Teacher Retirement Referendum Vote Slated This Fall

A new teacher retirement system has been designed in an attempt to help attract and hold teachers in the profession. This new retirement program for the teachers is being presented to the voters of Texas for approval on November 6 this year. The plan is being presented in the form of an amendment to our state constitu-- amendment No. 4.

The program is simple. It provides that each year a teacher works he will earn 11/2 per cent of his salary toward a retirement annuity. If he serves in the public schools for 30 years, he would average annual earnings. The program further provides disability benefits, death benefits, and sur vivor benefits which will protect the families of teachers engaged in the profession. It provides any teacher now retired or for ony teacher coming to retirement in the future with 20 years or more of service and attaining age 60. That minimum is \$100 per

Teachers would increase their own contribution to the retirement rogram and the state would match the deposits of the teach ers. The sum deposited by the state would represent less than 1 per cent of the cost of operating the public schools of Texas for one

The plan is also proposed to represent an economical approach to FINISHED, OPEN helping to solve the teacher short-

It was pointed out that between .000 and 11,000 new teachers are needed every year. About 4,000 of hese new teachers are required to fill the increasing needs of enollments. Between 5,000 and 7,000 are needed to replace teachers who leave the profession each

Teachers of the state are asking the intelligent study of the merits of the new proposal and are asked to investigate thoroughly the small cost to the taxpayers and the extreme benefit to those ho dedicate their lives to the instruction of our children.




