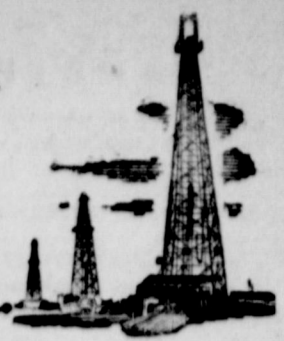

## Girls', Boys' State Representatives Go To Austin for Meet

Three local youths are leaving the first of the week for Austin to attend Bluebonnet Girls State and Boys State.

John Eaker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Amos Eaker, is being sent by the Legion to Boys State.

Vicki Littleton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vic Littleton, and Miss Darlene McDonald, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse McDonald, are the representatives from the Legion Auxiliary to Girls State. The local Lions Club

is paying Mrs. McDonald's expenses to the meet.

All of the youths are from the junior class of the Sanderson High School and were among several recommended by the faculty for the honor. The choice was based on cooperation, leadership, character, health, etc. The final choice was made by the Legion and Auxiliary.

The purpose of Boys State and Girls State is to acquaint the youths who make up the citizen-

ry for the ten-day period in the functions and workings of all phases of government, not only through study and observation but in their active participation in all phases.

Miss Littleton is the third daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Littleton to attend Girls State. Mrs. Tommy Carruth, formerly Janice Littleton and Miss Sylvia Littleton were chosen as delegates during their previous year in Sanderson High School.

## School Board Abolishes F.F.A. In Local School

Ed. Note: — The board of trustees voted to discontinue vocational agriculture at their meeting last Thursday night by a vote of 5-2. The action was the result of the lack of a large number of boys participating in the course and the high cost of continuing the course for such a small group. Only six boys registered for the course in a pre-registration before the close of this school year. The following is a fact sheet furnished by Supt. Matt Bader concerning the vocational agriculture program.

The salary of an instructor (based on Mr. Vickers' qualifications), travel expenses allowed and budgeted operating expense totals \$6,598.00. With six boys taking the course, this would be a cost of 1,099.66 per boy.

There will be an additional cost for teaching these boys five other courses. Some probable cost of operation of the pickup is not included here.

Of the \$6,248.00 cost for salary and travel expenses, \$1,562.00 will have to be paid by local tax money and \$4,686.00 will be given by the state.

It would cost the local taxpayers \$1,562.00 plus \$359.00 or a total of \$1,921.00.

Other Things To Consider

1. With this few boys, can there be an interest in Ag among them? What kind of program would we really have?
2. Could we have even a County show with this number?
3. The Vocational Ag teacher is not allowed to teach any other classes.
4. He would teach three boys for one hour in the morning and three boys for one hour in the afternoon between July 1 and September 1, he will help six boys to find lambs to feed and help buy feed for them. Remember he is under a 12-month contract.
5. The Ag teacher's contract begins July 1. Suppose a teacher is employed now and some of these six who have indicated at this time that they would take the course would change their minds by next fall and we would wind up with two or three or no boys. We would still have to pay the teacher a full year's salary.
6. If the program is kept for 1960-61, the entire bill would have to be financed out of local taxes regardless of the number of boys enrolled, as a teacher is allowed on the basis of the previous year's enrollment. A full teacher is allowed if 20 boys are enrolled the previous year. A 3/4 teacher is allowed for 15 boys, 1/2 teacher for 10 boys and no teacher is allowed for less than 7 boys.
7. There is no indication that the enrollment will increase for 1960-61.
8. In planning a shop building, it would make a difference if it would be used for a combination of Ag and Industrial Arts or for Industrial Arts only.
9. The F.F.A. has about \$200 on hand which would have to be disbursed if the Ag program is gone away with. This money was raised during the year by the boys in this year's class.
10. The pickup used by the chapter is being replaced every year with a new model by McKnight Motor Co. The first pickup was purchased from McKnight Motor Company for \$1,750. The \$1,250 was raised by the F.F.A. Chapter at that time and by donations of citizens.

There has not been a shop course in the high school since 1949.

## Eagles Win Regional Baseball Championship

The Sanderson Eagles won the regional baseball championship Wednesday when they beat Spearman by a 5-0 score. The game was played in Lamesa.

Coach Gerald Petersen took the boys to Lamesa Wednesday morning and they returned home that night.

It was the first time that the Sanderson High School baseball team has advanced to the regional championship in baseball. That is the highest level of competition in Class A schools.

Sanderson scored two runs in the fifth and three in the sixth to collect their five runs. They got one hit in the first, two in the fifth, one in the sixth and two in the seventh for an aggregate of six hits.

The three runs in the sixth inning were all the result of base-runners stealing home.

Celestino Fuentez allowed two hits for the Spearman team and struck out 10 batters.

The players and their positions were: Brucks Bader, shortstop; Buddie Joe Hahn, second; Don Little, third; David Graham, cen-

ter field; Larry Harrell, catcher; Bill Dunn, left field; Alberto Escapilla, first; Fuentez, pitcher; Dee Gray, right field.

The Eagles wound up the season with a 6-3 record, having made 77 runs in nine games to 53 for their opponents.

