Called Meeting Of Local P.-T.A. Held Monday

A called meeting of the Sanderson P.-T.A. was held Monday afternoon in the district court room in the court house. The meeting was called at the court house because of a band concert scheduled that night in the high school auditorium.

Mrs. W. G. Downie, president of the association, presided at the meeting. The group passed a resolution requesting that the school board hire another teacher for the elementary school to relieve Robert Carle, principal, of classroom duties. This move was felt necessary by the group so that Mr. Carle could devote more time to administrative, supervisory and disciplinary duties connected with his job.

The group also voted to adopt as their project the expenditure of \$175.00 toward renovating the rest room in the elementary building, and urged the school board to cooperate with them in this project.

The group also voted to request that the school board publish a notice of all meetings of that body.

Final action of the meeting was a resolution of the group pledging their support, as a body and individually, to any undertaking of the school board toward the betterment of the local schools.

Discussions of disciplinary problems confronting the teachers in the local system were held as well as discussion of other problems relating to the local system.

The district court room was completely filled by parents and interested school patrons.

P. O. Money Orders Total \$22,304.65 Since October 20

Post office money orders issued since October 20 total \$22,304.65 according to Postmaster Clyde Griffith. This total only goes through December 11, it was explained.

During the period, Oct. 20 to Nov. 2, \$4,856.12; Nov. 3 to Nov. 16, \$5,636.71; Nov. 17 to Nov. 30, 6,146.39 and Dec. 1 to Dec. 12, \$5,665.43.

Mr. Griffith stated that there was no check on the purpose for such a large amount of money being sent by postal money orders, but indicated that mail order houses of the nation were the recipients of a large quantity of the money orders issued.

Postmaster Clyde Griffith expressed his thanks this week for the cooperation of the postoffice patrons so far on his annual "mail early for Christmas" campaign.

The flood of outgoing Christmas cards and gifts is matched by a like torrent of incoming mail that is becoming greater every day.

The postmaster expects the Christmas mail load to hit its peak this week-end and also predicts that the rush will break the records of last year's business.

FURTHER PLANS MADE FOR LOCAL TV RECEPTION

Further plans have been made for television reception for Sanderson residents, according to information received last week-end.

Some of the plans are definite while some are yet awaiting further tests.

James Word, John Huey, and others, who have been testing extensively on the mountains north of town with a TV set and antenna, have moved their location to another testing spot to ascertain the type of reception consistently found in that general vicinity, trying to locate the best place for good reception from any or several possible transmitting stations.

Their reception from San Antonio has been consistently good at the place they have been testing for over a week, they said, but they are trying now to find a better location, if one exists.

The testing of this group has been for no commercial purpose whatsoever, according to one of the group, but merely an interest in reception locally.

They plan, if hopes materialize, to ascertain the best place for reception and erect a tower there which will have a translator to beam the reception into the town area. The price of such an installation is estimated to be between \$5,000 and \$7,500 initial cost, with only maintenance costs to follow over a long period of years. They have hopes of such an installation and plan to pay for it by contributions of receivers on an "honor" system, with the possibility of later turning it over to some body or company for maintenance.

The other approaching venture is by John Burchett, and others, to erect an 80-ft. tower on the hills north of town and bring the reception into home receivers by the use of a cable. This plan customarily has a "tie-on" fee and a monthly rental fee for all subscribers or receivers.

The tower for this venture has been ordered, according to information from Mr. Burchett, and it is hoped to have it erected and testing completed soon after the first of the year.

4-5ths of Taxes Paid By Property Owners

December is the last month for Terrell County taxpayers to pay their 1956 taxes and get a discount, one per cent being offered on taxes paid this month.

All taxes are due and must be paid during January or they will draw a penalty and interest after January 31. No discount is offered for January.

The total tax due on school, county and state, amounts to \$121,440.70. Of this amount, taxpayers took advantage of the three per cent discount offered in October and the two per cent in November and paid \$95,972.32.

Less than one-fifth of the total remains unpaid, according to a report by Mrs. Gordon Harmon, deputy tax collector, this week.

Poll taxes are not included in the taxes receiving discounts and may be paid any time until February 1.

For the first time, Gov. Allan Shivers and his family will spend Christmas in the Mansion. In the past they've gone to Sharyland, their Rio Grande Valley home. But this year they're staying here to get ready for moving — to make room for Gov.-Elect Price Daniel.

