Baccalaureate Sermon Sunday By Rev. John W. Byrd

The chures of the community dismissed their morning worship services Sunday to join in the Baccalaureate service for the seniors of the Sanderson High School. The service was in the high school auditorium. The processional and recessional marches were played by Mrs. R. S. Wilkinson. The high school choir sang two numbers, "I Would Be True" and "Holy! Holy! Holy!" with W. J. Morris directing and Mrs. L. D. Booker Jr., playing the organ accompaniment. Following the invocation by R. B. Wood, minister of the Church of Christ, and the reading of a Bible passage from the sixth chapter of Daniel, Rev. John W. Byrd, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, preached the sermon. Using for his subject, "In Tune With God", Rev. Byrd said "The Bible passage to which you have just listened is a continuation of the story of the three Hebrew children that were carried away into captivity. I wish we might capture again the picture of this young Daniel. We remember his home and its influence and the many gods around him during his time of captivity. There will also be many gods around you today, even though they may not be called such. Following a decree from King Darius, no one in the kingdom could pray to anyone but the king for 30 days. The foreign king had to be recognized. Some people would not mind not praying for 30 days, some even for 30 years, but young Daniel was accustomed to daily devotions to Jehovah God. We are accustomed to places of safety for our private devotions, but for Daniel there was no such. The thing that impresses us, however, is his faith in keeping open the avenues to those things which were valuable to his people. "Is the window of your mind open to the highest values that can come to your life? I am not going to try to set up a pattern to recommend to each of you for your life, for you will find one of your own. I am hoping that you will keep that area open to the things that you have been taught, the things you believe. You will discover many times that you have gone out into a world of many opportunities many responsibilities. Religion is no insurance against suffering in this world. Unless you can carry back things of value which you have seen and heard, you might as well have stayed at home. "You are going to choose between those things which are right and of value or choose that which is evil. The taxpayers will take care of you if you choose the evil, but we aren't going to make the choice of good or evil for you. The hour has come when you are assuming your religious responsibility. J. H. Lochausen Dies in Valentine, Burial Here Friday

Funeral services will be held Friday morning at ten o'clock at the First Presbyterian Church for Jesse Herman Lochausen, who died in Valentine Monday night. Interment will be made in Cedar Grove Cemetery with James Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Mr. Lochausen was born in Pecos, Texas, on November 8, 1894, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward Otto Lochausen. He spent his earlier years in San Antonio where he attended the Peacock and San Antonio Military Academies until his parents moved to their ranch holdings south of Haymon. They later moved to El Paso where Mr. Lochausen acquired ranch holdings which he disposed of to enter military service during World War I. He was married to Miss Roberta Ross on February 13, 1913, in El Paso. They came to Sanderson in 1928 and had made their home here since that time. He was employed by the T&NO railroad and at the time of his death was a freight engineer. He was found dead in his room at Valentine, having died of natural causes, according to reports. He had complained of not feeling well on the trip to Valentine and had retired early in the evening. Mrs. Lochausen had accompanied their son, Dr. Wesley Lochausen, who had been visiting here back to his home in Long Beach, California, arriving there Monday. They came by plane to El Paso and from there by car to Sanderson Wednesday morning. Besides the widow and Dr. Lochausen, he is survived by two other sons, Robert C. Lochausen of Somerset and Jesse H. Lochausen, Jr., of El Paso; a daughter, Mrs. Lee Jensen of Rapid City, South Dakota; five grandchildren, Marshall, Lynette and Patricia Lochausen of El Paso and Robert Lee Jensen of Rapid City, S. D.; three brothers, Woodruff Lochausen of El Paso, Theo and Vernon Lochausen of Los Angeles, California; four sisters, Mrs. Rankin Kimbrough of Anthony, N.M., Mildred Lochausen of El Paso, Mrs. Edmund Gschwind and Mrs. Bernard Aswege of Los Angeles, California.

Sealed Bid Sale Gets Good Prices For Area Wool

John T. Williams, owner of the Sanderson Wool Commission Co., stated he was well pleased with the results of the sealed bid sale of more than 300,000 pounds of wool here last Thursday. The same opinion was voiced by most ranchmen who attended the sale or sold wool. One clip brought 47c per pound, the lowest price of the sale, and all other prices were above 50c per pound. Most of the prices ranged from 52c to 55c per pound. The highest price paid for wool was one lot of 22,742 pounds of lamb wool from five ranches that brought 56 3/8c per pound. None of the eight-months wool sold below 52 1/4c per pound and four lots were sold for 55c per pound or better, it was stated. The prices for the eight-months were generally higher than for the 12-months wool. The largest purchaser of wool at the sale for Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co., Boston, who bought 59,666 pounds of mostly eight-month wool. Prouvost-Lefevre Co., Inc., Boston purchased 51,297 pounds. Other buyers included Thomas F. Draper Co., Boston, 48,563 pounds; Emery, Russell & Goodrich, 17,287 pounds; Colonial Wool Co., 29,248 pounds; McDonald Wool Co., 25,693 pounds; Stevens and Co., 40,737 pounds; Nichols and Co., 11,141 pounds; Pacific Mills, 32,303 pounds. It was stated that most of the 12-months wool had been tagged, thus increasing the quality and prices for those clips. Joe Kerr, Jr., Named Director Of Del Rio Bank & Trust Joe Kerr, Jr., of Del Rio was named a director of the Del Rio Bank & Trust Co. at a meeting of the directors of that organization last week. He succeeds Paul J. Poag, who died in February. He is a former resident of Sanderson, president of the Kerr Mercantile Co., and a director of the Sanderson State Bank.
