Needy Persons Get Surplus Food

Almost 800 million pounds of this country's food surplus was donated to school children and needy persons in the country and abroad during the last half of 1955 reports the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In this country surplus food went to about 11 million school children, about 1 million persons in charitable institutions, 100,000 Indians, and about two and quarter million persons in needy families. Altogether, food distribut. ed to these groups totaled nearly 300 million pounds.

Foods were also distributed to hungry people in 70 foreign countries around the free world. Eighteen nongovernmental U. S. wel fare agencies took part in this disposal, distributing almost 500 million pounds of food during the latter half of 1955.

Food given away in this country is handled through state facilities. with the state government taking full charge and responsibility for the distribution. Needs in this country are given priority, and sufficient quantities are reserved to satisfy all requests from state governments.

Several new developments point to disposal of even greater quantitles of surplus food this year The Department of Agriculture has purchased more than 102 million pounds of pork products which are now being distributed. Public Law 311, of the (84th Congress authorizes distribution of wheat flour and cornmeal as a strictly domestic relief measure, the first shipments have already been made under this law, with much more expected to follow. The Department has also announced that wheat and corn have been added to commodities available to the schools and charitable institutions and wheat, corn, rice and dry beans are now available for foreign

A committee headed by Guy C Jackson, Jr., of Anahuac met with groups from the upper and lower Rio Grande basin to consider needed state legislation on release and distribution of waters stored by nternational dams built under the treaty with Mexico.