Sen. Daniel is working against time to get legislative and inaug-

But between being senator and getting ready to be governor, the Daniels hope to sandwich in a simple family holiday at their Liberty ranch home.

"Better Government" Bills

An extensive legislative program designed to prevent recurrence of the state scandals has been unveiled.

Sixteen "better government" bills were formulated in the attorney general's department under sponsorship of the Texas Press Association. TPA's legislative committee approved the measures and has called on Texas newspapers to work for their passage.

Bills are aimed primarily at secrecy in public affairs. They would outlaw closed meeting of governmental bodies force publication of official transactions and impose penalties for suppression of public records. Insurance companies would be required to publish financial statements at least twice a year. Names of veterans applying for land under the veterans land program would be publicized.

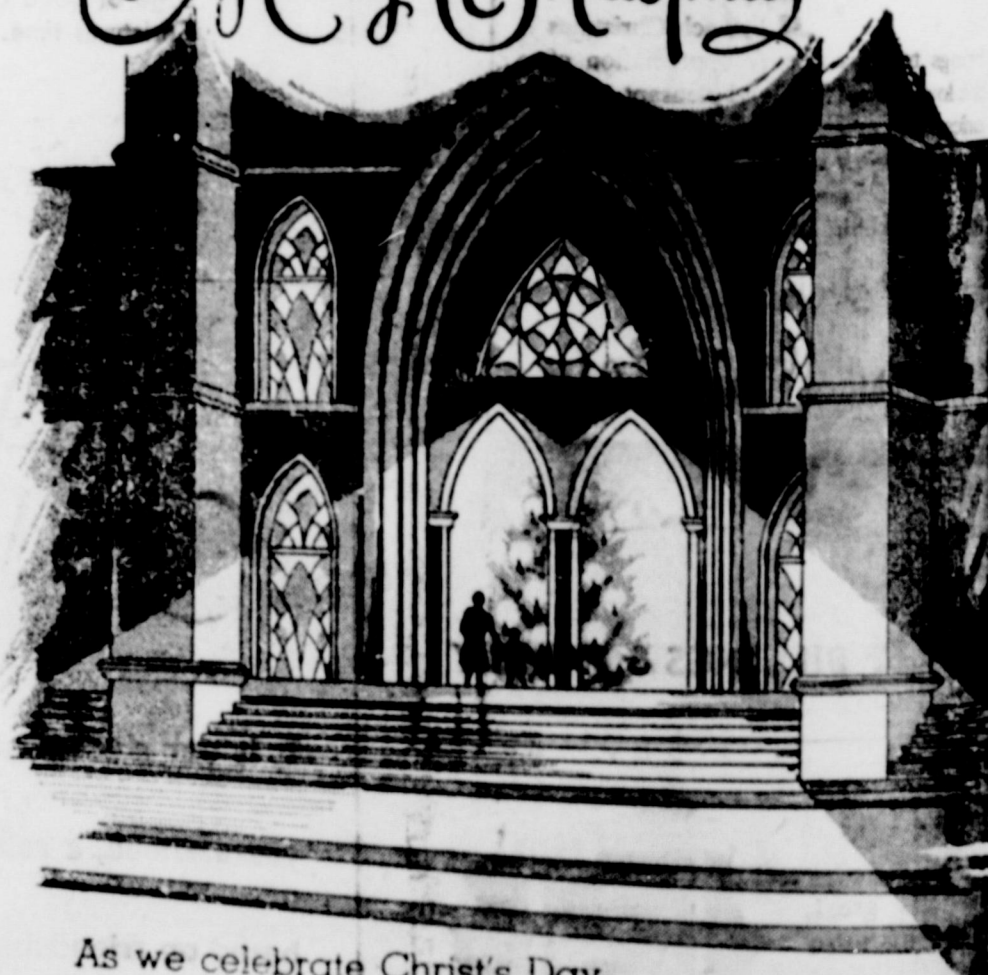

Waters Plan
 ...Price Daniel will submit emergency legislation for a \$100,000,000 water development fund.
 ...said he will support this for objectives of the Texas Resources Committee's proposal he said he wants to further before making a tax recommendation.
 ...to committee mem-

bers, the \$100,000,000 revolving fund would not require a special tax. It would be used to extend credit to local governments for water conservation projects.
 However, the committee did suggest taxes to buy water storage space in federal reservoirs. Proposed levies would increase fishing licenses 50 cents and place a five per cent excise on pleasure boats and motors.

