



Board Discontinues Senior Trips

Sophomores Take Final Journey

The present sophomore class at Friona High School will be the last class to take a senior trip.

The school board voted to abolish senior trips after the 1964-65 school year at the board meeting Monday night.

The reason given for the action was because of the larger classes below the sophomore level at present. There are 90 members in the present freshman class.

The board decided to allow the seniors one day for a class picnic near the end of the school year beginning with the school year 1965-66.

The board also decided to do away with Junior Day. This change is to be effective immediately.

Principals, Tom Jarboe, John R. Cook, J. T. Gee and Counselor B. E. Duggins were re-elected for the 1962-63 school year.

A committee of fifteen teachers with Alton Farr, superin-

endent, serving as chairman were appointed to select textbooks which are up for adoption beginning with the 1962-63 school year. Books up for adoption are: geography, grades 4-6; music, grades 7-8; dictionaries, grades 4-7; history, grade 8; and high school books for general science, American History, and world history.

The books will be available for inspection at the superintendent's office within two weeks.

Dan Ethridge, tax assessor and collector, reported \$911.93 delinquent and \$65,190.66 current taxes collected during the past month for a total of \$66,102.59. The latest report indicates a 62.2 per cent collection for the total tax roll of \$235,912.26.

The \$911.93 remaining on the delinquent tax roll was thought to be the lowest figure

Sub-Zero Temperatures Grip County

Drifting snow, ice, and sub-zero temperatures forced Parmer County residents to dig out their heaviest clothing and seek the soothing warmth of blazing fires this week.

Except in the most necessary instances, residents refused to move out into the freezing winds. Most of the people chose to throw an extra log in the fireplace or turn the heater up and remain in the comfort of a warm house.

The most frequent comment in Friona Wednesday seemed to indicate a shortage of adequate heating facilities in homes and offices. The low temperature of 10 below zero at 4:40

a.m. was enough to strain the output of the sturdiest heaters in maintaining comfortable room temperatures.

The conference opening basketball game with Dalhart, which was scheduled for Tuesday night, was postponed because of the frost-tinged cold and strong wind.

The Oddfellows also cancelled a meeting Tuesday night. The installation of new officers was postponed until Saturday—weather permitting.

The postponed basketball game will also be played Saturday night at Dalhart providing the weather clears enough

to permit the teams to undertake the journey in safety.

The intense cold with sleet and snow struck early Tuesday and continued most of the day as blizzard conditions moved quickly southward.

Gas pressure fell in some places across the state and Panhandle, but no serious difficulty was reported in Friona. Utility crews are keeping a close watch on their equipment in an effort to maintain full service and prevent any shutdown. Several gas and electrical employees in Friona have been on virtual 24 hour duty since the beginning of the storm.

Friona City Council granted permission to W. W. Buck of Hereford to solicit and install "Litter Boxes" in Friona at the meeting Monday night in the City Hall.

Grand Jurors Called Monday

Parmer County Grand Jury will convene Monday to take action on several pending cases, Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports.

The jury of Sept. 5 is being recalled for further duty at this time. They will begin action at 10 a.m. Monday.

Members of the jury are DeWitt Precure, Lazbuddie; E. A. Parham, Lazbuddie; Gene Smith, Lazbuddie; Edmund Kitten, Oklahoma Lane; Leon Billingsley, Oklahoma Lane; Lee R. Mason, Lazbuddie; C. M. Coffey, Farwell; Vernon Jamison, Lariat; Elmer Scott, Lazbuddie; J. T. Ford, Farwell; Elmer Hargrove, Farwell; and Clarence Meeks, Farwell.

Sheriff Lovelace explained the predominance of residents from the southern half of the county as the result of unusual circumstances. None of the first twelve persons whose names were drawn wished to be excused from duty. Three names of Friona residents were drawn but they were not required since the first twelve agreed to serve.

Buck had requested permission to solicit advertising for the boxes and to install and maintain them within the city limits. A fee of \$5 is reportedly to be charged for the sponsorship of a box.

Tom Lewellen, county commissioner, met with the council to discuss and determine the city and county obligations in connection with pauper burials. It was agreed that one of the commissioners would be notified before actual burial on future pauper cases. The county will continue to finance such necessary burials.

