HIGHWAY 90 GROUP HEARS REPORT ON BRIDGE PROGRESS AT CASTROVILLE MEET

The Travel U.S. 90 Highway Association held its quarterly meeting of the directors Sunday in Castroville. John L. Dodson, Jr., president of the Association, presided and Vice-President Dudley Baker of Columbus and Earl Pierson of Sanderson led their respective delegations from the east and west section of U.S. 90 in Texas, in the discussion of highway needs and development.

A feature of the report by Earl Pierson was the progress of construction of the Pecos River bridge. This has been an outstanding attraction during recent weeks when travel along U.S. 90 reached a new high and will be a major attraction when the steel erecting crews begin work after the end of this month.

President Dodson proposed a plan for reorganizing the work program of the association by suggesting promotion plans be centered around a periodical containing interesting travel and highway news. Dodson said the consensus seems to be that the Highway 90 Association has now matured to the point where such a project

Local School Fund Deficit Relief Sought By Board

Terrell County school officials, faced with the need for more money for the operation of the schools, this week presented the appeal to the commissioners' court in which they recommended an increase for the funds by at least 20 per cent.

The commissioners' court is the only tax levying body in the county and the Terrell County Common School District must appeal to that body for money for the local maintenance fund.

It was pointed out that the system had operated "in the red" for the past four years. Amounts overdrawn or vouchers issued but not presented each year follows: In 1952, \$7,618.45; 1953, \$6,356.84; 1954, \$6,547.59; and in September, 1955, the actual amount of overdraft was \$5,044.17.

Valuations on taxable property showed considerable decrease during the same years. This is mainly attributable to the continued

drouth and decrease in stock population rendered by ranchmen of the county, it was stated.

The commissioners have taken the matter under consideration and will meet and study plans for raising the needed funds. Increased valuation on taxable property, or rendition of all taxable property, personal and real, is the only solution to increased revenue for the schools, it was pointed out, since the \$1.75 tax rate now in effect is the statutory limit allowed. The commissioners are offering no opinion now, however, as to the solution of the deficiency in school operating funds until they are able to give the problem more thought and study.

County Judge R. S. Wilkinson stated that the court recognizes the need for additional school financing and will endeavor to solve the problem in an equitable and sensible way and with as little increase in taxes as possible to take care of the needs. It was pointed out, however, that any immediate action by the court in adjusting the income of the school to fit their needs, will be a move for that purpose alone, and with no thought at the present, or because of the action, with a building program in mind.

"That bridge" it was stated "will be crossed when we get to it." And the action now was to take care of the deficit in school operating funds.

AUSTIN — Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd grabbed the spotlight with his announcement that he would not be a candidate for "any state office."

Although he had forewarned his friends of the impending decision, they were stunned at the announcement. Most expected him to run for reelection. Many had urged him to enter the race for governor.

In giving his decision, he outlined the many accomplishments of his office, including the housecleaning in Duval County; the veterans block land exposure; the exposure of fraudulent insurance companies; and the establishment of an effective system of co-ordinating law enforcement activities in Texas.

Shepperd intends to remain where he is until his term ends on December 31. It has been reported that he would accept a business offer in Odessa.

His decision not to run for any state office was announced in a letter to Harry Kates, publisher of his hometown newspaper, the Gladewater Mirror.

Close friends of Shepperd say that the announcement does not remove him from the list of prospective entrants in the race for U. S. Senator, if and when Price Daniel resigns from the Senate.

Personal Privilege
An individual's right to express his opinions, within the bounds of libel, for or against any candidate for public office, or any public in-

stitution, will be tested in court by the Texas Press Association.

Under the new Texas Election Code, candidates themselves may publish any amount of advertising, limited only by their own personal finances, and contributions. But an individual is restricted to a \$25 expenditure during the entire campaign.

On the average, that is approximately 30 words over the radio; a few seconds of TV time; and less than 20 inches of newspaper space. And it is below the minimum requirement for billboard advertising.

Hearing on the subject will be before the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Lowry Gets Prison Term
Former Beaumont Mayor Leslie Lowry has been found guilty of perjury, in the organization of an insurance company, and sentenced to seven years in prison.