Waterfall Deficient
 All areas of the state are nearing the end of the year with substantially less-than-normal rainfall.
 State Board of Water Engineers reports 11-months deficiencies ranging from 12 to 19 inches. Storage in major lakes continues at about 43 per cent of capacity.
Shepherd Offers Aid
 Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepherd will go to Tennessee next month to help defend persons charged with interfering with school integration.
 Shepherd, whose term of office expires Jan. 1, will go as a private citizen.
 A federal court order has enjoined persons from interfering with Clinton school integration by "thought, word, or deed" Shepherd said he thought this "too broad".
Second Woman Governor
 To Mrs. Nevelle Colson of Nevada went the distinction of being Texas' first woman governor

since Mrs. Miriam Ferguson.
 Mrs. Colson's senate colleagues had named her interim president pro tempore, an office second in line to the governorship. Gov. Shivers and Lt. Gov. Ramsey gallantly left the state so Mrs. Colson could have the traditional "governor for a day" honors.
Drought Aid Extended
 U. S. Department of Agriculture has extended from Dec. 31 until March 15 the emergency program to help livestock owners in drought areas buy feed.
 Gov. Shivers commended this decision and asked that USDA also extend grazing privileges under the soil bank program. He requested railroads to continue reduced freight rates for hay shipments to drought areas.
 Cameron and Willacy Counties have been added to bring the total drought-hit counties in Texas to 236 out of 254.
Short Noorts
 There will be a several months delay, Land Commissioner Earl J. Rudder has told some 13,000 veterans applying to purchase land. Money from the additional \$100,000,000 bond program voted in November will not be available until sometime between April and June.

Texas' cotton crop to 3,610,000 bales — a 10,000 bale increase over the November estimate.

Texas farmers are becoming big operators, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. From 1949-1954 the number of farms decreased 12 per cent, but total area under cultivation jumped by half a million acres. Result: fewer farms, but more in the \$25,000 a year bracket.

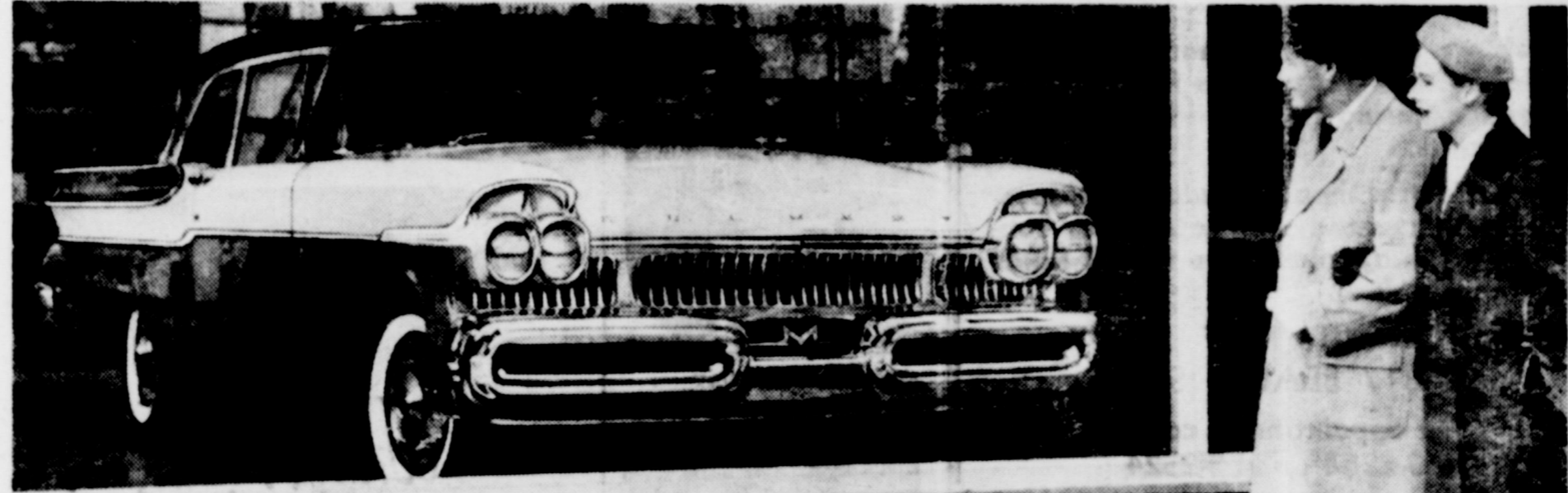

and it will not eliminate the problem.

