Program Upped For **Promotion Program** Of Sheep Industry

Lamb and wool produced in the United States will receive an added boost from proomtion and advertising next year under a stepped up program by the American Sheep Producers

The Council's board of direc tors, all sheep owners representing every part of the country, authorized the accelerated program in its recent semi-annual meeting in Denver. Purpose of the increase in promotion and advertising effort will be to boost returns to sheep producers on

both lamb and wool. The directors authorized the organization of a wool division in the ASPC headquarters to pro mote and advertise domestic wool and American made wool

tion Clyde, Herber City, Utaa president of the ASPC, said the Council will cooperate and coor dipate its activities in wool advertising and promotion with other wool agencies.

The Council's current budge: for wool is \$974,000 and this figure may be incraesed slightly for the fiscal year beginning on July 1.

For the lamb phase of the program, the directors called for ar allied committee with the repre sentatives of all segments of the livestock and meat industry par ticipating to discuss all problems of lamb production and marketing in an effort to bolster live market price for lamb. President Ciyde said there is no doubt that the ASPC has done a good job of increasing consumer demand for lamb in all of the 21 promotion cities in which it operates but that there are basic problems which need to be solved be fore greater success can be ob tained. He pointed out that the retail price of lamb has held high and steady, but this favorable margin has not been reflec

ted to live prices. The lamb promotion and advertising budget for the next fiscal year will be increased slightly from its current level of \$1,871.

Daniel in his proclamation, "For hundreds of years man has battled against disease. For more than 50 years his battle against tuberculosis has been hard and rewarding Today, tuberculosis as a killer is being curtailed in this country by modern drugs and improved pa tient care and rehabilitation facilities. But tuberculosis as a communicable, widely prevalent expensive and long-lasting illness

is still to be reckoned with. New cases in Texas the first nine months of this year were 3, 375, and health authorities estimate there are more cases not

reported than reported. The Christmas Seal sale is one of the annual appeals of the Texas Tuberculosis Association and affiliated local associations for funds to make possible year round efforts to curb this need less waste of suman life and re-

"Therefore, I . . . do hereby designate the period from No vember 16 to December 24, 1959 as Christmas Seal Days in Texas and urge all citizens to make a sound investment in their own and their fellow citizens' health by buying and using Christmas Seals during the holiday season."