District Judge Charles O. Betts pronounced the sentence. Lowry, now a Kansas school teacher, was accused of making false statements in an affidavit filed five years ago in connection with organization of the now defunct Texas Fire Insurance Co. of Beaumont and Ennis.

Supreme Court Ruling
Texas officials are aroused by a U. S. Supreme Court ruling knocking the props out from under another state law.

Latest to all are state anti-sedition laws, which the high court says are superseded by Federal law. Apparent effect was to nullify Texas' anti-communist law.

Attorney General Shepperd called the action "a stunning blow to states rights. It rules out another field of state-federal cooperation, and is impossible to reconcile with the reserved powers of the Federal constitution."

Meanwhile Shepperd filed a brief in the U. S. Supreme Court in support of a contested Wisconsin law against disorderliness in labor dis-

putes. Texas has a similar law.

Property Rights Asked by Women
A woman should be allowed to manage her separate property, say the Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Texas League of Women Voters, and Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

They have asked the Texas Legislative Council for such a law. They also urged repeal of the law requiring wives to make separate acknowledgements on legal documents covering property belonging to a couple.

Gas Company Wins Test
Companies which paid the old gas gathering tax "without protest" will get their money back.

In the first test case ruling the Third Court of Civil Appeals held that Tennessee Gas Transmission Co. is entitled to a refund of the \$1,10,906 it paid in taxes. Interest payment of \$249,576 was not granted.

Since the gas gathering tax was declared unconstitutional by the U. S. Supreme Court, the state has returned more than 25 million dollars in taxes paid "under protest." Last year the Texas legislature granted permission for about 30 companies, which paid without protest, to sue or recovery.

Short Snorts
Obie Jones, Travis County representative, took himself out of discussion as a candidate for state treasurer, by announcing for reelection to the House.

Ambassadors of Mexico and all South American and Central American nations, will tour Texas for three days, starting April 27. They will visit Houston, fly through the Beaumont-Port Arthur industrial areas, and on April 28 visit College Station and Austin.

A written protest has been filed by the State School Land Board against Louisiana's attempt to lease submerged areas off the Texas-Louisiana boundary, on the ground that Texas claims the area. John D. Cofer, Austin attorney and leader in the Liberal Democrats' set-up, was named chief counsel of the Senate Armed Services preparedness subcommittee, of which Sen. Lyndon Johnson is chairman. He will serve through the present session of Congress.

On May 1, Bill Collins of Austin will succeed Gordon K. Shearer as executive secretary of the Texas Parks Board. Collins is executive director of the Texas Nurserymen's Association.

Teel Connell of Killeen has been appointed by Governor Shivers to fill the unexpired term of Johnnie U. Foster of Lufkin on the Veterans Affairs Commission. Connell is State Commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. Enforcement of the motor vehicle inspection law begins April 16, warns Col-



COMPROMISING WITH EVIL

American newspapers and news magazines gave prominent position to reports of the antics in London last week of Georgy Maximilianovich Malenkov, henchman of the late Communist dictator Joseph Stalin and a key man in the Communists international conspiracy to get control of the world. News photographs showed a pudgy, smiling Malenkov mingling with women and children on London streets, being wine and entertained by high British government officials, speaking to applauding Socialist-Labor Party groups.

Malenkov was serving as Premier, immediately after Stalin's death, when the last big power struggle within the dictatorship resulted in the liquidation of hundreds of Reds once held in high favor. He was in London last week to inspect electric power installations. It was apparent, however, that his prime mission was as "advance man" for the other Communist bosses — Khrushchev and Bulganin — who are to follow him to London this spring.

People Taken In
An important commentary on Malenkov's London visit was the evidence it gave of people's susceptibility to the handshake and smile of a demagogue — even though the demagogue's smile may be a fraud on the basis of clear facts. TIME Magazine's London correspondent reported: "Scores of female garment workers hung out of the windows across the street to catch a glimpse. When Malenkov raised his hand and grinned his broadest, the walls echoed with a welcoming cheer. 'He was so clean-cut,' one sewing machine operator told a reporter

later, 'he looked like an American.'"