Considerable discussion was given to bids received for the construction of a prefabricated steel city warehouse and garage. Acceptable bids were above the budgeted amount and

further action was tabled until spring.

Harold Wells offered to sell his steel barn and block 54 to the city as a substitute for the proposed warehouse and

garage. Although the aldermen considered the price asked by Wells as a just amount, sufficient funds for the transaction were not available under the present budget and the

matter was left for further consideration.

The city manager, A. L. Outland, was authorized to accept bids for a medium duty, two-ton, flat bed, dump truck for city use.

The truck is needed to facilitate the patching of streets and as a supplementary trash collection vehicle.

Installation of four street lights on Elm Street in the Lake-

side addition was approved. A petition asking for the erection of the lights was submitted to the council. Eighteen individuals had signed the document.

Purchase of a truck load of six inch sewer pipe (up to 2,000 feet) was authorized by the council. The pipe is needed to extend the present lines and allow new buildings to connect with the lines. The city is considered obligated to furnish

Auto Thief Caught After Wild Chase

Area officials turned out in force a few minutes after midnight Friday in an effort to intercept a stolen car. The car was reported stolen in Clovis shortly after it was taken. Most of the available patrol units were placed on the alert for the vehicle.

Friona Policeman Ed Duke

and Department of Public Safety Patrolman Charles Skinner spotted the car as it entered Friona about 1 a.m. They chased the vehicle around Friona back toward Bovina. Deputy Sheriff Bill Morgan joined the chase at Bovina where the culprit turned back on Farm Road 1731. The officers finally arrested Benjamin Smart, 32, of Childress after he came to a jolting halt on a dirt road about 10 miles from Friona at 2:10 a.m. Saturday.

Smart was taken to the Parmer County jail and released to the Federal Bureau of Investigation officers that morning.

Two other men are being held by Parmer officials on charges of car theft. They are Simone Chavez, 19, and Vallo Garcia, 17.

They are charged with taking a pickup belonging to Yalidro Costilla at the Ledbetter Gin on Jan. 2. Bond for the pair has been set at \$1,000 each.

Driverless Car Smashes Window

The car drove into the driveway at the service station. The driver got out. A few minutes later, the car crashed through a plate glass window of a nearby hardware store.

Jake Bargas, 24, of Texico, left his car engine running when he stopped at Ray Mears' station in Farwell. According to reports, he also left the automatic transmission engaged. And no brake set.

Shortly after he left the car, he looked back to see it and his young daughter heading for the front of Farwell Hardware. The car rolled about 60 feet and pushed the right front wheel through the store window. The girl was not injured.

An estimated \$500 to \$600 in damage resulted.

Bracero labor association representatives from Lamb and Bailey, counties and from Littlefield, Olton and Muleshoe are expected to attend the meeting.

All persons interested in the use of bracero laborers are being asked to attend the meeting.

Bank Deposits Set Year-End Record

Deposits for the fourth quarter at the Friona State Bank showed an increase of 17.5 per cent over the 1960, Dec. 31 report.

Total deposits were \$5,447,336.28. Assets shown were \$5,831,502.74. These figures are compared with deposits of \$4,573,556.33 and assets of \$4,929,008.65 for the same period in 1960.

The increase of \$873,779.95 in deposits resulted in an all-time high for the year-end report.

Frank Spring, president of Friona State, credited the increase for this period to good wheat and fall crops and a fairly good price for all commodities during the year.

"Prices have been good for all products, including livestock, all year," he said. "I think it has been a good year for the farmer, financially speaking." Spring added.

A late check with the bank Friday showed that deposits had jumped to over six million. The sudden increase is credited to customary surge in the sale of farm commodities at the first of the year.

Returns from the cotton crop for this area are only now beginning to come in. Area farmers were delayed in their efforts to harvest cotton by frequent rain and snow during the past two months.

The cotton crop was plagued throughout the growing, maturing, and har-

vesting season with uncooperative weather, and therefore, is late and of low quality.

However, considerable cotton was produced and it is bringing good prices, even though it is not of the high quality grades.

Low grade cotton which is selling for around 24 cents per pound this year was priced at from 8 to 12 cents per pound in 1959—another low quality year—when the market could be found. This will account for a considerable increase in Friona bank deposits.

