General Election Has Big Ballot

The ballot for the general election this year will be about "the size of a saddle blanket" as in revious years. The size this year is because of the addition of the eight constitutional amendment proposals which are to be voted on at that time.

Normally, the ballot would have been smaller than usual, owing to he fact that only about half the district and county offices are to c voted on, but the amendments makes the difference.

There will be no cross-filing of candidates of this year's ballot to confuse the voter and counters a well. The columns will be divided strictly by party with no names isted under two party headings.

There will be the words "FOR" and "AGAINST" in front of duplicate wording for each amendment.

A voter is asked to scratch out those things or persons he wishes to vote against, leaving unmarked the things or persons he favors.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m.

Safety Inspection per capita rate. This Urged Early In '57

Getting early automobile safety inspections may mean the difference between life and death, according to G. C. Morris, evecutive secretary of the Highway Safety Concil.

During the first month of the current inspection period, which will run through April 15, only 4 per cent of the registered vehicles in Texas had been inspected.

"The importance of inspections has been proven by the Department of Public Safety statistics," Morris said. "In 1951, before the insection law went into effect, mechanical defects were a sausative factor in 19 er cent of the fatal accidents in Texas. Last year, that figure had been reduced to 5 per

"These figures show beyond a doubt that a person whose car is in good mechanical condition is much less likely to be involved in a fatal accident," Morris said. "A person who waits until the last minute to get his car inspected is taking a dangerous gamble with