Actions — right or wrong — of individuals cannot be legislated.

Teaching at home, in the church and in the school; and cooperation of parents in all three phases of education is most essential.

Discipline at home and at school is essential — but it must receive cooperation and understanding on the part of parents and teachers.

A child cannot be disciplined only by one person or in one place unless he is kept by only one person in one place.

A practice of instructing children of the laws of the land and of society, teaching them a sense of respect to all adults and to other children, and teaching them the necessity of willful obedience to laws and rules or the necessity of punishment, is our answer to the problem.

Do you as parents, want to have the responsibility of teaching your children everything, including the necessity of discipline — or do

you want the help of teachers?

Do you as citizens want your duly-elected school board members operating the schools, or do you want them governed by citizens' meetings?

We feel the school board members, school officials, and teachers are cognizant of the facts of the situations that exist and we also feel they are interested to do what they can do with what they have to do with and with the cooperation of the parents and patrons.

If as many parents showed as much interest every day of the school year in the school affairs as was shown last Monday, such problems might not come up.

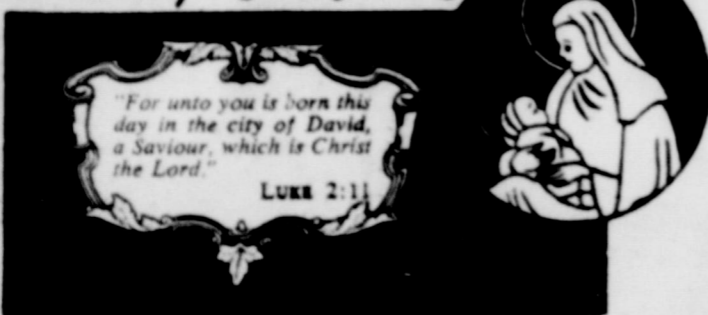

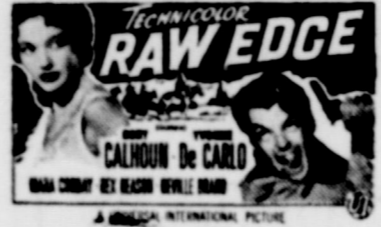

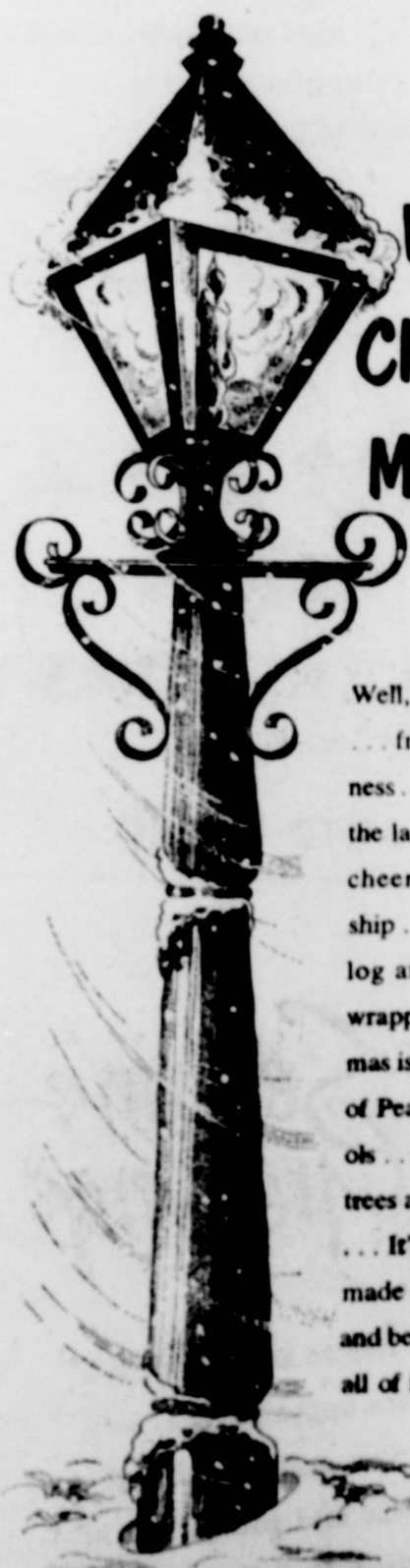