"We have quite a lot of livestock in this area and that has helped us considerably," Spring said.

Editorial Comment:

A Point Of Pride

Friona residents can look with pride upon the United Fund Campaign results this year.

Ethridge also discussed the tax assessing methods and value scales used in the process. Latest figures concerning the school income in relation to the accepted budget were presented to the board members by Farr. Latest report received from the state showed a slight change from the anticipated figures.

As explained by Farr, the school budget and income are presently calculated as follows: Local revenue from 95 per cent collection of the tax assessment and from the building fund will result in a total of \$226,170. State derived revenue, consisting of per capita payments for 1,113 students, salary and operation, transportation, vocational agriculture, and county available fund payments, will bring an additional \$221,820. Total revenue will, therefore, amount to \$447,990.

The original budget as accepted at the beginning of the year amounted to \$450,268. This leaves \$2,278 budgeted above the anticipated revenue.

"We will probably be able to make up the difference through careful reductions in other expenditures," Farr said.

Dr. George Anderson was re-elected city health officer. Anderson's one year term expired last week.

Outland reported that installation of building numbers on establishments along Main, 5th and 11th Streets, was underway.

The city manager presented a four-page report of December activities of his office and staff. A few highlights from his report are:

A total of \$36,875.15 was

collected from a total tax roll of \$62,760.23 for a 58.7 per cent collection as of Jan. 1.

One employee, Robert Traylor, Sanitation department, left without notice on Dec. 14. Wilford A. Hensley was employed on Dec. 18 to fill the vacancy.

A total of 6,913,000 gallons of water were pumped and distributed to the 814 customers during the month. Of this amount, 5,103,000 gallons were accounted for in water sales. This indicates a 74 per cent efficiency in the city water distribution system.

Water system maintenance was performed by the flushing of fire hydrants on Dec. 20-21.

Approximately 2,118,336 gallons of sewage were pumped during the month.

There were no fire calls within the city during the month. Seven calls to rural areas for a total loss of an estimated \$2,150 were answered.

A total of 18 arrests were made during the month. Of these, one was for drunkenness, two for vagrancy, four for accidents and eleven were for traffic violations.

The four vehicle accidents were minor in nature and no injuries resulted.

The next meeting of the council was set for Feb. 5.

Waggoner Carr Announces For Attorney General

Waggoner Carr, former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, Thursday announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Attorney General.

"My platform basically has but one plank--strengthening our legal framework where needed, and more vigorous enforcement of those laws, once enacted," Carr declared.

The 42-year-old former lawmaker and law enforcement official revealed plans for an intensive campaign leading up to the Democratic primary. He promised detailed discussion of the issues as the campaign develops.

Carr served five terms as a member of the House from Lubbock County, the last two as speaker. He is one of only three men in the history of Texas to be elected Speaker two consecutive terms.

Born in Fairlie, Hunt County, Texas, Carr moved with his family to Lubbock County in 1932. He graduated from Lubbock High School and Texas Technological College. He received his law degree from the University of Texas and was admitted to the State Bar in 1947.

Before going to the Legislature, Carr served as County Attorney of Lubbock County and Assistant District Attorney of the 72nd Judicial District.

(Acts 8:3) Now read the first four verses of chapter nine and notice what the Lord said, "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me?" Or in other words, to persecute the church, to degrade the church, was to persecute and degrade Christ. To say that the church is not important is to say that Christ is not important. The church, as the bride of Christ, wears His name and is subject to His law.

"For I am determined not to know anything among you save Jesus Christ and Him crucified." (1 Cor. 2:2) When one analyzes the preaching of Paul he comes to realize that Paul did not just use the words, "Christ and Him crucified."