Lord Citrine, British government official who entertained Malenkov, said of him: "A very friendly man, with a deep grasp of English cultural life." And yet, Lord Citrine surely knew that Malenkov had come to London straight from the Communist Party 20th Congress at which all the top bosses had rededicated themselves to the Marx-Lenin-Stalin-Bulganin goal of a Communist world — by whatever means are necessary. And, the people of Britain surely knew that Malenkov was a conspicuous member of the Stalin dictatorship which, in 20 horrible years, ordered the execution of tens of millions of innocent citizens in the nations overcome by Communism.

nations of the world, the bowing acceptance accorded to the Red leaders in London and elsewhere is shocking. It undermines the will of these people to resist the tyranny.

Deeds Unchanged
Communist smiles, promises and handshakes do not give evidence that the true nature of Communism is changing. Where are the deeds to back up the friendly smiles? This is the question that Britains and the other people of the non-Communist world ought to be asking. There are no genuine friendly deeds from the Reds. The Iron Curtain still is the Iron Curtain. The Red slave labor camps still hold their millions of miserable human beings. Red dictatorship tramples the free will of the people in 24 nations. The mass executions continue.

And yet in Britain, say the news

Most of the people of Britain knew these facts, no doubt; but they evidently felt that the Malenkov smile, handshake and charming manner somehow changed the whole character of this high ranking Communist. The instructions for behavior given out to his people by one leading British clergyman are interesting: The people were advised to "act with restraint and dignity" during the Russian's visit but to "set aside a day of prayer for Christians persecuted behind the Iron Curtain."

The photographs of Malenkov being accepted, greeted and entertained by the British government and the people of London will be widely distributed throughout the nations of the world — especially in the non-Communist countries where the Reds are working to capture the dominant political power, such as France and Italy and India. 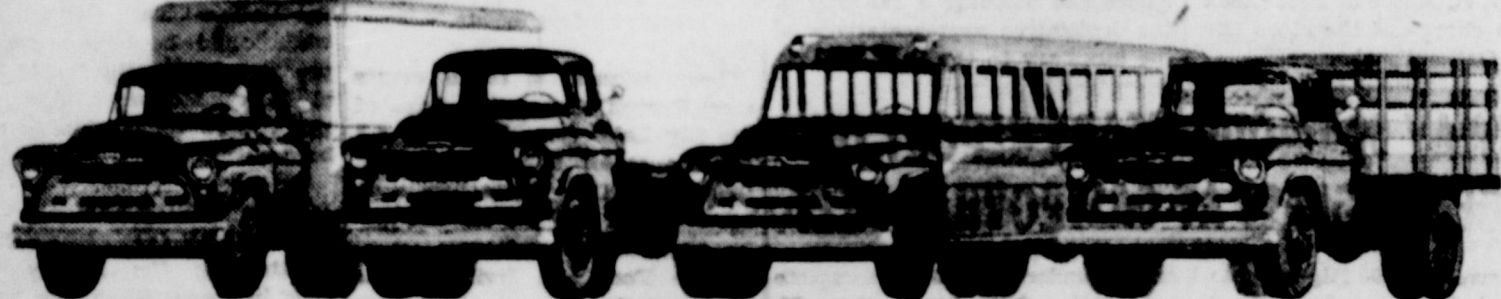

AUSTIN — Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd grabbed the spotlight with his announcement that he would not be a candidate for "any state office."

Although he had forewarned his friends of the impending decision, they were stunned at the announcement. Most expected him to run for reelection. Many had urged him to enter the race for governor.

In giving his decision, he outlined the many accomplishments of his office, including the housecleaning in Duval County; the veterans block land exposure; the exposure of fraudulent insurance companies; and the establishment of an effective system of co-ordinating law enforcement activities in Texas.

Shepperd intends to remain where he is until his term ends on December 31. It has been reported that he would accept a business offer in Odessa.

His decision not to run for any state office was announced in a letter to Harry Kates, publisher of his hometown newspaper, the Gladewater Mirror.

Close friends of Shepperd say that the announcement does not remove him from the list of prospective entrants in the race for U. S. Senator, if and when Price Daniel resigns from the Senate.

