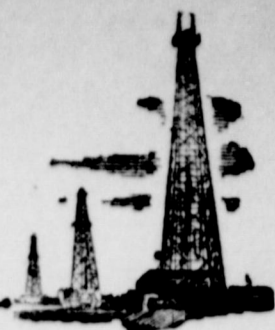

## Mrs. Mary Mitchell, Pioneer Resident, Dies In San Antonio

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Mitchell, 73, died in a San Antonio hospital shortly before noon last Thursday. She had been in failing health for the past five years after suffering a paralytic stroke. Her condition became worse five days before her death and she was moved from the Aurora Apartments in San Antonio to the Baptist Memorial Hospital.

Funeral services were in that city Saturday afternoon with Rev. John W. Byrd, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Sanderson, officiating. She was buried beside her late husband Alexander Mitchell, who died November 10, 1936.

Mrs. Mitchell was born May 1, 1886 in Kimble County. She attended the School of St. Dominic's Villa in Llano. She moved with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. N. H. Corder, to Terrell County in 1905. On February 6, 1907, she was married to Mr. Mitchell who had come to America from Scotland and had extensive land holdings in Terrell and Pecos County. Their ranch home was at the present site of the Clarence Jessup home. After her husband's death, Mrs. Mitchell added another ranch to their property, the ranch where her grandson, David Mitchell now resides, her holdings being in Pecos and Terrell Counties.

Mrs. Mitchell had resided at the ranch in Sanderson, in California and in San Antonio spending most of the past five years in San Antonio.

She was a charter member of the women's organization of the Presbyterian Church where she had her membership for many years and took an active part in all phases of the church work until her health failed.

She is survived by three sons, Malone, Keith and Cecil C. Mitchell, all of Sanderson; five grandchildren, David Mitchell, Mrs. Charles Stegall, Malone Mitchell, Jr., Keith Mitchell, Jr. and Lettie Mitchell, all of Sanderson; a great-grandson, Clay Mitchell of Sanderson; two brothers, J. M. and R. E. Corder also of Sanderson.

## Buster Babb Takes Office As County Sheriff

Babb's appointment was made by the commissioner's court here Monday, effective when bonding and other administrative changes were completed. Billings' resignation was effective at that time or by November 1, the commissioner stated.

An audit of the record was completed this week and transfer of all accounts was made to Babb.

Mrs. Tol Murrah will continue as office deputy. Babb stated and a deputy sheriff has not been named yet.

Babb served as a deputy sheriff for about four years under Billings, who has recently moved to his ranch near Langtry.

Mr. Babb asked The Times to publicly express his gratitude to the commissioners for their confidence in him and asked for the support of the people of the county in upholding the duties of the office to which he was appointed.

He stated that his oath of office was to enforce the laws of the state and that he was going to do his best to live up to that oath to the fullest of his ability.

He asked that county citizens would cooperate with him in this respect and to expect impartial but strict enforcement of all laws of the state.

Babb stated that for the time being he would be working without a deputy but would be on the job as much as possible to apprehend all violators and prevent all violations possible.

## Joe N. Brown Reports Results Of Johnson Grass Plantings

Joe N. Brown reports good success with his Johnson grass fields on his ranch west of Sanderson. Brown has 150 acres of Johnson grass in three separate fields. The 150 acres produced 80 pounds of beef per acre plus maintenance for 44 cows and a bull.

Brown, a cooperater in the Rio Grande-Pecos River SCD, believes good management is necessary for success with Johnson grass. He kept livestock off the fields until the grass was well established. He now lets the grass make maximum growth before stocking it and takes the livestock out after they have grazed off about one-half of the forage. The livestock are rotated between the three fields. Brown knows what all farmers know — the way to kill Johnson grass is to keep livestock on it.

## Pipeline, Extraction Plant To Produce Gas In 6 Months

Richard N. Ivins, presiding examiner for the Federal Power Commission, has filed a decision subject to the review of the Commission authorizing three independent producers to sell gas to El Paso Natural Gas Co. from the Brown-Basset gas field in Terrell County. The three producers are: Continental Oil Co.,

Magnolia Petroleum Co., and Western Natural Gas Co.

This information and all related information was relayed to The Times by Con. J. T. Rutherford in a telephone conversation last Friday morning.

The dedicated reserves of the three producers are estimated at 1,568,700,000 cubic feet of gas in the Ellenburger formation and 28,900,000,000 in the Fusselman formation. Gas in the Wolfcamp formation was not considered important and was not calculated.

Ellenburger gas constitutes about 95 per cent of the reserves and it is sour gas, according to the producers. An unusual quantity of carbon dioxide — about 25 per cent — must be extracted from the gas before it can be transported through the pipeline system and the extraction is said to be a very expensive process. Other gas needs no processing other than separation at the well head.

El Paso Natural Gas has designated a plant to process gas and expects authority to build a plant to produce a volume of 50,000,000 cubic feet per day. In another application EPNG plans to double capacity and produce 100,000,000 cubic feet per day.

Presiding examiner conditioned producers' certificate upon EPNG completing the facilities in 6 months and producing gas in that time through the pipeline.

Parties in the proceedings have 30 days in which to file exceptions and the Commission has 10 days to initiate review on its own motion. If no exceptions are filed or review initiated, the application will become final at the end of the 30-day period.

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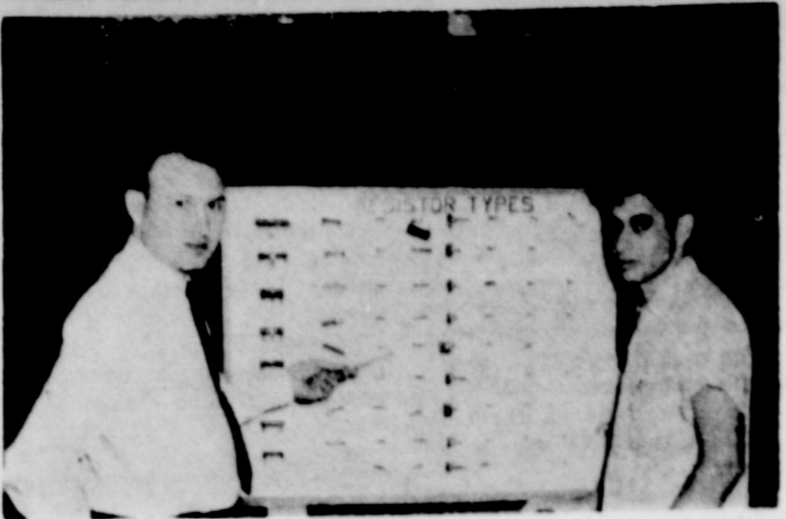
