. They are free on bond.

The U. S. Department of Justice has placed a fugitive warrant against Alfredo Cervantes, named as trigger man in the 1952 mistake slaying of Buddy Floyd, son of Jacob Floyd of Alice, the attorney who is defending Allee and Bridge.

The senior Floyd testified that his son was killed because he was mistaken for him. Mario (El Turko) Sapet, a former deputy sheriff under Parr, was convicted of murder and conspiracy to murder in the shooting. He was sentenced to 99 years.

Nago Alaniz, then law partner of the present District Attorney Haelburn Norris, was charged with conspiracy to murder and murder in the case, and is free on bond. He has not yet been tried.

Parr once was convicted and served some time in prison for income tax violation. He received a pardon from President Truman. He is free now on \$1,500 bond on a charge of carrying a pistol illegally near a meeting of the Freedom Party, his political opposition.

It was while awaiting this hearing that the Parr-Rangers scuffle occurred. Involved with Parr was his nephew, Duval County Sheriff Archie Parr. It started when one of the Rangers (Bridge) slapped the sheriff for what the Ranger termed an insulting remark. The second Ranger (Allee) and George Parr then became engaged in a scuffle.

Parr claimed Allee pulled a gun and was going to kill him, but the screams of Mrs. Caro Brown, an Alice Echo reporter, prevented. Another probe is being made by Duval County Grand Jury.

District Judge Woodrow Laughlin, Parr-backed office holder, ordered the grand jury to find out from everybody - including Shepperd - what they know of law violations in Duval County. J. C. King, foreman of the Du-

val County grand jury, is Parr's partner in a San Diego automobile sales agency and also is the chairman of the county's Democratic executive committee.

Laughlin, who is awaiting the outcome of a suit brought by a group of lawyers practicing in his court, to remove him from office for alleged official misconduct, noted in his charge that neither he nor District Attorney Norris had been asked to assist in an investigation.

Shepperd has requested the Treasury and Post Office Departments to send down more investigators. "We need more people down there before the courthouse

burns down," he said. Back in the news is the Distributive, Processing and Office Workers of America. That organization was investigated by the state industrial commission at Gov. Shivers' request last November and found to be "Communist dominated."

Now comes Mrs. R. Z. Dutton, president of the CIO Sabine area local Industrial Union, with a request of the governor that he appoint a committee representing business, labor and the public to make an on-the-spot investigation of the strike.

Shivers answered by stating that all interested parties had an

opportunity to be heard during the November hearings and that "the suggested committee would be without authority to subpoena under oath, nor could it enforce any conclusion it reached."