Personal Privilege An individual's right to express his opinions, within the bounds of libel, for or against any candidate for public office, or any public

sue, will be tested in court by the Texas Press Association.

Under the new Texas Election Code, candidates themselves may publish any amount of advertising, limited only by their own personal finances, and contributions. But an individual is restricted to a \$25 expenditure during the entire campaign.

On the average, that is approximately 30 words over the radio; a few seconds of TV time; and less than 20 inches of newspaper space. And it is below the minimum requirement for billboard advertising.

Hearing on the subject will be before the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Lowry Gets Prison Term Former Beaumont Mayor Leslie Lowry has been found guilty of perjury, in the organization of an insurance company, and sentenced to seven years in prison.

District Judge Charles O. Betts pronounced the sentence. Lowry, now a Kansas school teacher, was accused of making false statements in an affidavit filed five years ago in connection with organization of the now defunct Texas Fire Insurance Co. of Beaumont and Ennis.

Supreme Court Ruling Texas officials are aroused by a U. S. Supreme Court ruling knocking the props out from under another state law.

Attorney General Shepperd called the action "a stunning blow to states rights. It rules out another field of state-federal cooperation, and is impossible to reconcile with the reserved powers of the Federal constitution."

Meanwhile Shepperd filed a brief in the U. S. Supreme Court in support of a contested Wisconsin law against disorderliness in labor dis-

putes. Texas has a similar law.

Property Rights Asked by Women A woman should be allowed to manage her separate property, say the Business and Professional Woman's Clubs, Texas League of Women Voters, and Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

They have asked the Texas Legislative Council for such a law.

They also urged repeal of the law requiring wives to make separate acknowledgements on legal documents covering property belonging to a couple.

Gas Company Wins Test Companies which paid the old gas gathering tax "without protest" will get their money back.

In the first test case ruling the Third Court of Civil Appeals held that Tennessee Gas Transmission Co. is entitled to a refund of the \$1,10,906 it paid in taxes. Interest payment of \$249,576 was not granted.

COMPROMISING WITH EVIL

American newspapers and news magazines gave prominent position to reports of the antics in London last week of Georgy Maximilianovich Malenkov, henchman of the late Communist dictator Joseph Stalin and a key man in the Communists international conspiracy to get control of the world.

News photographs showed a pudgy, smiling Malenkov mingling with women and children on London streets, being wine and entertained by high British government officials, speaking to applauding Socialist-Labor Party groups.

Malenkov was serving as Premier, immediately after Stalin's death, when the last big power struggle within the dictatorship resulted in the liquidation of hundreds of Reds once held in high favor. He was in London last week to inspect electric power installations. It was apparent, however, that his prime mission was as "advance man" for the other Communist bosses - Khrushchev and Bulganin - who are to follow him to London this spring.

People Taken In An important commentary on Malenkov's London visit was the evidence it gave of people's susceptibility to the handshake and smile of a demagogue - even though the demagogue's smile may be a fraud on the basis of clear facts.

TIME Magazine's London correspondent reported: "Scores of female garment workers hung out of the windows across the street to catch a glimpse. When Malenkov raised his hand and grinned his broadest, the walls echoed with a welcoming cheer. 'He was so clean-cut,' one sewing machine operator told a reporter

Blind To Facts Most of the people of Britain knew these facts, no doubt; but they evidently felt that the Malenkov smile, handshake and charming manner somehow changed the whole character of this high ranking Communist. The instructions for behavior given out to his people by one leading British clergyman are interesting: The people were advised to "act with restraint and dignity" during the Russian's visit but to "set aside a day of prayer for Christians persecuted behind the Iron Curtain."

The photographs of Malenkov being accepted, greeted and entertained by the British government and the people of London will be widely distributed throughout the nations of the world - especially in the non-Communist countries where the Reds are working to capture the dominant political power, such as France and Italy and India. To hundreds of millions of the people enslaved by the brutal Communist dictatorship in 24

nations of the world, the bowing acceptance accorded to the Red leaders in London and elsewhere is shocking. It undermines the will of these people to resist the tyranny.