The three seniors on the team, Bader, Graham and Little, all had a season batting average of over .400, according to Coach Petersen.

## Shell Cases Hole To 8,830 Feet

The Shell Oil Co. and Humble Oil & Refining Co. has set 5 1/2-inch casing at 8,830 feet at their No. 1 Smith located on section 5 Block A-2 of the extreme north part of Terrell County.

The casing was for the purpose of attempting completion of the well through perforations in the Strawn.

Operator recovered 460 feet of mud-cut salt water, 3,990 feet of slightly gas-cut salt water and 5-100 feet of salt water on a three-hour drillstem test between 10,216-290 feet. A subsequent three-hour test between 10,218-292 feet surfaced gas in 28 minutes, with volume too small to measure. Recovery was 490 feet of mud-cut sulphur water, 3,990 feet of gas and slightly oil-cut sulphur water and 5,150 feet of sulphur water.

Strawn oil production was indicated earlier with the recovery of 1,800 feet of free oil and 930 feet of mud-cut oil, no water, on a three-hour test between 7,955-8,666 feet. Flowing pressure was 225-820 pounds; 60-minute shut-in pressure was 2,440 pounds.

A six hour test in the Devonian between 8,560-795 feet surfaced gas in three minutes, with volume rated at 14,000 cubic feet per day, increasing to 250,000 cubic feet per day.

Gulf No. 1 Prosser was last reported at 12,647 feet in sand and shale. Operator encountered a small show of gas at 12,597 feet. Location is on section 46, Block 1.

Gulf No. 1-A McCue is at 10,387 feet in shale, sand and chert. Location is on section 9, Block R-2.

Pan American 1 Corder, bottomed at 17,044 feet in dolomite, running logs.

Magnolia Petroleum Co. No. 1 State-Brown, located on section 22, Block 161, has been plugged and abandoned.

## R-O-W Fencing Is Under Way North of Dryden

Fencing of about 10 miles of right-of-way north of Dryden is underway by Terrell County Commissioners.

The fencing will be completed north to just beyond Independence Creek, according to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson.

Plans of the commissioners include the fencing of the lane to the Terrell-Pecos County line as soon as is possible.

Fencing of the lane eliminates a great loss to ranchmen of livestock being run over by vehicles driving on the highway.



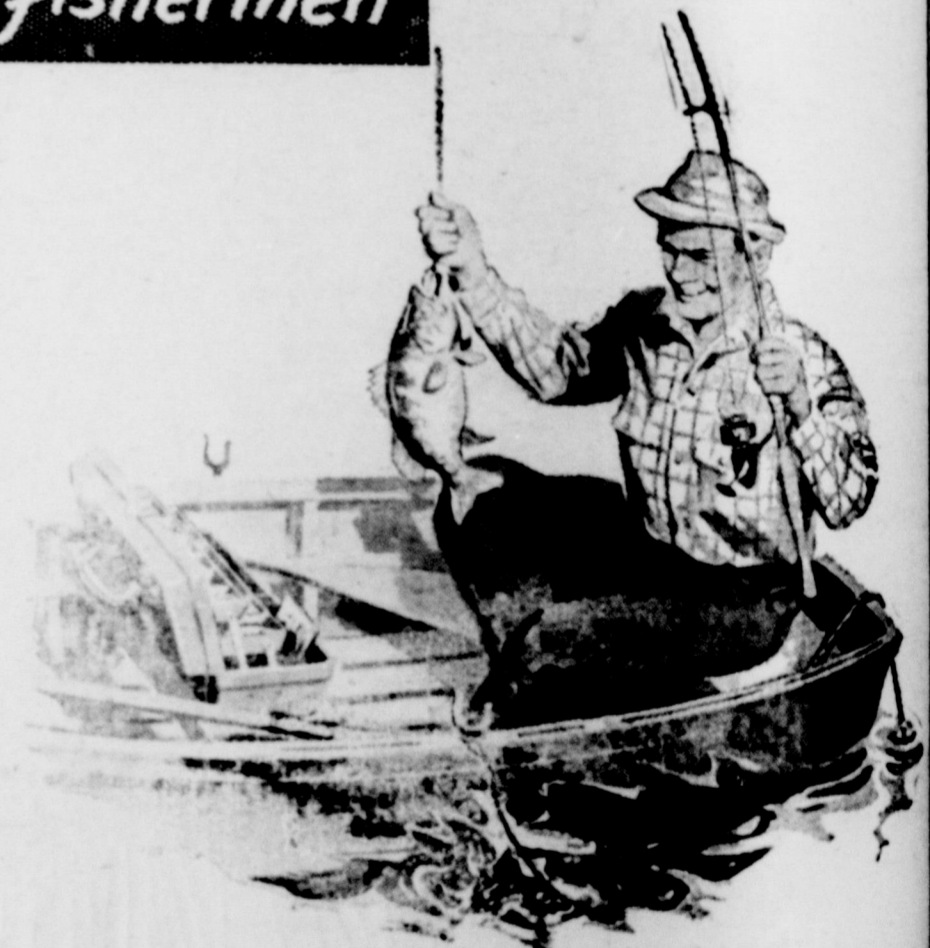
