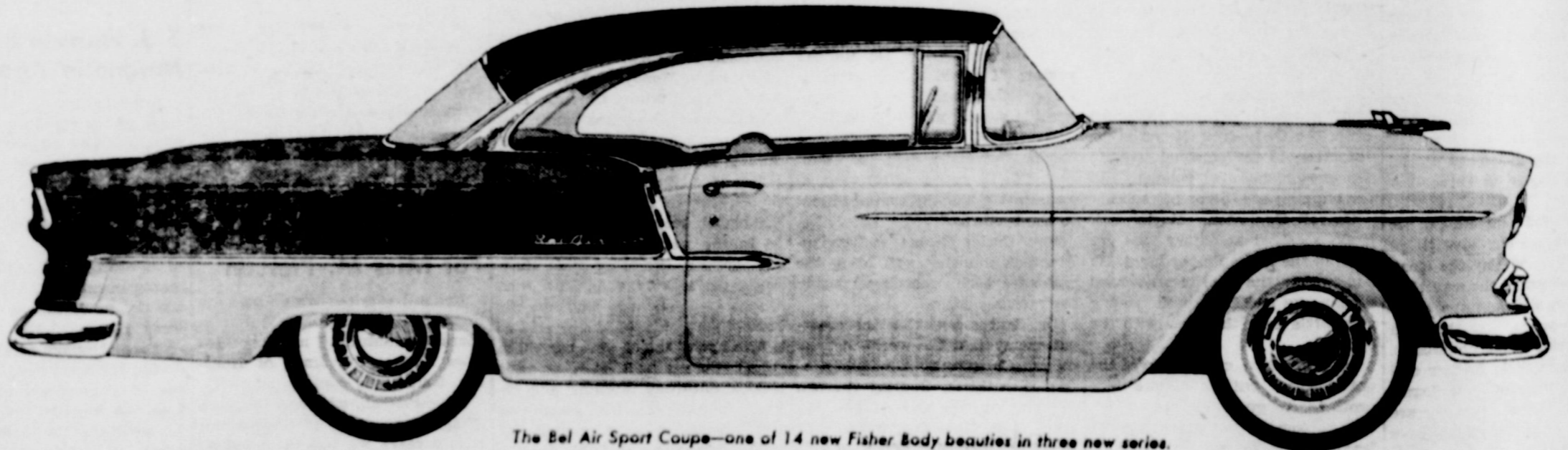

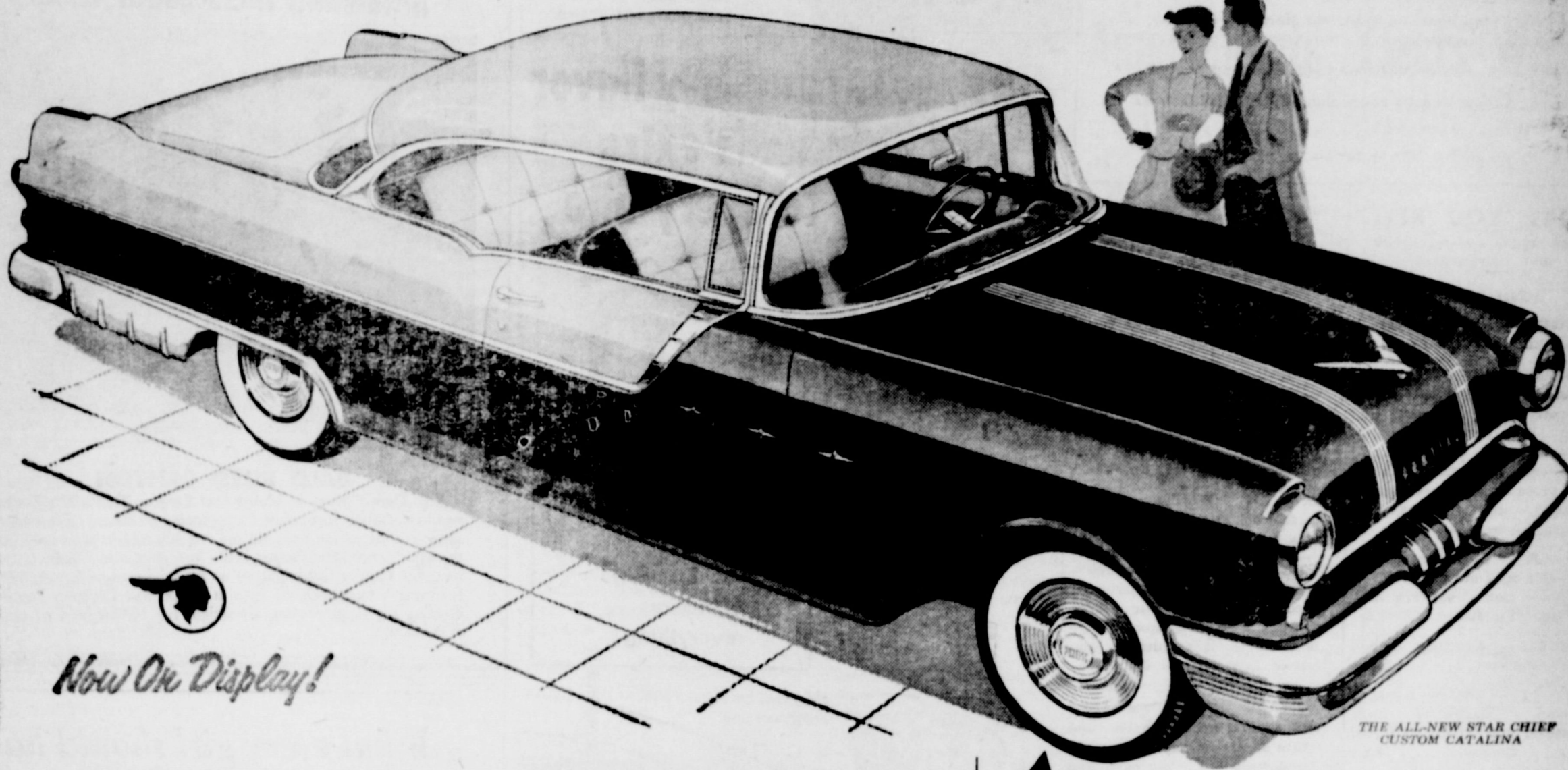
Mrs. Lloyd Cowan gave the closing prayer after Mrs. Brown reviewed the first two chapters of the book.

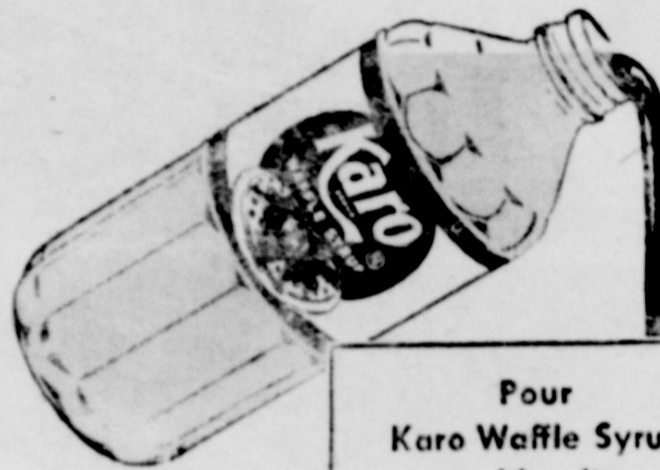

It is 90 million years old and eats 300 million years deep into the earth's crust. The Canyon is the first white man's home in this area. Col. Charles Goodnight set up his headquarters here in 1876 following a trade with the Spanish shepherd Casimero Romero dividing the range country. Goodnight ran 10,000 head of cattle in Palo Duro.

