Benjamin F. Dawson died at his home shortly after midnight Tuesday, the victim of a heart attack. He had been in failing health in recent years.

Mr. Dawson was born in Vanita, Okla., on January 6, 1888, dying on his 71st birthday. He came to Sanderson from El Paso in 1918 after serving in the U. S. Army during World War I. He was employed by the T&NO Railroad until losing a portion of his hand and then was employed by Smith & Nichols Store. In 1938 he was elected county treasurer and completed 20 successive years in that office on January 1

He was a member of the First Methodist Church, holding the offices of steward and trustee at the time of his death.

He was married to Mrs. The resa Wolff Thompson in Sander son on March 8, 1921.

Besides his widow, survivors include his step-daughter. Mrs. Floriene Horn of Shreveport, La. one sister. Mrs. Claudia Tangve of Las Cruces, N.M.; two brothers, G. C. Dawson and John R. Dawson, of El Paso.

'Yield' Signs Up On Many Corners

"Yield Right of Way" signs are installed now on several local intersections, designating right of way for traffic going specific directions.

The signs were installed upon the recommendation of the Terrell County Chamber of Commerce and at the expense of local taxpayers. The Commissioner's Court authorized the purchase of the signs and county employees installed them at corners and on streets so ordered by the Commissioners

Roughly the signs allow right of way to vehicles traveling north or south on almost every street except where the north-south streets intersect the highway or Oak Street. The signs direct vehicles traveling on Pine and Persimmon Streets to yield right of way at almost every intersection. The signs are also on Richard and Mansfield Streets.

Local drivers are urged to become acquainted with the location of the signs and heed them the Commissioners stated, since they were put up for the safety of all motorists.

The signs are yellow with black lettering, trapezoidal in shape with horizontal top and bottom.

Officers state that the use of the signs is also good for establishing liability in case of accidents. They stated that the signs mean what they say - to yield the right of way to any and all oncoming traffic.

It was further stated that the signs were not erected to make speedways out of any streets in town, that motorists should still exercise caution and use discretion in the speed at which they

Motorists are also cautioned to observe the "School Slow" signs which are installed in each street approaching intersections around schools. Yellow lanes are marked for the use of pedestrians crossing to and from the school grounds and care should be used when driving by the schools during such rush hours as 12 noon and at the end of the school day.

Austin - Holidays are over but Austin is entering another period equally festive, astive and exhausting for participants.

Tuesday (the 13th) the 56th Legislature convenes, bringing bundreds of new residents to the Capital City for five or six months or more. Their arrival steps up demand in many areas - for rent houses, hotel rooms catering services, typewriters and stenographers.

A week later romes the Inauguration of Gov. Price Daniel a parade, swearing-in ceremony Capitol reception and a multitude of balls and special parties.

Thereafter, if the usual pattern continues, there'll be more social activities for and by the visitors Lawmakers' wives, separated from home-town friends, and often, from their husbands by long hours of debate and committee hearings, form their own luncheon clubs.

Many organizations send delegations to Austin during the session. These groups - over break fasts, luncheons, dinners, barbecues, or maybe just coffee- meet with their legislators to tell them their special woes and hopes.

Even school children come by the busload to supplement their civies studies by observation.

Last session, a period of uncomfortable concern over ethics and lobbying, saw a dropping off in the lavishness of party-giving for legislators. This round may be even more grim and businesslike. Lawmakers will face stag gering problems in trying to pull the state out of debt and find money for new needs. No group would want to appear too flush lest it be seen as a likely tax tar-

Whatever the social leanings of the lawmakers - for champagne in crystal goblets or coffee in paper cups - their activities give Austin its liveliest, newsiest sitter with no particular legislative interest, said he came regularly because a session provided spectators absolutely free "the excitement of a football game the fervor of a revival meeting and more education than a year in the University.





Mr. Neelly added that trained personnel will be on hand in all Immigration offices to answer any questions the reporting alice may have regarding immigration and naturalization matters. Sufficient trained personnel are not available to furnish this service in all post offices.

Yes, you should visit the cocial security office two or three months before you retire to learn what proofs you will need wher you do apply


You should come prepared The people at the social security office will want to see your social security card and some evidence of your age. They will tell you if further proof of your age is needed. If you cannot locate proof of your age, you will be advised what proof of age is required and how to get it. Your recent work will be discussed. If you are employed, bring a copy of the last Form W-2 you received from each of your employers. If you are self-employed, bring along a copy of your last federal income tax return. You will be advised if there is need for other proofs.

The people at the social secur ity office will be glad to help you start work on your claim ahead of time. If you inquire before you retire, chances are you will cut down the time it will take to get your first check after you actual-
