A brief memorial service at the monument on the court house yard Monday morning marked the only observation of Memorial Day in Sanderson.

## H. C. Noelke, Jr., Victim of Accident Near Brownwood

H. C. Noelke, Jr., 41, prominent Terrell and Pecos County rancher, was killed instantly about 9 miles northeast of Brownwood at noon Friday when his station wagon and trailer were sideswiped by a truck.

His wife and two children, who were in the station wagon, were taken to the Brownwood hospital and found to be suffering only from shock.

Noelke, driving the station wagon and pulling a trailer loaded with sheep, had stopped to change a tire on the left side of the trailer. The vehicles were side-swiped by a bob-tailed truck and Noelke was crushed between the truck bed and the trailer, according to reports of investigating officers.

Noelke operated a 35-section ranch in Terrell and Pecos Counties. He had 16 head of registered sheep in his trailer to be delivered in Paris, Texas, at the time of the fatal accident.

He was one of the leading sheep showmen in the Southwest and each year had top flocks in major shows of Texas.

Last year he was named president and general chairman of the San Angelo Fat Stock Show and Rodeo, being re-named to the two posts at the annual meeting of the directors last month. He was also a director of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and a director of the West Texas Wool and Mohair Assn. of Mertzon.

Besides his widow, a son and daughter, he is also survived by his mother, Mrs. H. C. Noelke, Sr., and a sister, Mrs. Thos. G. Thigpin, both of San Angelo.

## Improvements To Big Bend Park

The first resident engineer for Big Bend National Park entered duty May 8, and arrived in the park May 12. This engineer, Jarrol G. It is expected that additional funds will be made available for an expansion of this campground area in the near future.

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**Senate Resolution Issued by Hardeman Notes Terrell County's 50th Birthday**

Senate Resolution No. 339, initiated by State Senator Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, follows:  
**WHEREAS**, Terrell County was created and organized in 1905 out of Pecos County and named for Honorable Alexander Watkins Terrell, a gallant Confederate officer and member of the Texas Legislature for 16 years; and  
**WHEREAS**, this picturesque area of Texas lying in the southeastern part of the great Trans-Pecos area, with its rolling hills and great Pecos Canyon on its eastern border and its western mountainous area, dissected by canyon creeks, and bordered on the south by the Rio Grande gorge; and  
**WHEREAS**, the people of this cattle and sheep empire, noted as well for its fine quarter horses, are celebrating the Fiftieth Anniversary of the creation and organization of their county on July 14, 1905; and  
**WHEREAS**, the Senate of Texas desires to congratulate the people of Terrell County and extend its congratulations and best wishes to them on such historical event;  
**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Senate of Texas that its congratulations and best wishes be and the same are hereby extended to the County of Terrell and its people on the occasion of the observance of the Fiftieth Anniversary of its creation and organization; **AND BE IT FURTHER**  
**RESOLVED** that an official copy of this Resolution, under the Seal of the Senate, be forwarded by the Secretary of the Senate to the Commissioner's Court of Terrell County, Texas.

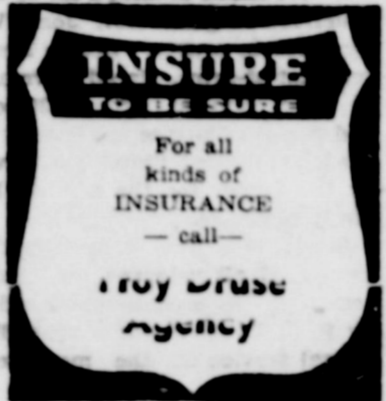
A committee who thought they had finished a products found out Wednesday that their work was only just begun.

**Mental Disorders Major Problem In Public Health**

Austin—Mental disorder today represents a major public health problem. Nearly fifty per cent of all hospital beds are occupied by patients with mental illness, declares Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. But it is estimated that in addition to these, at least one in ten in the general population is suffering from an emotional illness sufficiently disabling to interfere with work and family life. Both severe and minor mental illness appear to stem from organic causes, psychological causes, or a combination of the two. Much progress has been made in reducing the amount of mental illness due to organic disorders. At one time, 10 per cent of mental hospital beds in the south were occupied by patients whose mental illness was due to pellagra. Today, with improved understanding of nutrition, such cases are almost unknown. Fifteen years ago, a large number of mental hospital patients suffered from "general paresis," or central nervous system syphilis. Today, due to strides made in control and prevention to syphilis, less than 2 per cent of mental hospital admissions are patients with general paresis. Only since World War II have extensive efforts been made in prevention of mental illness due primarily to psychological factors. Much additional research is needed here, as well as with organic factors. However, recent studies are building up increasing evidence that early childhood experiences are of vast significance in mental health. Children need consistent, warm mothering, especially dur-

ing their first three years of life. And in our high-speed modern society, they need guidance in the home and in the school in learning to handle their feelings effectively and in building healthy resistance to pressures of daily living. Just as attention is needed to building strong bodies in children, so is attention needed to building sound minds. Office Supplies at The Times

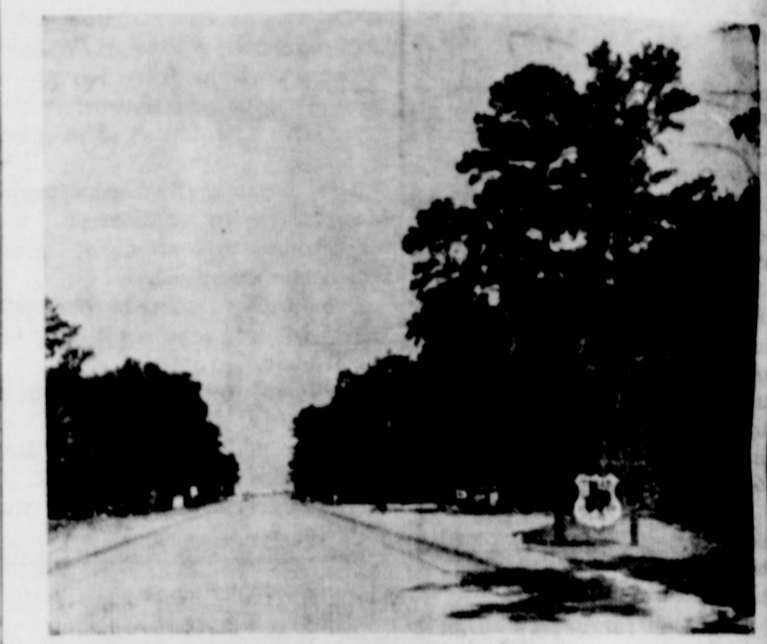