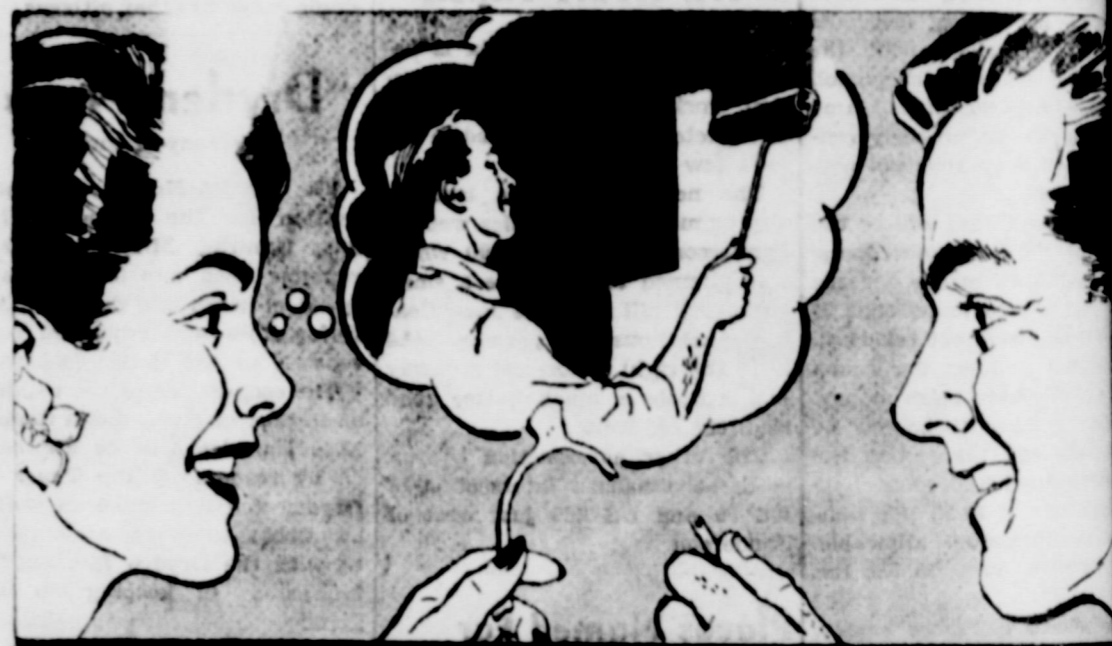

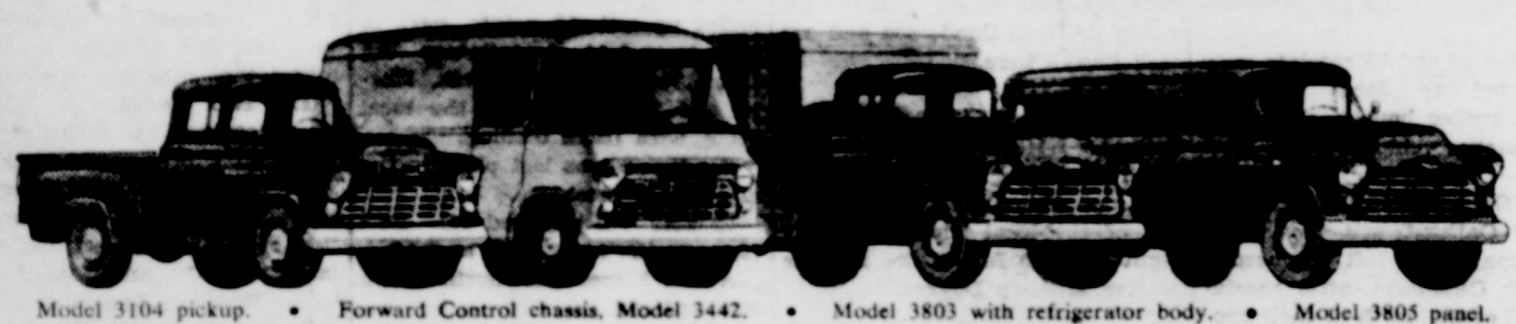