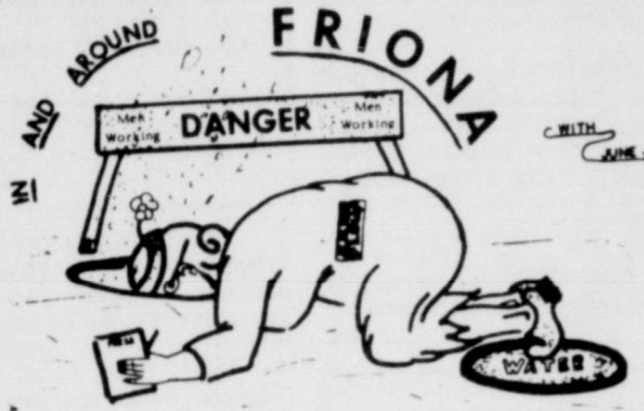

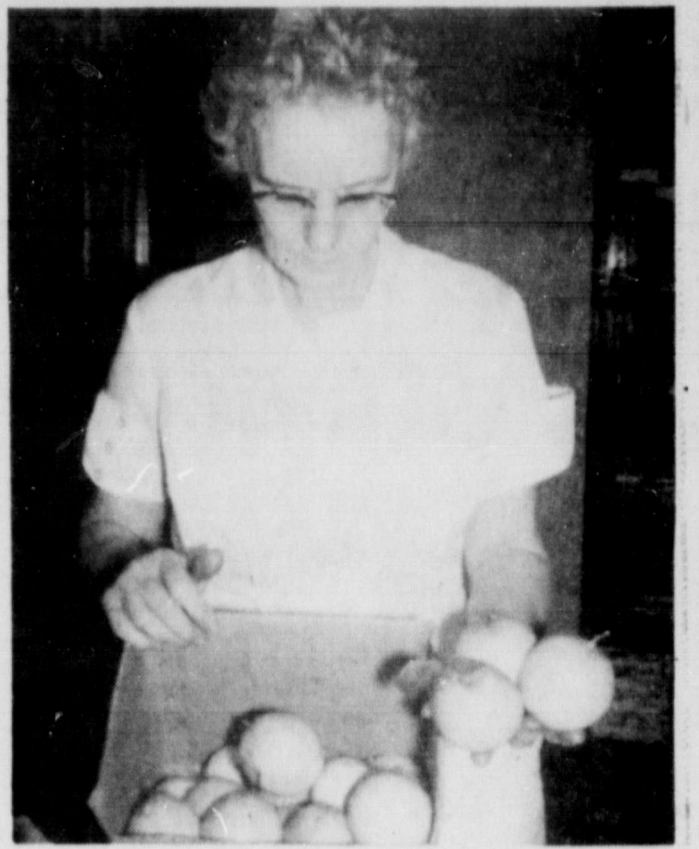
Stolen Auto Found Here

County Certified Brucellosis-Free

WITH THE COUNTY AGENT

DERYL COKER

As we all know 1961 was a fairly good year for agriculture as a whole for us in Farmer County. We had our ups and downs as far as crop production goes. If the weather had been a little more cooperative in October and November, we could of probably said it was the best year to date. Well, it's water under the bridge now, so we have got to look and plan for 1962.

1962 will mark an important milestone for the American farmer and for American Agriculture. It commemorates the hundredth anniversary of the USDA and of the Land Grant College system in America.

Agriculture has made a most impressive record in the past century. In 1862, one farmer produced enough food for five people. Today, he produces enough for 26, and possibly in another 20 years he will produce enough food for 50 people.

For us in Farmer County we will need to look at our past mistakes a little closer and do a good job of planning for the future. Every farmer needs to know what will give the largest return on his investment.

The present agriculture outlook is fairly bright due to larger cash receipts and increased government payments. The USDA says gross income to farmers are expected to rise in 1962, assuming average growing conditions and a continuation

of price supports and other farm programs. But prices paid to farmers will continue high and some rise in farm production expenses now appears likely. On balance, realized net income of farm operators is expected to change little in 1962 from levels estimated for 1961. The farmers share of the nation's income is smaller, but it is going to a smaller number of people.

In talking with Dick Poteet of the Texas Employment Commission, he stated that if farmers need a farm hand they should sign up at one of their offices. By signing up it could be a help in case of an undue hardship case.

He also stated that Braceros can no longer be used as tractor drivers and if a farmer are caught using them as such the county could be blacklisted or banned from using any bracero labor.

At present there is a request for a 90 day extension, but the Texas Employment Commission has not received an answer as of yet.

Farmer County is now a modified certified Brucellosis free area.

The announcement that Farmer County had received the certification was made this week by Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Dr. Garrett and members of the commission expressed their "appreciation to the people of Farmer County for the splendid cooperation extended to its representatives while work was being conducted in Farmer County." The commission also requested the "further cooperation of the citizens of the area to maintain the brucellosis status of the County."