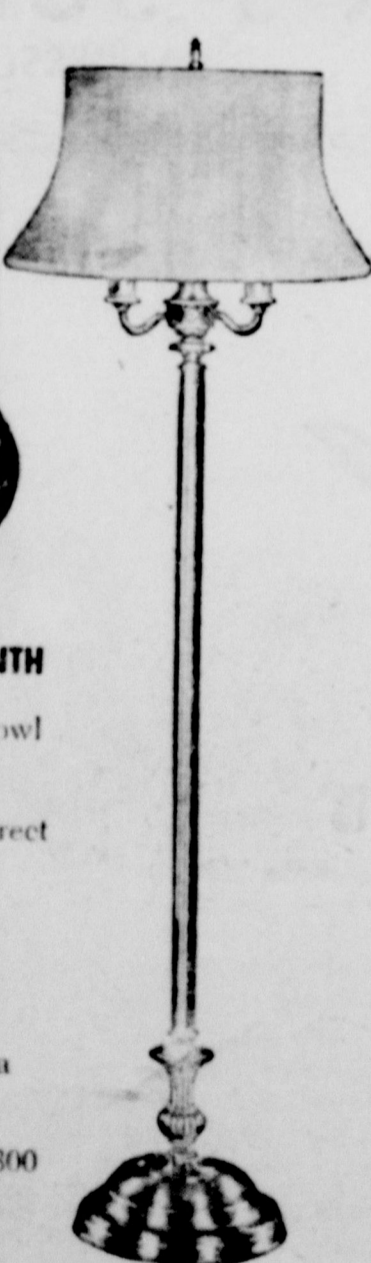
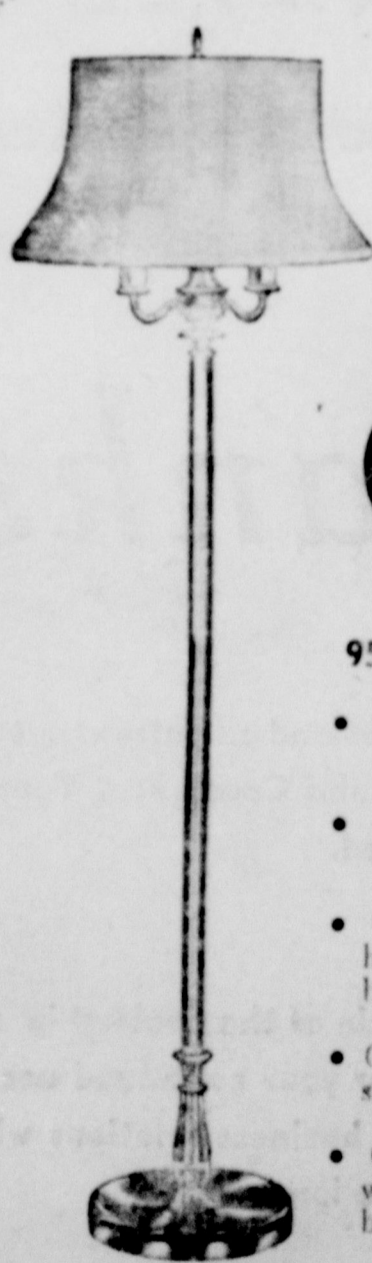

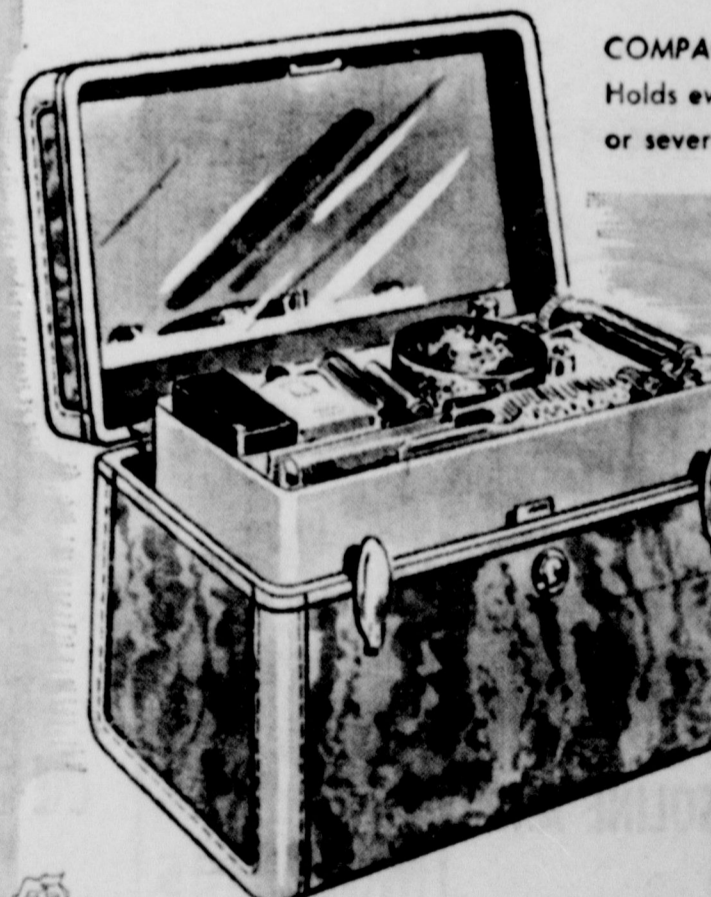