The certification of the county as a brucellosis free area will allow county cattle to be moved into other areas with a minimum of red tape and delay. It will also permit cattlemen in this county to sell cattle at otherwise restricted markets.

Actual work on brucellosis testing in the county began with an organizational meeting in Bovina Sept. 11. The county was divided into six sections and a portable lab was set up in Bovina.

The present certification will expire in three years and the area will again have to be certified brucellosis-free.

Cattle from Farmer County may be moved into other areas which are declared brucellosis-free without restrictions. However, restrictions will be placed on all cattle moving into this area. Persons caught violating these restrictions will be subject to a fine of \$10 to \$100 for each head of cattle moved into the county without complying with restrictions.

Clovis Swift Plant Offers Area Market

Construction began last week on a \$2 million Swift & Co. meat packing plant in Clovis. It is hoped that the plant will provide a ready market for much of the Farmer County cattle, and stimulate the increase in production of cattle in this area.

The new facility, financed by the city of Clovis under New Mexico's Industrial Revenue Act, will result in about \$1 million monthly to the Clovis area and employment of 60 persons.

"Due to the fact that we are now a certified brucellosis-free county, we will be able to ship cattle directly to the plant in Clovis," Deryl Coker, county agent, said.

According to several reports, enough beef is raised in Texas to supply the state and much of the beef for neighboring states. But, a considerable amount of the beef used in Texas is shipped in from the corn belt area. This situation is accounted for by the lack of adequate marketing facilities in the state. The plant in Clovis is expected to help bring local consumption of Texas cattle.

In the past, most of the Texas beef has been shipped to the west coast and other areas.

"The Clovis plant will provide a ready market with a minimum shrinkage factor for area cattle," Coker commented.

"The biggest help to this area (from the plant installation) will be to the feedlots and in helping develop additional cattle feeding," Coker added.

General Chairman, Burris C. Jackson has announced.

The 1962 Cotton Congress will be held at Harlingen, Texas, Matamoros, Mexico and the Lower Rio Grande Valley on June 7-8-9.

Headquarters for the 1962 Congress will be at the Seville Hotel in Harlingen. Pledger B. Cate, Jr., Manager, Harlingen Chamber of Commerce, is in charge of hotel and motel reservations.

"The purpose of the January 5th meeting in Dallas is to start a discussion of the program and plans for the 1962 Congress," Mr. Jackson said, "and we are meeting at a very important time in the history of the American cotton industry."

Jackson pointed out that the American cotton industry rumormills were full of talk that cotton is on the verge of a change in governmental policy. He reserved comment on the rumors but said the Cotton Congress Committee would fully explore same at the Dallas meeting.

The 1961 Congress was held in Lubbock, Texas with the general theme being "Cotton - A \$22 Billion U. S. Industry." The meeting in the Rio Grande Valley in 1962 will be the twenty-third annual Congress meeting.

Some of the outstanding cotton authorities of the world and the

top officials of the U.S. Government have appeared on the Congress programs in past years, and the committee will make every effort to build an outstanding and constructive program for 1962.

HD Agent's Notes

Before another cold spell, now is the time to trim the broken limbs from your trees or shrubs as result of the severe ice storm we had before Christmas. This should be done as soon as possible. That means you will need a good sharp pruning saw, pruning shears, and tree paint for this serious operation.

Yes, pruning the limbs is a serious operation. First saw through the bark under the limb to be sawed off. This will keep the weight of the branch or limb from peeling down the bark.

In sawing off the broken limb begin sawing even with the trunk or main branch. This will allow the wound to heal over by the bark. If the limb is sawed too close into the tree this will injure or kill the tree.

If a stub or lip of wood is left after sawing the branch or limb, the wound cannot heal satisfactorily. Instead, air and moisture will enter the center of the stub and eventually decay into the main trunk of the tree. A complete decay will kill the tree.

Always use a tree paint or shellac to cover the wound. Shellac should be painted over the wound immediately after the operation of trimming the branch or limb. When the shellac has dried, a wound dressing or tree paint should be applied over the exposed area.

There are various types of wound dressings. Those most commonly used are orange shellac, asphaltum paints, outdoor house paint, grafting wax and alcohol, and the commercial tree paints.

Regardless of the type dressing used, you will get best results if you inspect the dressed surfaces periodically and recoat them once or twice a year. Before recoating is applied clean the wound with a stiff wire brush to remove all blisters and loose flakes. Do not cover the new growth with this coat of wound dressing.

We have a very helpful bulletin in the office "Modern Pruning Methods" that will be of much help in pruning trees and shrubs. It's free from our office, so come by, write us your request, and we shall be happy to give you a copy.

Now is the best time to plant roses if you are planning for a new rose bush or two to add to your rose bed. Roses may be planted in the fall or spring. In Texas, fall planting is preferred.

If plants cannot be set at the time of arrival, unpack them place the roots in water for a few hours, and then bury the plants, tops and all, in moist soil until planting can be done. This would not be necessary with roses planted in cans or pails.

Dig the hole large enough so that the roots can be spread out in a natural manner. This procedure applies to roses in packages only. Roses planted in cans should be planted without disturbing the roots when the can is cut away.

For the roses packed in paper packages build a mound of soil in the center of the hole and arrange the roots over it. Press down around the plant to force out any air pockets remaining in the soil mound.

Cover the roots with top-soil and tamp it firmly. Never plant when the soil is so wet that it can be pressed into balls that will not crumble. When the soil has been firmly tamped around the plant, water it thoroughly.

While we are speaking of planting and pruning trees and shrubs, here's a reminder for pruning roses. No fall pruning should be done. Experiments during the past several years show that the less the amount of fall pruning, the greater the number of flowers produced the following season.

Parmer County Object of Study

Parmer County was of great discussion during a three-day Program Building Training Meeting of all Extension Service Agents in District 1 of the upper Texas Panhandle. Local extension agents, Miss Ettie Musil and Deryl Coker, were among the 45 home demonstration and agricultural agents, district agents, extension specialists, and administrative staff attending the training January 2-5 in Amarillo.

In order to better understand the importance of knowing the county in which extension service agents work, Parmer County was discussed by C. James Murphrey Area Farm Management Specialist, and Mrs. Eula Newman, Home Management Specialist of College Station. Historical and general background information was earlier compiled by Miss Musil and Joe Jones, former county agriculture agent. Other information written included general attitude of the people with regard to agriculture, industry, education, County Extension work, and changes. The geographic situation of the county in reference to markets, transportation, recreation, and metropolitan areas was included as important to the county.

This data was compiled in August before Miss Musil and Mr. Jones participated in a special training of County Program Building during Extension Service Staff Conference in August. Parmer County was selected by the District Agents, W.W. Gaißam, Jr. and Miss Edith Wilson, to represent the 22 counties in District 1.

All of this training in August and January will be used to strengthen the Parmer County Program Building Committee. The committee determines the problems of the people and agriculture and then plans for programs that will meet these family and community needs.

Local extension agents are responsible for the leaders and training of this committee and subject area committees. Long range objectives and annual goals are planned by the committee and agents to meet the needs of the county.

Others presenting useful information during the three day meeting were J. D. Prewit, Associate Director of Extension Service, Larry Burleson, Organization Specialist, Miss Fannie Brown, Easton, Clothing Specialist, Charles Baker, Economist in Farm Org., Mrs. Clady Kolander, State Home Demonstration Agent, Garland Marshall, Bob Hunt, Century Study, R. I. Cross, and district agents.

Remove from fire and add 1 teaspoon soda and stir in well. Pour on buttered foil. Let cool about five minutes, then wet hands and

PECAN PRALINES

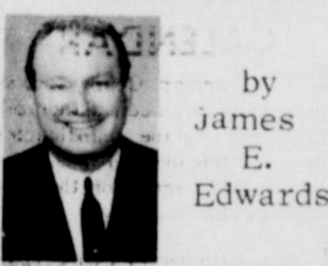
1/2 cup brown sugar, packed

1 cup milk
1 cup pecan halves
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon butter
1 tablespoon vanilla
Combine milk, brown sugar and white sugar and cook over low fire and stir until sugar is dissolved. After boiling a few minutes, add butter and pecans. Cook to a soft ball stage or 236 degrees on candy thermometer.
Cool and add vanilla. Beat until mixture looks dull. Drop on greased wax paper.
